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Delta Kappa Gamma Service Sharing Sisterhood Scholarship We Hold the Key



President's Message:

My back to school theme this fall is "How I spent my summer vacation." I traveled as your representative to Spokane, Washington this summer. I would like to share some information from the 2010 International Convention. Incoming International President Dr. Jensi Souders' theme for her biennium is Embracing Our Vision - Designing Our Future. In her installation speech, Dr. Souders said she would like the focus of her term to be increasing support of early career educators. She cited statistics that revealed 50 percent of new teachers leave education by their third year, while 70 percent of new teachers drop out by their fifth year. She stated that it's always difficult to be a new teacher and the responsibilities are many. She expressed her wish that we support these young educators both monetarily and through positive encouragement. Dr. Souders also stated that chapters give grants-in-aids to graduating seniors going into education. Many of the grant recipients change their career path along the way to their final degree. Dr. Souders pondered if there wouldn't be a greater impact if that money we have been awarding was channeled to early-career educators through their third year. She suggested that chapters could change the focus of their grant-in-aid awards and offer monetary grants for classroom supplies or for teachers without funds for professional clothing. stated that DKG members who are retired, as well as, active educators can support new teachers in the classroom by volunteering, tutoring students, helping young teachers do bulletin boards, whatever they need to make their early years in education a success so they will gain a hold and make a career of education.

One DKG project and one non-dues revenue opportunity were revealed to members during the International Convention this summer. I would like to give you some background on each.

The project that DKG has adopted is <u>Schools for Africa</u>. This is a joint campaign founded by UNICEF, the Nelson Mandela Foundation, and the Hamburg Society to promote education for children in Africa. The campaign will increase access to quality basic education for children, with a special focus on girls, orphans and vulnerable children. UNICEF is working with governments, local authorities, communities and other partners to:

- Build and rehabilitate 1,000 schools
- Create schools that offer a safe and protective environment where children can learn and play
- Provide access to clean water and separate sanitation facilities in schools for boys and girls
- Supply exercise books, pens, proper furniture and other school and sports materials
- Train 100,000 teachers to provide children with quality education and basic life skills
- Educate children about proper hygiene and HIV prevention; this knowledge is passed on to siblings, parents, and the community-at-large

Another exciting aspect of the International Convention for me was the constitutional revision. Every four years at the International Convention the constitution is reviewed. The thrust of changes in the 2010 revision of the *Constitution* and the *Standing Rules* is to give more flexibility to chapters.

Membership Rules That Stay the Same:

- Definitions of types of memberships: active, reserve and honorary stay the same
- Membership in Delta Kappa Gamma is still by invitation
- An individual becomes a member when she is initiated and she is initiated only once

Membership Rules that were changed and are in effect NOW:

"Article III, Section B 1. An active member shall be a woman who is employed as a professional educator or who has been retired from an educational position." This means that the chapter decides any restrictions on time of service – women are eligible during the first year of service and in any year of retirement.

A member is reinstated without a chapter vote.

One more bit of information...Alpha Iota State is renewing our Go to Meeting license for another year. We plan to use it for more state committee meetings as our comfort level grows.

Our biennial theme for Michigan remains "DKG - Sharing, Scholarship, Sisterhood, Scholarship - We Hold the Key." Remember that as DKG members, you hold the key to designing the future of your chapter. Best wishes for a wonderful year.

White Roses in Memoriam

Margaret Lapham - Alpha Iota/Psi

Teacher, friend, DKG member, fan and owner of the "book": all of these describe a native Detroiter who made West Michigan, the Sparta School District, and the Whitecaps Baseball Team her passion. Her "adopted" family, friends, Whitecaps fans, students and staff, her dog, and her church were her life. Indeed, the life skills she taught her students and others went far beyond her cooking and sewing classes—she shared with them her zest for life, her kindness and thoughtfulness for others. Margaret began her teaching at the Greenfield Village School and, later in 1956, after beginning her career with Sparta Schools, she joined Alpha Iota where she served as president and chaired other committees. In 1988, when Alpha Iota dissolved she transferred to Psi where she was an active participant in all chapter functions. Margaret was also the owner of a unique book of baseball history and memorabilia started by her grandfather containing autographs from Tigers' greats Young, Cobb, and Hornsby from 1912 or earlier, continuing with Tigers' stars from the 30's and 40's, culminating with Margaret's collection of autographs from Tigers' players and virtually all of the Whitecaps players.

September 27, 1920 - July 24, 2010

Kathryn Faner Lobban - Alpha Alpha

Kathryn Faner Lobban was born in Montrose Mi almost 101 years ago. Raised in Goodrich, she earned a BA in Public School Music from MSU in 1930 and, later, a MA in School Administration from the U of M. As a Flint Public School teacher and administrator, Kathryn enriched the lives of many students and staff members at Garfield, Walker, Coolidge, Doyle and Stevenson Elementary Schools, as well as, Zimmerman Junior High, before she retired in 1960 along with her husband Andrew. An avid Flint booster, she supported the School of Performing Arts and the Institute of Music along with other area clubs, organizations and her church. An Alpha Alpha member since 1958, their Woman of Distinction in 2005, Kathryn shouldered many responsibilities with DKG but her greatest influence was in bringing in new members and keeping up with and encouraging them through her 52 years of membership. Many of her DKG sisters, her beloved students and staff members honored her by helping celebrate her 100th birthday last July.

July 24, 1909-June 1, 2010

Maxine H. Perine - Mu

A Missouri native, Dr. Maxine Perine, taught for eight years in rural Missouri schools before returning to Central Missouri State University to complete, with honors, her BS in Education, majoring in Music and joining the Kappa Delta Pi International Honor Society. Maxine spent 20+ years as a teacher and reading consultant for the Kansas City, MO School District and also attended Columbia University in New York City for an MA in Curriculum and Teaching and later a Professional Diploma in Reading Specialization. In 1964, Maxine joined the faculty of the U of M - Flint teaching Reading and the Language Arts. During her tenure in Michigan, she finished her PhD at Columbia, was invited to speak to educators in at least seven countries in conjunction with her membership in the International Reading Association, was an editor for Holt Rinehart, a guest professor for CMU, a visiting Scholar at Columbia, and was recognized by Who's Who. A charter member of DKG in Missouri since 1959, she transferred to Mu in 1964 where she was honored as Chapter Woman of Distinction and served on many committees, including International committees. An accomplished singer, Maxine sang with the Kansas City Choral Symphony, the University of Kansas City Chorus and the Linwood Presbyterian Church Choir.

Circa 1918 - June 10, 2010

Shirley J. Syrja - Omega

Born in Mt. Clemens, Shirley earned her B.A. from MSU and her master's degree from EMU in Education. An elementary teacher, she began teaching in the Mt Clemens Community Schools District in 1952, retiring in 2005. Mrs. Syrja valued family loyalty and instilling ethics, integrity and manners in children. Shirley, an active member of the Mt Clemens Education Association, joined Omega chapter of DKG in 1970. She served as Recording Secretary and was an active member of the Membership, Professional Affairs and Sunshine Committees. Shirley's love and passion for her family and for teaching encompassed all facets of her life. She welcomed all students into her general ed. classroom and is warmly remembered and admired by students, staff and parents. She was eulogized by parents of the POHI students in her classes.

Naomi was a Bedford Public Schools teacher for almost 40 years teaching elementary grades at Smith Road and Jackman Road Elementary Schools, and Central Elementary on Douglas Road. For ten years she was assistant principal at Smith Road School when it first opened. An active Charter Member of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Church in Temperance, Naomi also taught Religious Education there. She served as pastpresident and member of the Bedford Education Association, Michigan Association of Retired School Personnel, Michigan Education Association, and, for 36 years, a member of Beta Rho Chapter of DKG. Can You Make a Household Word?

If I said the word "bread," several brands would jump into your head. How about "car"? Easy isn't it? Let's make DKG one of those easily recognizable entities. KEEPING A CHAPTER HISTORY HELPS AND HINTS



Does your chapter have a History Committee? Or a Historian? A chapter history serves the same purpose as a family album. It gives the present an anchor, a common memory that unites. Have you ever pulled out the family album at a reunion and heard said, "Oh! Look! There's grandma as a young girl!" There's Aunt

Hazel's wedding picture!" The history of your chapter is like that album

Each chapter may develop their own plan for a chapter history depending on the members – their talents. It might be a pamphlet or a bound book. The resources that can be used could include: initiation book, yearbooks (I have seen some where the educational background for each member is included in the directory), minutes, newspaper articles, International, Regional and State programs, earlier histories of the chapter, newsletters (chapter, state and international) and correspondence.

My chapter (Gamma) has scrapbooks from 40-50 years ago that solely consist of newspaper articles and photos (some of which are NOT identified). The paper is yellowing and that is problem. We are brainstorming ways to preserve these precious artifacts. In recent years pictures have been taken at the meetings, people identified and several very talented members of the chapter have transformed these raw materials into lovely scrapbooks. With this system storage will become a problem and that will have to be resolved.

As the years have gone by we have lost records (ex. a video tape of our members reenacting the founding of Delta Kappa Gamma). Do you keep your records in more than one spot? How do you store them? Does the person who is in charge of them change each biennium and do the records get moved? This is where the state History Committee can help. Let us keep a copy of your history.

What can you send us? Information on your founders (not just their names); noteworthy events; programs of importance; causes the chapter supported; updated lists of chapter officers, state and international positions held by members; Chapter Woman of Distinction, Friend of Education selections; scholarship recipients; involvement with coordinating councils, a "special" newsletter, etc.

- "Getting-to-know-you" activities make fun programs
- Use program activities listed on the International Website

Involving members and community members in your programs is a great way to promote the society. Keep a record of your program ideas so that they can be shared.

Newsletter Evaluations for 2010-2011

In an effort to assist chapters in creating visually exciting and interesting newsletters that members would look forward to reading, Alpha Iota State has provided annual newsletter evaluations. It has been the hope of the Communications Committee that, the evaluation form would serve as a roadmap to excellence. Newsletters serve several functions, but the most important is keeping chapter members apprised of Society news from all levels as it relates to individual chapter members.

As with any endeavor, there are principles that illustrate "best practices" and newsletter construction is no exception. Visually strong, easy to read newsletters adhere to an underlying grid, use a limited number of fonts, have strategically placed graphics, employ enough white space to give text "breathing room" and have a restrained use of color. Our State Wolverine is an excellent example of these principles in action.

Newsletters have certain elements that increase readability. A well-constructed masthead quickly identifies the publication and where it falls in the timeline of other published newsletters. An effective masthead identifies the chapter and its geographic location. A nice addition to a multi-page newsletter is a table of contents. Consistency in the order of the articles from month to month makes it easy for readers to find just what they are looking for, be it the meeting schedule or the latest member news.

But newsletters are not just about looks. Even the greatest looking newsletter cannot compensate for lack of content. Just as the real estate market is about "location, location, location," newsletter publication is all about "content, content, content." The evaluation form lists many items of content such as President's letter, State, Regional, Council, and International news, individual member news, meeting schedules, up-coming society events and so much more. The best newsletters have contributions from chapter members, sometimes reports on chapter business, but also stories or poems written and submitted by members.

Creating a newsletter can be a burden for smaller chapters, so they might consider publishing a newsletter less frequently, perhaps bi-monthly or quarterly. Paper newsletters can be a financial burden for some chapters and many chapters have begun disseminating theirs electronically, or simply posting them online. Be sure to provide paper copies for those members who require it, but encourage members to receive it electronically.

The criteria remain the same as last year. Please submit one copy of any <u>August to December</u> newsletter to Margaret, preferably in an electronic format (.doc or .pdf) by <u>February 1, 2011</u>. The committee WILL accept newsletters early!

SCHOLARSHIP OPPORTUNITIES - STATE AND INTERNATIONAL

The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International offers scholarships to members who are pursuing graduate work for Master's degree and beyond. These scholarships for up to \$6,000 are now available to women who are members of the Society. The due date for application is February 1. 10 Interesting Women: Finding a Way to Connect

A Chapter Project Idea

DKG international has reported "25 percent of new teachers leave the profession within the first three years of teaching; 30 percent leave within their first five years nationally; 50 percent leave within their first five years in urban areas. Attracting and retaining teachers is one of the biggest challenges schools face today."

Mu Chapter, Flint, has found an effective way to connect with teachers who are still working. A Collaborative Connections Committee has developed the "10 Interesting Women Model". Here is how it works:

Five members of the chapter joined together to invite five currently working teachers and/or administrators to meet after work for a light dinner. Each DKG member sent a letter to someone *she knew* who was teaching or working in education and invited her to the gathering. The opening line of the letter said, "Some other professional educators and I would like to get 10 interesting women together to share about what is happening in education today. I think you are an interesting woman and I would like to ask you to participate." The response was superb.

The first gathering was billed as a time with no agenda but just sharing educational experiences. The dinner was at a restaurant with a large round table. After introductions, there was free-flowing talk about what was happening in the classrooms of today. Since the purpose was to encourage working professionals and to find ways that DKG members could help them but also to inform retired educators of the changes in education today, the sharing provided two-way learning. Retired DKG members spoke from their experiences.

Later, one of the guests asked some of the DKG members to serve as "grandparents for a day" for children who did not have one. (Of course, school security procedures were followed.) Mu Chapter also prepared about 30 "We Care Kits" for new teachers (20) and currently employed (10) Mu members. They were delivered at the beginning of the school year.

There have now been three dinners together. There are plans to divide the group into two. There will be at least three DKG members in each set and the working professionals will each invite another working teacher. Also, Mu Chapter plans to get more table groups going and increasing the number of participants. Eventually, most members of the chapter will be involved connecting with working teachers and helping support and encourage young teachers so that they will remain part of our most essential profession. It is seen as a long-term project! All participants communicate with each other by using "Reply to all" on the email.

Since the main purpose is to connect with teachers who are still working, emphasis in not on their becoming DKG members. However, some of the invitees are aware of the society and some have expressed the desire to become members. As time passes, DKG members will invite some of the participants to be involved in DKG. Therefore, increased membership will no doubt be a by-product of this effort to retain teachers in our profession.

Article III, Section B reads: "An active member shall be a woman who is employed as a professional educator or has been retired from a professional education position." Chapters still have the option, as before, of having their own by-laws regarding experience or degree requirements. But the new

constitution does not restrict chapters if they wish to initiate a new teacher. There were also many changes in committees.

Each general session featured a speaker with the theme of, "From Vision to Action". (Ask me about Amanda Gore, "Ta Dah".) We had dozens of exciting workshops to choose from. There will be reports of many of these in the next Wolverine. At our banquet, Jackie Smart represented the State. We have five Michigan sisters who are involved at the International Level.

We had several opportunities to enjoy the city of Spokane. A city tour took us to the Bing Crosby Museum on the campus of Gonzaga University, a Japanese Garden, a greenhouse, a formal garden, (you know how I feel about those) and an Episcopal Cathedral with the largest pipe organ in the western US. We enjoyed a Jazz Combo on the River, a dinner cruise on Lake Coeur d'Alene, a tour of the stately Davenport Hotel, and a ride on the gondola over the Spokane Falls. Of course, we had to eat, so we found several local restaurants to try, as well as the Birthday Lunch, Northeast Regional Breakfast, and President's Banquet.

More Power to the Chapter, More Power to the Member: Know Your Governing Documents



At the 2010 international convention, DKG adopted a revised Constitution that vests more power in chapters and in individual members than our former governing documents did.

Some primary examples are:

The new Constitution places no restrictions on the number of years a woman must have been an educator in order to be invited to membership, nor does it place a limit on how long she may have been retired. It says simply, "An active member shall be a woman who is employed as a professional educator or has been retired from an educational position. An active member shall participate in the activities of the Society." The members of the chapter have the sole responsibility for deciding whether a woman educator is worthy of membership on the Society.

The new Constitution gives each chapter complete freedom to decide how to organize itself in order to fulfill its constitutional responsibilities. It does not prescribe what sort of structure or what committees a chapter should have.

The new Constitution says, "The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International may also be known as the Society, Delta Kappa Gamma, $\Delta K\Gamma$, or DKG." Members, chapters, and states can choose how to refer to the Society.

The new Constitution says, "The official jewelry [pin] may be worn on a ribbon or other manner as desired by the member." This statement explicitly refutes the prevalent notion that there is only one proper way to wear the pin.

There are many other changes in our new governing documents. For a complete list go to the DKG website <dkg.org>, click on Library and then click on Publications. There you will find the proposed constitutional revision, amendments that were adopted at the convention, and lists of specific changes that affect members, chapters, and states.

Create a Buzz with Your Website or Chapter Blog Updated E-policy Guidelines



International Executive Board has recently updated the policy regarding linking to chapter websites or blogs.

The policy states: this criteria for linkage.

(The following criteria must be documented on the Certified Link Request Form before a state or chapter Web site, Wiki, BlogSpot, group site, social networking site, etc., can be approved and certified for linkage on the Society Web site.)

- A light colored or white background must be used
- The Greek and geographical name must be used on the header
- Web safe fonts that are easily readable must be used. Fonts considered safe and readily available include Arial, Times New Roman, Verdana, Georgia, Comic Sans Serif, Trebuchet or Courier
- The Purposes of the Society must be listed
- The Mission Statement of the Society must be displayed
- Each web page must be dated as to its latest revision (month/day/year) or the homepage must be dated as of the date of the last revision of any part of the Web site
- There must be no direct advertising/solicitation (A onesentence acknowledgment of donation of an electronic site is acceptable)
- Written consent has been obtained for any addresses (mailing/electronic), telephone/fax numbers listed on the website
- Written consent has been obtained for any news and/or pictures of an individual or group
- Written consent has been obtained for the use of any copyrighted materials. Due credit must be provided on the Web site
- Information on the Web site is current and updated frequently (at least quarterly)
- A link on the Web site is available for the Webmaster
- Information must be of sufficient scope to adequately reflect the chapter/state activities, projects, programs, schedule/ calendar, officers for the level of organization, newsletter, etc.
- Consider submitting your Chapter e-communication site to International for consideration. The forms for doing so may be found at International's website. Choose Forms > Website Forms.

NOTE: Chapters and states already having approved websites will be reevaluated using this new criteria.

Meaningful Partnerships Between Cultural Organizations and Schools


