- General John J. Pershing laid the cornerstone of the Indiana War Memorial on July 4, 1927.
- There are over 400 battle flags in the Indiana War Memorial collection, including more than 300 Civil War flags.
- The Indiana War Memorial Plaza Historic District contains two museums, three parks, and 24 acres of monuments, statues, sculptures, and fountains making Indiana second only to Washington D. C. in the number of monuments dedicated to veterans.
