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International Speaker Fund Awards Michigan Request.

ISF promotes understanding and creates friendships across borders.

The purpose of the ISF is to facilitate exchange of Society speakers among member countries and help unite women educators of the world.

The fund was established in 1982 to mark Delta Kappa Gamma's 30 years as an International Society. Since 1989, interest from the International Speakers Fund has provided travel expenses for eighty-seven International speakers.

The fund is administered by the ISF committee with representatives from the Administrative Board for Canada, Europe, Latin America and the United States. It awards three stipends a year.

Each year State presidents can request a speaker. Olive Horning, our President, has applied for and been on the International DKG speaker circuit in the past. Olive has traveled to different states sharing her portrayal of Corrie Ten Boom. This year Olive requested Dr. Adriana Fishta-Bejko from Calgary, Alberta, Canada who is a Fulbright Scholar and World Fellowship recipient to share her experiences as our Saturday morning speaker.



Although she has now been in North America for a number of years, Dr. Adriana Fishta-Bejko is a native of Albania and has taught in schools and universities on three continents and in numerous countries and brings a valuable international perspective and experience to Ambrose University and the education program. Commenting on the invitation to join the Ambrose faculty, over a year ago, Dr. Fishta-Bejko said that she "...saw it as an exciting opportunity to give my modest contribution to the development of such an exciting program." Her area of expertise being focused on the area of barriers to and opportunities for creating a welcoming school culture for students where English is not the first language (ESL), or who are immigrants to Canada. With elements of the Ambrose program focusing on diversity, Dr. Fishta-Bejko's research is considered as a valuable resource for the Education Department . Dr. Fishta-Bejko is currently an Associate Professor of Arts and Science Education for Ambrose University College, in Alberta, Canada.

Membership



The goal is to broaden thinking and possibilities for new members and answer questions as to who is eligible for membership and where to look for new members.

"An active member shall be a woman who is employed as a professional educator at the time of her election or has been retired from an educational position." (International Constitution)

- EMPLOYED is defined as currently hired by an employer and/or paid a salary or fee for specific educational services.
- **PROFESSIONAL EDUCATOR** is interpreted to include one-to-one and/or group instruction. The chapter decides if a prospective member is classified as a professional educator.
- CERTIFICATION or LICENSURE is not required.

It is the chapter's decision as to who is invited to membership.

WHO will be YOUR chapter's new members, and WHERE will you find them?

WHO?

<u>Traditional educational positions?</u> (CHECK QUALIFICATIONS)

- Educational co-workers from all levels of educational positions: classroom teachers, supervisors, administrators, superintendents, college adjunct professors, professors, department heads, administrators, educational program administrators, etc.
- School counselors, librarians, media specialists, school nurses, local/state/national departments of education employees who provide educational services, paraprofessionals and instructional aides.
- Educators associated with private/charter/trade schools.

Non-Traditional educational positions? (CHECK QUALIFICATIONS)

 Private tutors (educational/dance/drama/music/painting, health program trainers), public librarians, church-school education department leaders, corporate trainers, registered nurses who present educational programs, district/state/national teacher training educators, consultants, seminar leaders, etc...

WHO are others??? Keep the list going...

WHERE?

• Contacts within public/private schools, community colleges, universities, international schools, district service centers, alternative schools, professional development meetings and training centers, and various other facilities. Attend and connect with potential members at board of education activities, educational conferences, conventions, hospital programs with educational emphasis, public workshops, recreation programs, senior citizen centers/facilities with instructional activities, and social and community events, such as health and wellness programs.

Anywhere: Look for possibilities of finding great potential members who meet membership requirements anywhere!

Keep looking, and locating new members for your chapter. Diversity of Membership will give us more "Pride in the Big Picture" as we reach out to both traditional and non-traditional prospective new members who together will impact excellence in education worldwide in a variety of ways...

Ruth M. Johnson

Ruth, an Epsilon member since 1959, taught first grade in Kalamazoo for many years and is fondly remembered by the son of one of the Epsilon members as his wonderful teacher. From her birthplace in Greencastle, Missouri, she eventually moved to Michigan where she lived and worked in the Kalamazoo area. She spent her last years living in Overland Park, Kansas near family members.

Though she was born in Chillocothe, Ohio and maintained many contacts throughout that state, our Kappa sister enriched the Detroit area for most of her life. She received her BA and MA from the U of M in 1984 and 1986 respectively, received a second Master's degree and was not only still teaching English at Southeastern HS of Technology in Detroit, but also working on her PHD at the time of her passing. A wife, mother, grandmother, and ,of course, teacher, Beverly filled her life with helping others and bringing the joy of learning and reading to countless students—at Pershing, Northwestern and Southeastern high schools in Detroit, Sunday School at Temple Baptist and New Life Baptist churches for countless years, at youth camps, at vacation Bible school groups, as well as, to friends, family and any and all who needed help. Whether it was babysitting for her niece so that her sister could attend nursing school and later on helping that same niece attain her own educational degree or helping, with support and love, a colleague she barely knew who was struggling though difficult times, building and maintaining that relationship even after changing schools, Beverly embodied what is truly important in life. This creative, conscientious, hardworking, intelligent civic -minded woman belonged to the Farwest Civic Association for 20+ years, Pi Lamba Theta (International Honor Society, Gamma Iota Chapter), Beta Sigma Pi, as well as, DKG, Kappa Chapter, where she served first on the Nominations Committee and then on Professional Affairs from 2000 - 2011 organizing a Professional Affairs meeting at the DIA in 2010. As part of her creative legacy, she served as the founding director of Temple Baptist Church's Muppet Ministry beginning in 1973, creating a muppet pattern and holding numerous workshops on muppet construction, all to reach, help, teach, and instill a love of learning about all aspects of life in the children to whom she devoted so much of her life. We all share in her family and Kappa's loss.

GUIDELINES FOR CHAPTER RECORDS MANAGEMENT Do Not Lose Chapter History

Chapter Should Keep:

- Chapter Minutes: These are most often kept by the chapter recording secretary. They are a month-by-month account of what your chapter is doing. They will be used by your Bylaws committee when any updating of the bylaws takes place. They will be used by the History committee when they are working on updating your chapter's history.
- Chapter Bylaws /Standing Rules (current edition): Past bylaws could be used by the History committee when updating your chapter's history.
- Chapter Yearbook:-Keeping your chapter's yearbooks is essential for: recording the chapter's history including chapter officers through the years, a record of new members, Chapter Women of Distinction, Friend of Education, names of charter members,; completing Form 6 upon the passing of a chapter member; and ideas for programs, etc.
- Copies of all previous Presidents' Reports and reports for the **previous** biennium, this includes communication from International and state.
- Correspondence that is of a permanent nature (this can be decided by the
- Robert's Rules of Order (11th edition) and those items required by state 6 documents and Chapter Rules.
- Chapter newsletters that can be used for keeping your chapter's history up-to-date.

Discard:

- All outdated manuals, forms, and brochures (unless of historical interest).
- Correspondence that has been evaluated and found of no permanent value.
- Copies of reports from the previous biennium (with the exception of those 3. reports from the Chapter President and Treasurer).
- Those materials prior to the preceding biennium that are found to have no historical value.

Scholarships and Grants



Are you working on a graduate degree, retraining or seeking an additional endorsement on your teaching certificate? Perhaps you should consider applying for an Alpha Iota State Scholarship.

Award applications for the \$500 Seminar for Purposeful Living (The Capital Experience) is available on the International Website, and are due April 1, 2012.

The Lucile Cornetet Award is granted to educators for the purpose of participating in professional seminars, workshops, and other non-degree programs that relate to an educator's professional aspirations. The Cornetet Award is granted three times per year: February 1st, May 1st, September 1st. This application is available online. at the International website at www.dkg.org. You can apply up to 6 months ahead. Awards vary and will pay registration, travel, meals etc.

Alpha Iota State offers scholarships for educators who are working on a graduate degree, retraining, or an additional endorsement in education. Scholarship applications need to be submitted by February 1st. A plan of study and proof of acceptance at a college/university is required.

Two \$1,000 scholarships, two \$500 scholarships for retraining or additional endorsements, and one \$800 scholarship for graduate study may be awarded at the Spring Convention. Forms and information are available on the Alpha Iota Website: www.deltakappagamma.org/MI



Alpha Iota State Supports Chapters' Friend of Education Award

The Friend of Education Award recognizes persons or groups who have given outstanding support and note-worthy service to education in Michigan.

The Friend of Education Award may be given by any chapter to an individual or community group that the chapter deems worthy of such recognition. Chapters have the autonomy in determining who is to receive the award and how the award will be presented. It is totally up to the chapter – to establish criteria, to nominate, to confirm, and to present. Alpha Iota State supports your chapter's award by providing The Friend of Education certificate with a seal, thus confirming the award at the state level. The chapter determines who, when, how, why, and how many Friend of Education awards will be given.

Guidelines for Friend of Education Certificate

- 1. The recipient should not currently be an educator or working in education.
- 2. The support of education by individuals or groups that have an ongoing presence in your community may be awarded.

Awarding the Friend of Education Certificate

- 1. Certificates may be awarded in whatever manner you deem suitable...at a chapter or public meeting, special awards ceremony or other educational function. Education Recognition Week might be appropriate.
- 2. Encourage press coverage by arranging for it before the event and sending a press release to your local paper. (Please send copy to state DKG.)
- 3. Send the report form to the Alpha Iota State 2nd Vice-President who is responsible for the awards and a professionally prepared award certificate will be sent for your presentation or you may request a blank certificate and have someone neatly write the name of the person or organization honored chapter name and date on the certificate. The chapter president also signs the certificate.

Communicate to the World thru Press Releases

Are you trying to increase the membership in your chapter? Do you have an exciting program coming up that you'd like to invite others to attend? Are you proud of the service your chapter provides to others?

Are you honoring others as a "Friend of Education", chapter "Woman of Distinction", or initiating new members? You may want to get the news out to the general public through a press release.

A press release is a news story written in third person, that seeks to demonstrate the newsworthiness of a person, event or service. It can be sent to an editor by fax, e-mail or snail mail and involves some simple steps to write.

- First, decide why you are writing the press release and determine your focus. Remember that an editor is looking for a story that will be interesting to his readers.
- 2. At the top left hand side of the page, write "FOR IMMEDIATE RELEASE."
- 3. Provide contact information: Individual to contact, address, phone, e-mail, and website information, if available.
- 4. Write a Headline that is brief, clear, and to the point. (Not a repeat of the first sentence.)
- Make sure the first paragraph includes all the vital information: the where, when, why, what, who and how.
- 6. The rest of the body of the article should build the news by elaborating on the opening paragraph, but should avoid long sentences and paragraphs. Avoid repetition. This could be the place where you tell some additional information about DKG. DKG is not a sorority, but an international organization of key women educators, promoting excellence in education world-wide.
- 7. Wrap up the last paragraph with a "for additional information" line, a place to find more details. You may want to include our international web site address here.
- 8. Center these marks, "# # #" at the bottom of the page to indicate the end of your release.
- 9. Provide an action photo, when possible.







Therapy Dogs - Sharing Smiles and Joy



Did you ever have a desire to train a therapy dog? Barb Marshall, Gamma Gamma chapter member and retired math teacher from Plymouth-Canton School

District, will give you lots of information and answer your questions about what it takes to train your dog to become a therapy dog. As an educator, YOU already have the skills required to "teach" a dog to become a therapy dog! Barb will be accompanied by her 6-year-old black lab, Sable. Barb and Sable trained to become a registered therapy dog team after Barb retired and they have been sharing smiles and bringing joy to people in the hospital and retirement communities since June, 2011. Therapy dogs are often used in the classroom, especially in classes where there are special need or atrisk students. It is important for all students to understand WHY the dog is used and it is important for the teacher to reinforce appropriate behavior of the students when around the dog. It is an amazing educational experience for all, and it can teach responsible behavior of the students and respect for dogs and what they are trained to do. A discussion of therapy dogs and service dogs could follow in the classroom and lead to follow -up reports and investigation into the different types of therapy and service dogs there are. Perhaps a field trip to a training center (i.e. Leader dogs for the Blind, etc) might follow. Dogs can also be an amazingly calming force for hyperactive students and are used in reading programs as well. SB-CEU


