This is a one Project in which your Chapter can help those members who do not feel a part of things for a variety of reasons and life circumstances to play an integral role in the success of both AGS Convention and help AGS maintain financial stability without raising dues.

At AGS President Karen Martin's recent Executive Board Meeting, several Officers and Committee Chairs expressed their concern of raising dues of any amount for any reason at this time. President Martin also reported that raising any dues was a major concern for all Chapter Presidents, and all agreed. NO DUES INCREASE!

Do your Chapter members know that the money raised by the Silent Auction goes into the Nancy McClure Leadership Fund? That money is then used to offset some of the money needed for your State Officers to attend International events. The State Organization President's expenses are covered in the budget, but your other State Officers for which there is a training or update session receive this support. The amount they receive is \$700.00 for each event. Your State Officers are also open to sharing the room they reserve to help other members cover their expenses. Your State Officers often arrive earlier than most of the attendees to participate in that training and they attend other events they know are crucial to helping AGS move forward as a State Organization.

So, how about using the Baskets as a way to reach all members and help out the budget. A greater visible presence of State Officers has been a request of Chapter Presidents for the last few years. Raising Nancy McClure Leadership Fund money allows other monies in the budget to aid the AGS State Organization President travel to your Chapters when asked. As well, your other State Officers and Past State Presidents will travel to you if the President cannot. Just ask!


