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### MICHIGAN RECEIVES CORNETET AWARD

Michigan is one of three states to receive the Lucille Cornetet Seminar for Professional Development Award from The Delta Kappa Gamma Educational Foundation.

The Michigan award is for "Sticks and Stones -Leadership Seminar on Bullying." The goal of the March 2013 event is to join the effort on stopping and preventing bullying. Michigan is among the 49 states that have anti-bullying legislation. Educators know that bullying affects student's academic and social success.



On March 9, 2013, the Alpha Iota State Leadership Development Committee will present a seminar on bullying for DKG members and non-members. Today, educators are professionally and legally responsible for stopping and preventing bullying. Bullying affects a student's ability to focus on learning and to succeed in the classroom and beyond. Michigan teachers are engaged in proactive, innovative, and educationally sound strategies to prevent bullying. Our seminar will deal with varied aspects of bullying and prevention strategies. Four speakers will provide key information about bullying, cyber bullying, self-esteem, and "Empathy For All" while describing how schools, community organizations, and parents can create safe, healthy environments.

Registration is open to the first 100 members and non-members that apply. Participants can earn four state board certified continuing education units.

# White Roses in Memoriam

### Mary Ann Elizabeth Seidl, Beta Sigma Chapter

Born in Chicago, our Beta Sigma sister grew up in that area and graduated from Maria Immaculate Academy in Wilmette before going on to attend De Paul University, receiving her BA in Philosophy in 1958 and MA in 1968. During her 38 year teaching career, Mary Ann taught in six states: Minnesota, Michigan, Louisiana, Ohio, Illinois and Iowa. Our multitalented sister taught all grades 1-12 during this time but felt her last fifteen years teaching English and Journalism at Menominee HS before retiring were probably her best. Mary Ann served as advisor to both the school's yearbook and newspaper, the Maroon News. It was also at MHS that she was granted her Lifetime Michigan Teachers' Certificate. Among her many accolades were the Michigan Golden Pen Award (Journalism), the Rotary Paul Harris Fellowship, the Mrs. Federation Award and the Spark Plug Award from her Women's Club. After retirement, her love for the field and the students kept her involved in education. She subbed for her district, as well as, teaching homebound students, Catechism and handwriting skills. Besides being a wife, mom and teacher, Mary Ann was active in her community, both as a worker and in leadership roles. She served as President of Holy Spirit Apostate, the Menominee Study Club, Beta Sigma Chapter of DKG, and GFWC Menominee Women's Člub, as well as, Michigan State Regent and other state offices of the Daughters of Isabella. The American Legion Auxiliary, MI State Grange, Menominee Area Retired School Personnel, St. Ann Sodality, the Legion of Mary, the Menominee County Historical Society, as well as her church. benefited from her hard work and generosity in inumerable ways. Initiated into membership with Delta Chapter, she went on to become a charter member of her new chapter, Beta Sigma, in 1972. She served her new chapter by holding offices, chairmanships and was President from 1978-1980. She served Alpha Iota State as a Second Vice-president.

### Florence M Lightfoot, Beta Xi

A native Detroiter, Florence lived in Grosse Pointe Woods most of her life. She started her post HS career at Albion College, graduating with a BS in Psychology followed by her MA in Education at Wayne State University. She soon headed a bit west to the Chicago area where she did graduate work in Speech Pathology at Northwestern University to become a specialist in the area. During this time, she added the Northwestern Wildcats to her sports favorites to go along with her beloved Detroit Tigers! Her teaching career included two years in Benton Harbor, two years supervising student teachers while at Northwestern, and the Grosse Pointe Public Schools where she was a Speech Pathologist from 1963 until her retirement in 1990. During her career and after, Florence enjoyed traveling, especially with her daughter and later with her grandson, as well as, with friends and other teachers. She spent time touring in Europe, China, Panama and the Canal. An avid reader and

knitter, she belonged to a knitting group at the Grosse Pointe Congregational Church where she was an active member. Florence did volunteer work in various classrooms after retirement and was a docent for the Grosse Pointe Historical Society. Initiated in 1969, she was a charter member of Beta Xi. Florence loved the fellowship she found in DKG and treasured the lifelong friends she made. Her daughter remembers her talking about her going with DKG sisters to the Women in the Arts Weekend that she truly enjoyed, on more than one occasion. She was an enthusiastic and hardworking member of many committees within Beta Xi, always working to help her chapter reach its goals. Florence especially enjoyed her work on the Scholarship Committee and Christmas auctions helping raise scholarship funds for Grosse Pointe girls graduating from high school and going on to study Education.

### Faye E. Dykstra, Beta Sigma Chapter

A charter member of Beta Sigma, Faye called the Upper Peninsula home! Born in Kingsford just across the Menominee River from Wisconsin, she grew up there going on to graduate from Kingsford HS in 1942. By 1951 she had graduated from Marquette's Northern Michigan University with a BA in Teaching and in 1967 received her MA in Education from the same university. She began teaching in Foster City, continued on in Gwinn and Ironwood before settling in Iron Mountain where she taught for 35 years before her retirement in 1986. Faye devoted much of her life to her students, earning the nickname of Dynamite Dykstra, a no-nonsense teacher who expected a lot from her students and made sure she was there to guide them on their educational journey. Outside the classroom, Faye, an avid reader and seamstress, also loved baseball and traveling. Her Beta Sigma sisters remember Faye bringing home various items from her trips to Europe that she would donate for the auction at our DKG state conventions. In addition, Faye served Beta Sigma as President from 1976-1978 and, was treasurer for 24 years. Fave was extremely involved in her community. An active member of her Baptist Church, she served on the Mission Committee, taught Sunday school, helped at Vacation Bible School and with the AWANA Children's Club. She was an enthusiastic member of the church choir and was a familiar face as a longtime volunteer at Dickinson County Memorial Hospital. Besides DKG, Faye belonged to AAUW, Iron Mountain-Kingsford Christian Women's Club, Iron Mountain-Kingsford GFWC, and MARSP. Faye left quite a mark on this world during her 88 years here.

### Sharon L. Kostelecky, Beta Sigma Chapter



During her 33 years with the Marinette Public Schools, she continued her education at various universities, receiving her MA in English Ed. in 1983. Marinette students in grades 8-12, in all areas of English, including AP, benefited from her expertise. A Department Chair for 5 years, Debate Coach for 5 years, Newspaper Advisor for 7 years and Yearbook Advisor for 10, she also worked for students though DKG via chapter fundraisers and the Scholarship Committee. She was extremely active with the Marinette EA as an officer and member on many committees, was a representative on the ONE Uniserve Council, was a member of the WI and National Council of Teachers of English and presented at the national convention. She was a member of AARP and an active volunteer at her district congressional campaign office and in other political arenas. Besides her focus on students, she devoted much time to her family and friends, being loyal and generous, as well as, a non-judgmental listener who was willing to give of her time and energy to all. Our Beta Sigma sister also loved reading (belonging to

various book clubs), writing, playing board games, doing crosswords, traveling though the USA, Canada and Europe, water walking, swimming and investigating local history. **Chapter Communications** 

To quote the *Go-To Guide* for Chapter Members (found on the International website for free download), "Effective communication at the **chapter level** is one of the keys to a member's satisfaction and a non-member's

knowledge of and attraction to Delta Kappa Gamma."

There are many options available for increasing that communication. Here are a few suggestions.

- Set up and maintain a **website**. There will be a session offered at the state spring conference on this. Help is also available on the International Website. Click on Committees, then Communications and Publicity, and then Using **weebly.com**. The website can be the first place members go to find out any and all information about their chapter. It can also reduce expenses for your chapter. Newsletters and yearbooks can be posted on the website to reduce printing and mailing expenses.
- Publish a **Chapter Newsletter**. Guidelines for completing a quality newsletter may be found on the State Website. Click on Committees and then Communications. Awards are given each year for newsletters sent in to the state. The newsletter will keep members apprised of what is going on in the chapter, meeting dates and times, member news, and recognition of members' achievements.
- Publish a **Yearbook**. Guidelines for yearbooks are also found on the state website. Click on Yearbook and then Yearbook Evaluation Form. Awards are also given each year for yearbooks submitted to the state.
- Create an **address book**. Although the yearbook contains all the membership information, a small address book that can fit easily in a purse with chapter member contact information, website addresses, meeting dates and times, and committees will make the information easily accessible to members.
- Print up **refrigerator magnets** with meeting dates, places and times so it is readily available to members.
- Establish a **phone tree** for quickly communicating important news to all your members. This can be especially important if it is necessary to cancel a meeting due to weather, and you're not sure members will be accessing their e-mail on short notice.
- Form a **courtesy committee** that will communicate a caring, nurturing attitude toward members. They can responsible for mailing birthday cards, get well cards, and checking on members who no longer get out often; sometimes offering rides to the meetings. **E-cards** are another avenue these members may use.

Set up a Facebook account so your members can network.

- Set up a **separate contact list** of chapter members on your computer so news may easily be sent to all e-mail members. Sending newsletters in this way can save your chapter printing and mailing expenses.
- For members without computers, the use of **mailing labels** can save time when mailing out newsletters.

### **Guidelines For Chapter Records Management 2013 Do Not Lose Chapter History**

### **Chapter Should Keep**:

- Chapter Minutes: These are most often kept by the ٠ chapter recording secretary. They are a month-by-month account of what your chapter is doing, including meeting attendance. They will be used by your Bylaws committee when any updating of the bylaws takes place. They will be used by the History committee when working to update your chapter's history.
- Chapter Bylaws /Standing Rules: (current edition). Past ٠ bylaws could be used by the History committee when updating your chapter's history.
- Chapter Yearbook: Keeping your chapter's yearbooks ٠ are essential for recording the chapter's history (chapter officers through the years, a record of new members, Chapter Women of Distinction, Friend of Education, names of charter members, etc.); completing Form 6 upon the passing a chapter member; ideas for programs, etc. If saved on a CD please send a copy to the State History Committee.
- Copies of all previous Presidents' Reports and reports ٠ from the **previous** biennium This includes communication from International and state.
- **Correspondence** that is of a permanent nature. This can be ٠ decided by the chapter.
- Robert's Rules of Order (11<sup>th</sup> edition) and items required ٠ by state documents and Chapter Rules.
- Chapter newsletters that can be used for keeping your ۲ chapter's history up-to-date.

### Discard:


- All outdated manuals, forms, and brochures (unless of ٠ historical interest).
- Correspondence that has been evaluated and found of no ٠ permanent value.
- Copies of reports from the previous biennium (with the ٠ exception of those reports from the Chapter President and Treasurer).
- Those materials prior to the preceding biennium that are ٠ found to have no historical value.

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### **Oh, No! What Can We Do? A Parliamentary Moment**

Fairalee Foggy just moved that the chapter present Superintendent Bubba Bighead with a plaque commending him for outstanding leadership and service to education. Many members question the quality of Superintendent Bighead's leadership and service, but you believe it is unwise for the chapter to go on record as opposing the motion.

How can you help the chapter dispose of this embarrassing motion without voting on it? *Robert's* gives three answers:

- 1. You can rise immediately, <u>before the chair states the question</u>, and say, "I object to the consideration of the question." If at least two-thirds of the members vote not to consider the question, it is dismissed without a vote for the remainder of the session (RONR (11<sup>th</sup> ed.), pp. 267-70).
- 2. If the chair has already stated the motion, you can rise and, when recognized, say, "I move to postpone the question <u>indefinitely</u>." If the majority votes to postpone the question indefinitely, it dies without a vote for the remainder of the session (RONR (11<sup>th</sup> ed.), pp. 126-30).
- 3. In debate, you can speak against the motion, express your concerns about voting on it, and urge Ms. Foggy to withdraw her motion. If she agrees and the chapter allows her to withdraw the motion, either by unanimous consent or a majority vote, it can be withdrawn without a vote (RONR (11<sup>th</sup> ed.), pp. 295-97).

**Note,** however, it is <u>not</u> appropriate to try to kill or to avoid voting on the motion by moving to lay it on the table. "The motion to *Lay of the Table* is not in order if the evident intent is to kill or avoid dealing with a measure" (RONR  $(11^{\text{th}} \text{ ed.})$ , p. 210, ll. 10-11).

Also, anyone can re-introduce the motion at a future session, if she chooses to do so.

Members of elected committees of The Delta Kappa Gamma Educational Foundation should have chapter and state organization experience in the areas for which they are seeking nomination. There are other requirements, as well, which can be located on the nomination information found on the Delta Kappa Gamma Members of the Nomination Committee – one web site. member from each region - will serve for four years. Members of the Finance Committee - two nominees - will serve a four year term.

An Alpha Iota State member who is considering a nomination for an International Position in the Society, and is interested in State support, will need to submit a Letter of Intent and Interest, to the Chairman of the Nomination committee by April 1, 2013. An individual may, of course, always submit own materials and seek nomination support from other individuals or chapters.
