Today, I witnessed a DKG member empowering women. She died nine days ago. When news stations reported the tragic death of OMI-CRON's Dr. Amy C. King on June 8, 2014, I knew I must travel to the Cen-

tenary United Methodist Church of Lexington for her service.

I had not been a Chapter sister of Dr. King, but I knew her from State Conventions and her energetic and spry behavior had always encouraged me to be a better DKG member and teacher. Some may recall her as encouraging, some admired her, but I remember a sassy, smiling strength.

The service was a true Celebration of Life with remembrances from her family, her colleagues, mentees, and students. OMICRON's President Brenda Ellis did an outstanding job of highlighting her gifts of encouragement and support, but also told of her ability to introduce members to DKG. In her last two years while in rehab from surgery, she hosted a DKG meeting at the rehabilitation facility!


After the service, Omicron sister, Ellen Allen, spoke of her thoughtfulness and determination to strengthen their chapter. When some women might be in a rocking chair, Amy King was moving and shaking her Chapter to encourage participation of all members.

I left the service with a greater determination in my life and a stronger commitment to my faith.

"Finally brothers, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure. whatever is lovely, whatever is commendable if there is any moral excellence and if there is any

praise — dwell on these things. Do what you have learned and received and heard and seen in me, and the God of peace will be with you." Philippians 4:8-9.

This scripture was selected by Dr. Amy C. King for her service, and I believe it was how she lived her life. I plan to do the same. Will you join me?



Dr. Amy King, OMICRON, was a special person with whom people wanted to spend time and learn from her. She was a great encourager to all she met. Dr. King has a classroom named after her at Eastern Kentucky University and has won many prestigious awards for her work. Amy King has best been described as a pioneering type of woman by those interviewed for the news following her death. OMICRON Chapter and AL-PHA GAMMA STATE will truly miss her.

During my biennium as AGS President, Amy King frequently let me know so many times that AGS was proud of me and told I me I was doing a good job. She is a role model for all DKG members. Everyone needs an Amy King in their life.






Mary Evelyn Poole and Dr. Rosemary Wedding ton 2nd and 3rd from the left.

President Allison Doutaz called the meeting to order and Lesley Wilson gave the devotional. Allison announced that Jessie Trotter will be the new President and Peggy Darnall will be the new Secretary; Vice-President is still opened. Bev Morrison will remain as Corresponding Secretary.

The New Opportunity School for Women (NOSW) grew out of an urgent need for women in Appalachia to become better educated and employed. NOSW is a non-profit organization that provides a free three-week residential program in Berea's dorms and campus to low income, middle-aged women in south central Appalachia, during which participants gain a variety of skills such as career, educational and personal development. Childcare costs are offset by the program. Over 700 women have completed the three-week program and hundreds more have benefited from the total programs, which also include career and education outreach, counseling, and legal aid. Three other schools have just opened; these are located in North Carolina, West Virginia, and Tennessee.

George Ann Lakes, Outreach/Office Assistant, graduate of the program went on to get her Bachelors and Masters in Social Work at University of Kentucky. Education was a top priority in her household after she completed the NOSW program. Her children have gone on to achieve college degrees as well.

Carla Nunn, the other presenter, is a NOSW graduate of 2012. She also went on to higher education in design and marketing and hopes to graduate this year from Eastern Kentucky University. Her children are also college graduates. She said, "The program gave me my life back. I worked two jobs and took 12-15 hours of college per semester."


