Margaret Masteller - Beta Alpha

Margaret "Meg" Masteller, a Tracy, Minnesota native, graduated from Tracy High School, St. Cloud State University and Northwestern University. After teaching Second Grade for three years in Minnesota, she married and moved to Michigan where she spent 22 years teaching music in the Lakeview School District of Battle Creek, retiring in 1985. An active member of Beta Alpha for almost 33 years, Meg served on several chapter committees, as well as the State Music Committee. Besides her focus on her family and education, she was a member of her church council and many **committees**, as well as singing in the choir. November 30, 1924-January 10, 2010

Kaye A. Clarke - Alpha Tau

Born in Sault Ste. Marie, Kaye graduated from Tahquamenon Area Schools, attended Michigan State University and received her BA from Northern Michigan University. After her marriage she taught school in Skandia, Strongs, Trout Lake and Brimley where, when she retired, she was the Special Programs Coordinator. Through her efforts, the Brimley Area Schools became a leader in using technology to improve education. As her sisters in Alpha Tau have said, this 27 year member was always on the go and ready to tackle anything. Besides chairing several committees, she enjoyed coming to meetings, being with friends and sharing herself and her experiences. This avid reader, people person and animal lover served as Chippewa Township Clerk. She was active in DKG and in her church. Kaye was a War Memorial Hospital volunteer and served in 4-H, United Way, Chippewa Lions Club, Eastern Star, Alpha Beta Kappa Sorority, and MARSP. And was an EMT for the Hulbert Chippewa Township Ambulance Corps.

November 22, 1942 - February 14, 2010

Alice H. Gernant-Epsilon

A lifelong resident of Kalamazoo, Alice graduated from Central High School, earned her bachelor's degree at Western Michigan University (then Western State Teachers College) followed by her master's degree at the University of Michigan in 1945. Starting in the Fennville Public Schools in 1941, she taught music to elementary students for 38 years until retiring from the Kalamazoo Public Schools. She also taught music methods in WMU's Music of Retired School Personnel, participated in the Music Educators National Conference, Michigan and National Education Associations, Community Concert Association, the Thursday Morning Musicale, and the Committee to Save the East Campus. She loved to read, attend the theater and travel with her sister.

September 10, 1921-March 13, 2010

Edith A. Ash - Gamma

Born in Osseo, Edith graduated from Osseo High School in 1932, Hillsdale College in 1936, and taught high school English, French, and history in several Hillsdale County schools including Allen, North Adams and Reading. Edith's passions in life were love for her family; learning and teaching anything in the humanities, including English language arts, music, French and history; genealogy; traveling and farming. In her retirement she focused on genealogy, writing many of the biographical pieces about people with roots in Hillsdale County found in Volumes I and II of "150 Years in the Hills and Dales" in 1976, as well as a family genealogy book, "The Reynolds Pioneering Chronicles: New York and Southern Michigan" (1995), collaborating with her cousin Gay Wojtowicz. Monographs Edith published include: "Michigan Literary Landmarks Monograph One: A Literary History of Mackinac Island" (1973); "Lingering Shadows of the Fleur De Lis" (1975); "Wafting Winds of the Revolution in Michigan Literature" (1976) and "Miss Big Fiddle: The Saga of Burky of Superior View Lodge at Deer Park, Michigan" (1980). Edith also played piano and organ for her church, was a lifelong member of her college music sorority, Sigma Alpha Iota at Hillsdale College and actively participated in the Hillsdale County Historical Society. Initiated into Gamma Chapter of DKG in 1961, Edith served on various committees and remained an active member of the Society for nearly 50 years.

April 16, 1915-April 1, 2010

Mildred J. Godfrey-Alpha Xi

Born in Spratt, MI on her mother's family farm, Mildred eventually attended Hillman High School, graduated from Montmorency County Normal and received her BA degree from Central Michigan University. She then married and, with her husband, began raising their family. Mildred taught school for 38 years, first in many Montmorency County one-room schools and later in elementary schools in Hillman. Initiated as an honorary member into Alpha Xi chapter of Delta Kappa Gamma, she was part of the society for almost 18 years. She and her husband Don had the Don Godfrey Orchestra, playing at many events throughout the area. A member of MARSP and of the VFW #2356 Women's Auxiliary, she was a musician for the State and Regional VFW Auxiliary, as well as being the organist at St. Augustine Catholic Church for over 40 years. February 22, 1923 - March 30, 2010

Elizabeth M. Higbee - Omega

A Detroit native and Charter member of Omega Chapter, Elizabeth "Betty" M. Higbee obtained her Bachelor and Master's in Education from Wayne State University in Detroit. In 1952 she was a charter member of Omega Chapter, serving as its first president. She served at the state level as Recording Secretary and Membership Chair. An active chapter member, she later served as 1st Vicepresident, Membership Chair, and on other committees during her 58 years with DKG. She will certainly be missed in the Mt. Clemens School District where, for 40 years, she taught all subjects K-8 and served as a school administrator at Alexander Macomb School, retiring in 1982. As a lifelong member of First United Methodist Church in Mount Clemens, she was active with the Altar Guild. An ardent volunteer, she served on the Macomb County Board of Family Services and at Mt. Clemens General Hospital. Her nephew was quoted as saying "She was dedicated to helping others, it was never about herself." A co-worker lauded Betty for teaching her all the good things about teaching and taking care of the whole child, one of many glowing tributes to this fine woman. A generous contributor to causes she believed in, Betty was a supporter of over forty different charities. March 7, 1919—April 15, 2010

Nancy Langs Ticknor - Alpha Zeta

Born in her grandmother's house on Elk Street, Nancy Langs Ticknor graduated in the January 1955 class of Port Huron High School. She then attended Port Huron Junior College and Eastern Michigan University graduating with a Bachelor's and Master's in Education and Library Science. Nancy was an elementary school teacher and middle school librarian in the Port Huron Area Schools for many years. She joined Alpha Zeta in 1989 and was an active and dedicated member, serving on World Fellowship and Legislative committees. Nancy and her husband of over 50 years battled her scleroderma for forty years with the support of their daughters, and other family, co-workers and friends, as well as members of their church. Among her many tributes, one woman, now the Head of Reference Services at the University of Arkansas, credited Nancy and two other women as the reasons for her choosing to become a librarian.

Guidelines for Nominations to State Offices and the State Nominations Committee

The following are suggested guidelines for considering a member for nomination.

- 1. Individual members or chapters may recommend a candidate.
- 2. The first and second vice-presidents do not automatically advance to the presidency.
- 3. All regions of the state will be considered.
- 4. The state president nominee is given the opportunity to select a corresponding secretary.
- 5. As a rule, we do not re-elect to the same office.
- 6. Nominees for state office should have served as chapter officers and/or committee chairpersons.
- 7. A nominee for state president should
 - a. have served as a chapter president
 - b. have had state committee or officer experience
 - c. be familiar with the work of the State Executive Board
 - d. have attended state and regional meetings
 - e. have organizational skills, good speaking skills, and have time to devote to the Society
- 8. The state Nominations Committee is composed of one member from each area of the state and includes the following:
 - a. a past state president
 - b. a past chapter president
 - c. a current chapter president
 - d. two members-at-large, one of whom has state level experience
- 9. Recommendations for a nomination should have chapter approval.
- 10. Only one form per nominee should be submitted. Support letters will not be considered.

Communications Committee Presents Chapter Newsletter Awards

Margaret Meehan, Beta Rho, Communications Chair

The purpose of evaluation is to help chapters become more effective communicators. Four readers read every newsletter and scored them on a 28 point scale. "Great teachers make an incalculable impact on the lives of our children," said Governor Jennifer M. Granholm. "We honor Rob not only because he's a great teacher but also to recognize the tremendous contribution that dedicated teachers are making in classrooms across our state."

Mr. Robert Stephenson, is a third grade teacher at Wardcliff Elementary School in Okemos Public Schools. Parents and colleagues hold Stephenson in high regard as do we members of Alpha Iota State.



The Alpha Rho chapter of Delta Kappa Gamma is a group of women whose members embrace the mission of DKG. They are tireless volunteers in supporting many community and worldwide efforts through their work.

One of their members saw an article about the Little Dresses for

Africa project (www.littledressesforafrica.org) and thought, "I can do this. I can sew a little dress." The consequences of that thought have been far greater than just dresses. She sewed some dresses and then she asked members of DKG and her friends to join her in sewing.

This project evolved into a once a month event with some members sewing, some donating material and trims and some packing the

finished dresses to be sent to Africa. Alpha Rho invited Rachel O'Neill, founder of Little Dresses For Africa, to join them at their spring 2009 meeting where she presented information about the project and her efforts on behalf of little girls in Africa. Since that initial donation of 60 dresses, we have donated 1200 dresses from DKG and 900 from "friends". This does not include the 200 plus pairs of britches for boys that have been donated. We have also had generous donations of money, fabric and materials.

Gladys Grieger Appointed to U.S.Department of Education Steering Committee

Gladys Grieger of St. Joseph, a member of Rho Chapter, Alpha Iota State, was recommended by colleagues at Northwestern University and appointed in 2009 to the United States Department of Education Steering Committee. This committee consists of fifteen members from all over the United States and meets in Washington, D.C., with United States Secretary of Education Arne Duncan presiding. The purpose of the committee is to give an overview to Duncan, who has never taught in the classroom, on the country's educational

future. Gladys's input on how children learn has been especially important. She is very concerned that current kindergarten curricula overdo academics for this age child. She has spoken out against charter schools, because they lack government supervision. Many areas of education have been discussed by the committee, including the importance of science education and university-level teacher training.

Gladys holds a Bachelor of Science degree in education from Northern Illinois University, where she was president of Delta Sigma Epsilon, a local social sorority, and a member of Orchesis, the campus interpretive dance group. She earned a master's degree plus thirty additional hours of graduate work in child development from Northwestern University. Other graduate work includes a summer term at the University of Minnesota. She was sent by her school board to the University of London in the summer of 1972 to study the open classroom concept.

Her teaching career includes four years in River Forest, Illinois; five years in St. Joseph, Michigan; and thirty-two years in Glencoe, Illinois, the district from which she retired. She taught kindergarten for seven years, fourth grade for one year, and first and second grades the rest of the time. In addition, she taught classes on human growth and development at Northwestern University for many years, and a summer course in human growth and development at Malcassar College in Austria in 1996.

Gladys first joined Delta Kappa Gamma in 1967 in Illinois. She has chaired numerous chapter committees and served as chapter president for four years. She has attended state conventions and five Delta Kappa Gamma international conventions.

Gladys is also a member of Friends of the (St. Joseph) Library and of the Berrien County Democratic Women, who selected her as Woman of the Year for 2009.

She has traveled in northern Africa, South Africa, Europe, and South America, plus participating in a Northern Illinois University study tour around the world, which visited thirty-two countries and studing child development as related to nutrition.

Beta Theta Honors Mr. Al Oshinsky

Oshinsky recently was presented the Friend of with Award by Education members of the Beta Theta Chapter of Delta Kappa Gamma Society International. Barbara Coscarelly, president of local chapter, the recently reported to the state and international organization on work of the chapter.

The organization is a professional honor society for women educators with more than 115, 000 members. "We promote the professional and personal growth of women educators and excellence in education," Coscarelly said. "We are one of 65 chapters in the State, and, with this award, we honor someone not currently employed as an educator who provides support to the education of young people in our community. This award is a way for us to recognize and honor someone like Al who is a worthy recipient."

The award was presented at a chapter dinner meeting in April. Al Oshinsky, known to thousands of students as Mr. "O," is a cancer survivor and retired teacher and coach. He was in the Wyandotte school system for 36 years teaching elementary physical education, counseling, teaching Social Studies, and coaching baseball and football in the Junior High and High School. Diagnosed with cancer of the throat, the removal of his larynx meant learning how to talk using a device he holds at his neck. Never a smoker, for the last 15 years he has been going to schools to talk to students about the hazards of tobacco and second hand smoke. His message reaches 4,000-5,000 students in fifth through twelfth grades each year at the dozens of schools that he visits.

His dedication to this work brings him no financial reimbursement. Saving the life of just one student, he says, is all the reimbursement he hopes to receive. He also has talked to hospital patients who deal with the aftermath of similar surgeries.

Members of Delta Kappa Gamma thanked Mr. Oshinsky for his ongoing presence in the community in supporting the educational needs of children and truly being a "Friend of Education."
