

These, and countless others, have either encouraged, challenged, or inspired me in some way to be a better educator. It is because of them, and of course, my students, that I have always been eager to want to know more and to hone my craft. It was this thirst for knowledge that prompted me to work to receive my Education Specialist degree from Morehead State University in December 2010. Since then, I had continued to take Supervision qualification classes up until 2014, when my mother became very ill. It is my hope that retirement will give me the opportunity to take better care of her and my dad, enjoy more quality family time with my daughter and husband, and still work in some capacity (perhaps, tutoring) to help mold young minds.

Fast forward to the spring of 2016, and I am sitting at the graduation ceremony of our eighth graders at Feds Creek Elementary. They have

given me a plaque in honor of my retirement. Although I am very appreciative of the plaque, I am more thankful for that instructor in college whose words of discouragement made me vow that I would never tell a student that he or she could not do something. It is because of this that I now say that I didn't settle on becoming a teacher, but that I have spent years doing what I love—ENCOURAGING, CHALLENGING, INSPIRING, TEACHING!

were Jane Thompson and Karen Martin, both a past president of AGS and Jane Bailey, mother of Pascal.

The Devotion was given by Sara Hall. Her first reading was related to the simple truths of Forest Gump, the movie character. When asked how many days of the week begin with "T", he answered "Two" which are "Today and Tomorrow". When asked to tell how many seconds are in a year, he answered "12" and started naming them - January 2nd, February 2nd, etc on through December. When asked the third question, "Who is God's best friend?, he answered "Andy". When asked how that could be he started quoting the words to a familiar old hymn - "And He (Andy) walks with me, and He (Andy) talks with me, and He (Andy) tells me I am his own" Her second reading emphasized that among the highest professions of all the career options, teaching is the highest because educators teach all the other professions knowledge that persons need to do their various jobs. Her third reading was from a book mark. The book mark told "Why God made Teachers" so all the other professions could be successful.

The minutes of the last meeting were given by Diane Woods. Questions were raised about the business of ALPHA ALPHA Chapter: (1) whether the Day Care program, as well as the giving of a book written by a Kentucky woman author might be discontinued if such an action would provide more money for the Grant-in-Aid program in our Chapter, (2) the reason this meeting was called a possible merger of PI Chapter with ALPHA ALPHA or, individual PI members transferring to ALPHA ALPHA, and (3) when will the By-Laws and Standing Rules be revised? It was suggested that these items be addressed as either Old Business or New Business as per the traditional agenda for conducting meetings. This was informally agreed by consent of members attending.

The Treasurer's report and the Proposed Budget, prepared by the treasurer, Connie Wason, were presented to the members. After some questions and discussion, Diane Woods made a motion that the treasurer's report with the proposed budget be accepted. Carolyn Wells seconded the motion. Joyce Clifford then initiated questions regarding the two projects:

presenting a book written by a Kentucky woman author to a library in our membership area, as well as presenting money to a preschool within our membership area. The discussion centered around whether we might want to discontinue these two efforts in order to give more money to our grant-in-aid project. It was pointed out that we had not had an applicant the last two years, and that we need to review this program as to the money necessary to operate it as originally determined.

At this point, Jan Farley proposed that we table the discussion relative to these particular questions until the Executive Board meeting for ALPHA ALPHA could be held and all issues could be more formally addressed. LeeAnn Mullins seconded the motion and all members attending voted yes and the motion passed.

Old Business:

Jane Thompson reported that the Bluegrass Coordinating Council—BETA, OMICRON, PHI and ALPHA ALPHA will be meeting together to at the December meeting at Spindletop on December 10th, 2016. BETA Chapter will be the hostess chapter this year. BETA will get the information distributed. ALPHA ALPHA's silent auction will be conducted as in previous years.

New Business:

Joyce Clifford reported that the Grant-in-Aid application was revised. Joyce passed the revised document around the table for perusal. The forms will be distributed by Joyce Clifford to be used immediately for awarding a Grant-in-Aid for an eligible applicant. The current applicant, Marie Bowen, graduated from Harrison County High School. She is majoring in teaching music and will be attending Covenant College in Georgia for her degree. LeeAnn initiated discussion whether to increase or decrease the amount of money to give to the Grant-in-Aid. Jan Farley discussed whether to drop some things we were doing to provide more money for the grant. A question was brought up about which of these things best fulfilled the DKG seven purposes. It was quickly agreed that the grant seemed most aligned with our key mission for key women educators.

A plan of action for securing more members as well as for recruiting applicants for grants would

be to work with the local schools and go to Counselors of high schools as they are the ones with the information that we need to be successful in this endeavor. Sara Hall called for the question. Joyce Clifford made the motion to keep the funding of the grant at \$1,000.00 per year (\$500 per semester). Sara Hall seconded it and all votes approved the motion. Joyce presented the grant applicant information and made the motion to accept this applicant. Sara Hall seconded and all votes were for approval.

The question as to when the By-Laws and Standing Rules would be revised, the answer was that changes by International would be completed after the International Meeting in Nashville, TN and State and Chapter By-Laws and Standing Rules would be revised after that time.

President Pascal Bailey was then given the floor to discuss her proposal regarding PI Chapter's members. Her focus is on taking care of the members as to their needs. PI has struggled for some time and many have fallen by the wayside and no longer participate in Chapter activities as there have been no meetings for some time. She presented the options for PI— either maintaining membership, allowing PI to dissolve, allowing PI merge with another Chapter of their choosing, or allow individual members to transfer their membership to another Chapter. Pascal read a letter she has written to each known member listing their options and asking for their input as to how we can best help them. The discussion focus was to extend membership to support their efforts in remaining a DKG Sister!

After much discussion ALPHA ALPHA voted to support the efforts of President Pascal and PI Chapter. It was pointed out that a recent roster showed that most remaining members are split between Berea and Beattyville. ALPHA ALPHA could easily take in any members who would want to transfer to us and the members up near Beattyville could easily transfer to ALPHA GAMMA nearer them. The choice would be theirs. ALPHA ALPHA will support and accept the decision made by them.

ALPHA ALPHA invited Past State Presidents Jane Thompson and Karen Martin to assist with the ceremony for installation of the incoming Chap are P

Woods; First Vice President Jan Farley; Second Vice President LeAnn Mullins; Secretary June Tompkins-installed in absentia; Treasurer Connie Wason-Appointed; Parliamentarian-to be Appointed. Roses were given to the newly installed officers as well as to all members attending. Favors were given to all attendees to show appreciation for their coming to this important meeting and supporting State President Pascal Bailey in her efforts to help our PI sisters. A gift bag was given to the three State Presidents (current and past) for their attention and assistance in keeping our ALPHA ALPHA Chapter on track and up-to-date! Meeting dates were decided upon for October 20th and December 10th, 2016, and other dates will be given at a later time after the next meeting. The meeting adjourned after a nice luncheon at The Chop House in Lexington.



- e. Sharing the index of preserved items in a fashion that can be easily found on the storage media. (CD, Memory Stick, Chip, etc.)
