There were around 150 people registered for the convention, and there were 26 chapters represented.



Open Minds Open Doors

The 23rd Annual Open Minds Open Doors conference, will be held on **THURSDAY**, **OCTOBER 10th**, at Coe College, and volunteers are needed. Open Minds Open Doors is a half-day conference intended to encourage middle school girls (7th-8th grades) to pursue career fields with foundations in science, technology, engineering and math (STEM).

Legislative Report - September, 2019

The 2020 lowa Legislative session will likely involve some familiar issues. Supplemental state aid has been insufficient for several years and our public schools are feeling the pain of repeated underfunding. It is important to talk to your state legislators about adequate funding. It is also likely that vouchers/education savings accounts will come up again.

The good news from last year's session is that a children's mental health system was established. Unfortunately, sustainable funding has not been identified. The SAVE fund has been extended until 2015. This legislation allows a 1 cent tax for school infrastructure.

Nationally, Congress has been on recess for several weeks. Living in lowa gives us the unique opportunity to speak to most of the presidential candidates, so please take advantage and familiarize yourself with their education related policy proposals. Several candidates have specific plans for teacher pay/public education funding/college costs, etc.

Municipal and school board elections will be combined this year, for the first time. November 5th is election day so know your local candidates. The recent changes in Iowa election laws requires voters to present one of the following forms of identification at the polls: driver's licenses, military IDs, passports, or state-issued voter ID cards.

Both the Republican and Democratic caucuses will be held on February 3.

Iowa State DKG Updates

WORK-BASED LEARNING PROJECTS NOW AVAILABLE TO SCHOOLS, STUDENTS, THROUGH ONLINE CLEARINGHOUSE

More than 100 work-based learning projects are now available to students and schools for the 2019-20 school year through a new virtual state clearinghouse.

The Clearinghouse for Work-Based Learning connects K-12 students, schools and employers through shared projects that enable students to learn through professional experiences. The goal is to expand access to work-based learning projects statewide so that students can connect what they're learning in the classroom to careers.

The clearinghouse is part of the Future Ready lowa initiative, which is about growing a skilled workforce statewide by connecting lowans to the education and training needed for rewarding careers. Gov. Reynolds established the clearinghouse through an executive order last year.

The clearinghouse has two key features:

- A project board, in which business partners post projects that can be embedded into K-12 classrooms
- An inventory for teachers to find student internships, apprenticeships and other on-site workbased learning opportunities statewide

<u>Legislation</u>- The state legislature adjourned on April 27, one week before the end of the session. One bill pushed through at the end potentially will affect IPERS as it could pit IPERS against local services.

<u>World Fellowship</u>- Michelle Anderson challenged members to donate to the World Fellowship fund so Theta has a chance to be awarded the Iceland doll at convention.

<u>Convention update</u>- Ann Nicholson reminded members to volunteer for convention duties. Close to 150 ladies are registered to attend.

<u>Programs</u>- Betty Stewart encouraged members to fill out the Ideas for Future Meetings form. Changing meeting times was also discussed.

<u>New Business</u>- Loraine Bomkamp- We will cover her membership if 50+ members are required to pay.

<u>Announcements</u>- Karen Sindelar is asking for donations to support an Iowa DKG trip to Kosovo to help schools there.

The next meeting will be September 12. The location will be announced later.

PROPOSED CHANGES IN VOTING LAWS

The For the People Act of 2019 (S.949) has been introduced in the Senate and has 40 cosponsors. Its purpose is to deal with voting, campaign finance and ethics. The bill would provide for Internet voter registration and would allow persons 16 years of age or older to register to vote in any state in which voting under the age of 18 is allowed.

MEDICARE AND PRESCRIPTION DRUGS

Although the cost of prescription drugs was one of the few things on which the parties agreed, (H.R.991 and S.25, H.R.860) All pf these bills are still in committee and none has not been brought to the floor for a vote in either house. It is estimated that 40% of Americans either didn't fill prescriptions, skipped doses or cut pills in half in an effort to make the medication last longer. Consider a person I know who cut her daily doses in half to save money. She ended up in the hospital for a week. (What is cheaper, subsidizing the expensive medication or paying for a week in a hospital?)
