## Being the Champions of Lundquist-Hovda House - Nancy Watson, Chair

Residents of the Southern Scholarship Foundation live rent free, but food, utilities, cable and internet are not free. Many students in the Foundation have little or no financial support from home, but a great desire to work hard and gain an education. House Champions provide little extras to help with expenses and provide a connection for community support that help to improve the quality of life for SSF residents.

Students who apply for and are accepted into the Foundation come from many different places and backgrounds, but all must show academic achievement and financial need. Champions are provided a student directory for their house to help get to know the residents.

For now, visits must be virtual, but we can "Champion" Lundquist House by helping to pack their pantry with paper goods, cleaning supplies, and food items. Alpha Kappa has a SignUp Genius with suggestions based on a **Wish List** created by the residents. This has been the primary way that we have supported the house, but there are also many other ways that members can "champion" the residents:

- Mentoring student (e.g., writing resumes, applying for grants and scholarships, etc.)
- Providing networking opportunities for students
- Helping students to make community connections
- Providing small appliances or furniture needs for the house
- Sending gift cards to use for house needs (e.g., printer ink, paper, first aid items, etc.)

SSF Covid-19 policy prevents us from visiting the house at this time, but we can let them know that we are great Champions by showing our support through our contributions to help reduce the cost of running their house while they are working hard on their education.
