Points from Patti –

I hope all of you have had a wonderful summer. As your new Psi State President, I have been very busy this summer preparing for the biennium and participating in various Delta Kappa Gamma events. I am also very excited and honored to be serving the members of Psi State and representing Georgia.

By the time you read this, Psi State will have hosted the first Psi State Leadership Institute on August 25th. Psi State members voted at the state convention to conduct annual Leadership Institutes that are designed to “provide intensive training in the roles, duties, and responsibilities of Psi State leadership positions; instill a deeper understanding of the work of the Delta Kappa Gamma Society International for all members through chapter leaders; and develop effective leadership skills for the 21st Century.” I hope that this will become an annual event which all of our members look forward to attending so they can learn more about our Society and how they can become better members of Delta Kappa Gamma.

The theme I have chosen for the biennium is “Anchored By the Seven Purposes”. As we have “Lived the Seven Purposes” for the past biennium, I hope that during the next two years we will take time to focus on the seven purposes of our Society and that each of us will ask what we are doing to support the Society. We should reexamine the seven purposes and resolve to put them into practice as often as possible. We must, also, take action to strengthen our Society by working to strengthen our chapters. A major goal for this biennium will be to develop the Psi State Strategic Action Plan. By incorporating the Key Initiatives proposed last year by Dr. Barbara Day, International President, we will be well on the way to strengthening our chapters as well as the Society as a whole.

Other goals that I have set include encouraging chapters to participate in one or more service projects during the biennium. Many chapters are already doing this, but I believe that we can have 100% participation in worthy projects.

An additional goal that I have set builds on the Key Initiative of “Collaborative Connections” which calls for each chapter to create supportive connections that offer support to new teachers. In addition to supporting new teachers, I believe that we need to support our new members. By providing additional support to these members, we are ensuring the future of our Society.

I am looking forward to working with you during this biennium. As we begin to chart our course for the next two years, let us keep our sights focused on the seven purposes that anchor our Society. With the seven purposes to anchor us, we can weather any challenges that lie ahead.

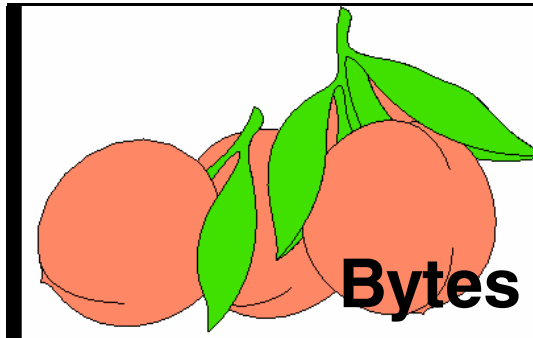

A legacy to us was left and we must pass it on,

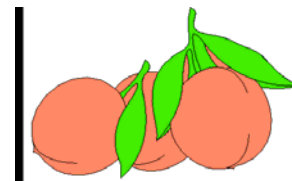
For wisdom to share and passion to care in our society must forever be well known.

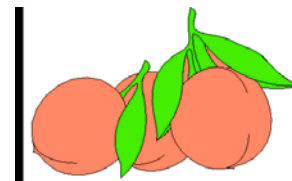

I am deeply grateful for all I have been given through each regional conference I have attended.

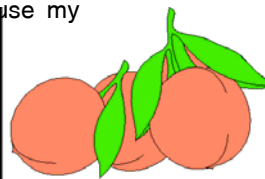
