As I was preparing for the EEC/1st. Vice President Training at the Fall Workshop in Owensboro, I received an email from my roommate at the 2016 Golden Gift Leadership Management Seminar. She writes the blog for DKG in California.

This issue of her blog was my inspiration for a Kentucky EEC project and for my message today.

The blog is about what one California chapter does to support the teachers in their chapter who are still working. This is their story:

Every Spring, members of Delta Lambda Chapter sign up to be "big sisters" to working members. They become sponsors for the upcoming school year by contacting the working members monthly in person, by email or by phone to check out how things are going and to let them know that they are important members of the chapter.

Before school starts each year, the sponsor visits the working member at her school and provides back-to-school support in the form of a hand delivered bud vase, a card, and a check from the chapter. Each vase has one fresh white rose with an artificial red rose so the vase can remain on her desk or in sight all year. Each vase also has a DKG card tied with a red ribbon. On the back of the card a note says "We Value Your Attendance" and lists the dates of the chapter meetings.

In total for the 2016-2017, year, nineteen Delta Lambda classroom teachers received gifts presented by thirteen Delta Lambda sponsors.

What a wonderful way to support our members and provide a reminder that DKG is a valuable resource to working teachers! We are asking each Chapter to have a special project to support working teachers. These teachers could be DKG members or nonmembers, some of whom are prospective members. They could be new teachers or veteran teachers. We have already heard from many chapters who have distributed bags of supplies and gift cards to teachers in their first year of teaching. We must remember to stay in contact with those teachers.

We then want you to share your stories and pictures documenting your activities with us. We will then share your stories. We are looking forward to share your ideas with our counterparts at the International level. We want to show off how great DKG is in Kentucky!

"DKG - Leading Women Educators Impacting Education Worldwide" - This is the theme that International President Carolyn Pittman has selected for this biennium. Let us honor this theme by supporting classroom teachers in Kentucky!

Joan Young Thro, 78, MU, a long-time educator in Hardin County, died Saturday, August 13, 2016 in Lexington. She was born May 10, 1938, in Harrodsburg, KY,

graduated from Harrodsburg High School in 1955 and the University of Kentucky in 1959 with a degree in home economics. She later earned a Master's degree and Rank I status from Western Kentucky University.

Joan began her teaching career in 1959 and spent forty years as a teacher and guidance counselor. During that tenure, she became a "listener" to many young people and adults who needed someone to counsel them. During the days since her death, many past students have commented on how much she helped them.

She and Dr.Ernest Thro were married for 46 years before his death in 2008. Joan and "Ernie" loved to travel. She often shared the excitement of those "adventures" with her friends at MU Chapter. Australia, Italy and New York City for those Broadway shows provided conversation for weeks.

Initiated into Mu Chapter in 1982, Joan served in various ways through the years.

She is survived by a son, Bill, (Julie) of Lexington and three grandchildren. The memorial service conducted by her daughter-in-law Julie was held August 20 at Brown Funeral Home in Elizabethtown. **Caroline Vice Ransdell, 105, ZETA**, was a graduate of the University of Kentucky in 1937 and was a former teacher for the Grant County, Dry Ridge, and Williamstown School Districts for more than 30 years.

One of her home economics students remarked, "I was always a pain for Mrs. Ransdell, but she loved me nonetheless." In addition to teaching, Caroline was a member of the Grant County Retired Teachers Association, state representative of Captain John Lillard Chapter of N.S.D.A.R., Williamstown Woman's Club, Grant County Historical Society, and Alpha Delta Theta. She was a lifelong member of the Williamstown Baptist church where she served as a church historian, Sunday School teacher, church library organizer, and BYKOTA Sunday School Class organizer.



Justina Graziani, 94, UPSILON,

passed away Tuesday, August 9, 2016 at the Baptist Convalescent Center, Newport, KY. Justina, retired after 40 years as a teacher with Campbell County Board of Education and taught at Cold Spring Elementary School. She

also tutored and continued to do substitute teaching after retirement. Justina was very active in the First Baptist and Christ Baptist Churches in Cold Spring, as a Sunday school teacher, the Women's Missionary Union and as a kindergarten teacher. She was past president and a 50 year member of Delta Kappa Gamma and past president of Fort Thomas Women's Club.

Dorine Hawk Geeslin, 98, died Monday, August 22, 2016, at Helmwood Healthcare in Elizabethtown, KY.

This past president of ALPHA GAMMA State (1977-79) was initiated into MU Chapter in 1960 and immediately began making a difference. She served in various capacities including MU Chapter president in 1972-74. Dr. Dorine rarely missed an opportunity to be with her sisters in local, regional and international meetings, including attendance at the Northeast Regional Conference in Stockholm, Sweden.

The legacy lives on through her mentorship. Dorine's daughter MelanieVanTassel received a recruitment grant from MU Chapter and later became an active member serving as MU Chapter president. In addition, four MU Chapter members—Sue Story, Susan Cross, Ramona Jeffries and Pascal Bailey aspired to the ALPHA GAMMA State presidency with her encouragement and influence. Members throughout the Society will remember her as <u>the</u> <u>authority</u> on DKG history.

A native of Hart County, Dorine graduated from Western Kentucky University in 1938, received her Master's Degree from U of L in 1959 and earned her Doctor of Education from Florida State University in1967. She retired from WKU as a full professor teaching teachers how to teach.
