Marlene Veldheer, Beta Omega Chapter Alpha Iota State President (1991-1993)



Alpha Iota State sisters remember fondly and with great appreciation our Past State President, Marlene, who served us in so many ways and was a role model for us all. For 41 years, our sister, a Charter Member of Beta Omicron, was a welcoming, gracious presence, a leader and a willing, dedicated volunteer. Honored by her chapter twice as Chapter Woman of Distinction, she served on many committees, was Chapter President, and was Yearbook Editor for many years.

She also served on many state level committees, represented her chapter and state at many state conventions and N.E. Regionals, as well as, International Conventions and Seminars. We DKG sisters were proud to have her as State Second Vice-President, First Vice-President and then as State President before honoring her as State Woman of Distinction in 1996. Her DKG sisters remember her laugh, her smile, how much fun she was to be around, her love of life, family, friends, and of course, her dedication to students and fellow staff members from East Elementary of the Grandville Public Schools. A long time member of the North Holland Reformed Church, Marlene loved the camaraderie she felt singing with the Women's All Church Choir and the fellowship she found there. A kind, happy, positive and upbeat woman, dedicated to her students, proud of her family, the Holland community, and their work with flowers, a hard-working and giving presence, Marlene will be missed by so many!

December 24, 1936 - June 7, 2012

Dorothy Irene Ferris, Alpha Lambda Chapter

A native of DeWitt, Michigan, our Alpha Lambda sister spent much of her life in the Mason, MI area. After graduating from County Normal Teachers' College, Dorothy divided her time between her family and serving as a Middle School Librarian for Mason Public Schools where she worked for 22 years before retiring. A world traveler, she was also quite active in the First United Methodist Church and the Mason Historical Society. At school and in the community, she was always helping with research projects and genealogy searches through the Mason Historical Museum. Her DKG sisters benefitted from her many presentations on a variety of books and authors, as well as, from programs about her travels and about the Mason Historical Society. She is warmly remembered by students, friends and family for her friendliness, hard work and intelligence. All in all, Dorothy was a kind, gentle, awesome woman who will continue to be remembered for all that she did for others and who will continue to help young people via the Promise Scholarship established in her name.



Betty F. Greiner, Omega Chapter

Betty was born in Howell, MI at the end of WW1. She chose teaching as her career path and taught for 30 years in the Mt. Clemens Public Schools while raising her family along with her husband. She joined Omega Chapter of DKG in 1978 and was also active in Our Lady's Circle at St. Louis Parish in Mt. Clemens. Betty volunteered her time at the Mt. Clemens Art Center and at St. Joseph Hospital in addition to ushering at the Fox and other Detroit theaters. Betty loved traveling the world with Nomads and spending time in Florida, especially in Indialantic where she had lived in the winter for twenty years before moving there recently. Our sister loved to play golf and bridge, read avidly and kept her mind sharp with her daily crosswords. She was also an excellent seamstress who enjoyed knitting and needlepoint and dearly loved spending time with her family and friends.

December 9, 1918 - July 2, 2011

Mary Ann Coffey Pospieszynski, Beta Pi Chapter

A Saginaw native, Mary Ann graduated from St. Andrew High School and went on to attend Western Michigan University graduating with a BA in Elementary Ed. Later, she earned her MA +30 from CMU. A long time educator in the Saginaw Public Schools, she is remembered and praised by many students and their families. Whether it was the many kindergartners (and their parents) who benefitted from her sunny smile, her caring and loving disposition, her kindness and inspiration or the second graders who still remember her influence on their lives more than 25 years later, Mary Ann lives on in those she taught. Her co-workers, friends, DKG sisters and her many family members will miss this "intelligent, fun-loving, energetic outspoken woman full of sparkle and laughter." After her retirement and marriage in 2004, she and her husband moved to Walloon Lake where she continued to enjoy golfing, swimming, boating, walking, gardening, traveling and, most importantly, spending time with family and friends. This busy woman, initiated in 1775, still made time to serve as Beta Pi's president from 1988 -1990, and will be missed by all.

March 6, 1946 - August 24, 2011

Faith Alway, Alpha Omicron Chapter

Born in Manistee, Michigan, Faith graduated from Columbia University with a MA in Education. A founding member of Alpha Omicron, our sister helped start the chapter in 1957 and maintained her membership until August 2011. Faith taught at Taft Elementary in Ferndale for many years. Two of her fifth grade students remember her as always being nice and being there to help where needed and for being the "kind of teacher that would take you into her home if you needed any extra help with school work, or just give you piano lessons. She really cared about her students." A longtime Ferndale resident, she belonged to the Ferndale Garden Club and Ferndale Seniors. A gift was made to the First United Methodist Church in Ferndale in her honor to support her parish family.

November 24, 1913 - August 30, 2011

Annette Steig, Alpha Omicron Chapter

Since 1969 our Alpha Omicron sister, known for her uncommon kindness, enthusiasm and optimism, drew from her own full life to instill the love of learning in more than 1,000 kindergartners and first-graders at Eastover Elementary in Bloomfield Hills for 25 years. Her generosity, civic concern and love for others will long be remembered by family, colleagues, fellow parishioners at Cross of Christ Lutheran in MI, Mount Calvary Lutheran in CO, and those top students from the "Thumb" who benefitted from the need-based tuition assistance provided by the Steig Memorial Scholarship established by Annette and her husband. In 1960, Annette, her husband and three children met the Rocky Mountains of Colorado and fell in love. Through the years, she and her family camped and hiked and backpacked throughout the west eventually building a summer home in Estes Park where she supported the library and studied the area's history, as well as, deepening her love of nature. Annette, however, never lost her loyalty to her home state, her beloved Tigers. Michigan football or to DKG.

June 19, 1927 - October 26, 2011

Mary Davros, Alpha Kappa Chapter

Born in Muskegon just before the crash of 1929, Mary lived through the Great Depression surrounded by a strong, proud American family had emigrated from Greece. Anchored by their church, the whole family pitched in to survive the hardships of the times. During the WWII years, Mary worked at a small grocery store and at her brother's store to help her family while attending Muskegon Public Schools and going on to graduate from Muskegon High. Her goal was teaching and after attending Muskegon Junior College, she worked part time as a teacher and at the store. Soon Mary met the love of her life, married and began raising her family, continuing her education, getting both a BA and MA at Western Michigan and later her Teaching Specialist Degree at U of M. As her family grew older, Mary began teaching 2nd grade full-time at Glenside Elementary, retiring in 1990 with 30 years of making sure her students, as well as, her own children benefitted from a good education and understood its value. She and her husband traveled to more than 20 countries, including many trips with their sons to show them how others lived so they could better understand and appreciate their own country, and also to visit Greece where their father had grown up. Besides enjoying her grandchildren after her retirement, our Alpha Kappa sister, initiated in 1967 and a long standing member of the Scholarship Selection Committee, stayed active in her church as a Philoptochos member and teaching Sunday school. Perhaps this captures her legacy best: "Ms. Davros was not only one of my favorite teachers but the reason I became an educator myself. She was a loving teacher who inspired her students to reach for the stars. I did my student teaching at Glenside and was so blessed to spend time with her. It was so wonderful to be able to spend time with my former 2nd grade teacher."

Susan Kheirallah, Alpha Omega Chapter

Our Alpha Omega sister's path to teaching didn't begin in the "usual" way! This brave and adventuresome woman had to get a worker's permit for her first job at age 16. During her senior year at Southwestern High, she worked at the court house running a bookkeeping machine and after graduation worked for AC Sparkplug. She left that job when she and some girlfriends went to visit a friend's aunt in England. She and one friend liked it so much that they went back to live there. After 6 months testing blinker bulbs at a Fiat factory, they returned home to Flint where Sue got a job as the second cook at the Chevrolet plant. That proved to be the impetus she needed to change career paths so she left and got her degree in Special Education at Evangel College in Missouri and later her Master's at Oakland University. In 1981, she began as a Learning Disabilities teacher at Williams Elementary where she worked for 16 years before it closed and became an Edison School. Sue first moved to Johnson Elementary and then finally to Pierce Elementary on the advice of a good friend she had met at Williams. While there she joined her DKG Chapter in 1999, serving as Chapter Secretary, making even more dear friends. Everyone at Pierce enjoyed and appreciated her skills and dedication to her students; she worked there until she retired after 29 years. Sue and her husband had great plans for retirement; her losing battle with cancer changed all that but didn't take away her bravery, faith and adventuresome spirit. Sue continued going to the arts and crafts shows and antique shops that she loved and, towards the end, in her thoughtful way, had purchased a necklace hand-painted by a DKG sister to give to her niece. Her friends and loving husband brought her joy as did the memories of how they met. their travels together. and his undying care and thoughtfulness of her whole family.

March 11, 1948 - March 17, 2012

Grace Easterly Fowler, Gamma Chapter

Our Gamma sister, initiated in April of 1966, was born on the family farm in Woodbridge Township during WWI. She attended the Bell School and later graduated from Hillsdale High School where, when their children visited with their parents years later, they were able to see where Grace and her future husband had etched their names on a classroom window. Grace went on to receive her teaching certificate from Michigan State Normal College in Ypsilanti and started her more than 40 year teaching career at Allen Township's Maple Grove School. Later she earned her Life Certificate and continued for her BA from Hillsdale College. Her students, through the years at Arkansas, Hodges, Bailey and Pittsford schools, benefitted from her commitment to providing them with a quality education and her innovation as one of the first teachers to include nature study and conservation in her classroom. Our sister Grace also led a full life outside the classroom. A talented seamstress, quilter, rug maker, gardener, canner, interior painter and renowned pie maker, Grace especially loved fishing for bluegills and planning other family activities at her family's Wilson Lake cottage. An active DKG member and an active volunteer for the Friends of

Mitchell Library, fitting for such a voracious reader, Grace was also a serious card player, belonging to the same bridge club for almost 70 years. At the end of her life, she remained her cheerful, smiling and gracious self with never a bad word to say about anyone.

July 7, 1914 - April 4, 2012

Helen B. Burns, Omicron Chapter

Would that all of us be remembered so fondly by students we had fifty years previously as is Helen! Students from all over the country, many who later became her friends through the years, praised Helen for her influence on their lives. Her students recognized that Helen's goal for them was their progress and success as good people and good citizens and she provided them with the perfect role model. Born in Charlesworth, Michigan, she graduated from Springport High School in 1936. from Ingham County Normal in 1937 and began her teaching career at the Onderdonk Country School and other country schools, one of which had so many students that she had to use the woodshed as part of her classroom to fit them all in.

She continued her education first receiving her Bachelor's in 1942 from Western Michigan and her Master's from MSU in 1960. She continued teaching first at the Leslie Public Schools, then at Trumbell Elementary in Jackson before moving on to Arnold School in Michigan Center where she taught kindergarten and later became Principal and Elementary Coordinator before retiring after 34 years of service.

Helen loved her home on Pleasant Lake and the activities and friends she had at Hankerd Hills, a golf resort area. She enjoyed traveling throughout the USA and the world with her husband, and, after retirement, spending winters in Florida. A member of Omicron Chapter since 1964, Helen also belonged to MARSP, AARP and Eastern Star New Temple Chapter 3 OES. She was a life member Michigan Elementary and Middle School Principals Association. and attended Lake Methodist Church. Throughout the years she looked forward to celebrating her birthday with a big party attended by family and friends. She loved going out to dinner and would invariably run into and chat with her old students at Bill Knapps and other local restaurants. Always a professional, she was a gentle and elegant woman.

This will be a competitive grant and the selection process and choice of recipients shall be determined by the appropriate Alpha Iota State committee.

A Parliamentary Moment



Watch What You Say:

New Language in *Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised* (11th edition)

“Request for Information” is now preferred over “Point of Information” (pp. 294-295).

The reason for the change is that members sometimes obtained the floor by calling, “Point of Information,” and then proceeded to present information rather than to ask for it. Presenting information is considered debating the question; asking for information is not.

“Is there any debate?” and “Are there any amendments?” are alternatives to “Are you ready for the question?” after the chair states a motion (pp. 38, 44, 120, 386).

“Is there any debate?” applies only if the motion itself is debatable; “Are there any amendments?” applies if the motion amendable but not debatable. At the conclusion of any debate when the chair says, “Are you ready for the question?” members who are ready should merely remain seated so the chair can put the question. If a member actually moves to call for the question, that motion requires a second and must be dealt with before the assembly can act on the substantive motion.

Legislative Committee Shares - MDE Issues Changes to Teacher Certification

On May 18, the state Department of Education (MDE) finalized the implementation of new laws relating to teacher certification. The new laws impact teachers moving from a Provisional teaching certificate to a Professional Education teaching certificate and to those teachers renewing their Professional Education certificate. Both changes are effective Sept. 1, 2013.



With the changes, teachers no longer have to complete an 18 semester-hour planned program from an approved university. Teachers will also have two more options for advancing in certification.

Now, teachers will be able to renew their Professional Education teaching certificate by submitting evidence of their participation in district-provided professional development

As a child, Gabrielle loved dance and dreamed of becoming a prima ballerina. That dream was shattered by a rare genetic neuromuscular disease, Friedreich's Ataxia, that would eventually place her in a wheelchair. Gabe not only struggled with the devastation, but endured constant and cruel bullying from classmates. However, caring for her ailing dog, Izzy, gave her something to live for and her own experiences have empowered her to speak to students, teacher groups, parents, and many other service organizations about bullying and the life-changing effects of being bullied.

She has now been speaking out for eleven years! Gabe has spoken at meetings for DKG at the chapter and the state level. In April, 2012, she was the keynoter at the Oregon State DKG Convention. She began as a volunteer speaking to students and even though Gabe now receives a fee for her speeches, she still takes time to give service including responding to students' inquiries. Her purpose is to educate individuals about school bullying and the detrimental effects associated with it. She seeks to help create a safer environment in schools and improve public welfare.

At this time when bullying is finally being recognized for what it is, Gabe Ford's impact has become more and more important across the country. She appears on television and radio programs regularly, and stories about her are penetrating our culture through national magazines and newspapers.

Penguin Publishing soon will release Gabe & Izzy's anti-bullying children's storybook. Gabe's first book, *Still Dancing*, is a rallying cry for recognizing the lifetime impact of bullying and for nurturing the self-worth of every child.

History and the Performing Arts

The complex now reflects the on-going involvement of the Muskegon area, showcasing professional touring companies, Muskegon Civic Theatre, The Westshore Symphony under the direction of Maestro Scott Speck, and displays of art. The fully functioning theater is also home to the Muskegon Civic Theatre, the Miss Michigan Pageant, and Muskegon Community Concerts. This session will enlighten participants on the subjects of architecture; showcase a part of the history of Muskegon and Michigan, and the importance of music and the performing arts to the community. *** 2 SB-CEU Units**

Professional Affairs Committee Looking for Presiders for DKG Conference



This professional development session for chapter leaders is designed to fulfill the context and process standards of leadership and collaboration. What goals do you want your chapter to accomplish this biennium? Does your chapter have a current strategic plan? When was the last time your bylaws/standing rules were updated? You will receive suggestions and sample plans on how to make your Chapter Strategic Plan a continuous, evolving chapter activity. Information regarding chapter-



standing rules will be also available. Learn what you can do to lead your chapter smoothly through the biennium and how to share the responsibilities. You will receive a list of due dates and to whom to send reports and forms. Come join us and get off to a successful start in your biennium. Bring your questions. Time will be allotted for idea exchange and solving problems. This session was designed in response to answer the questions you posed on the evaluations after the previous Leadership Training. **SB-CEU**

Legislation: The Process and the Impact

Our guest, Mr. Dave Sipka, Superintendent of Muskegon Area Intermediate School District and a former teacher, will speak about the issue of Emergency School Manager. The Alpha Iota State Legislative Committee, with chairperson Judy Foster of Upsilon chapter, will bring you up-to-date about the political happenings in Michigan and Washington. Learn how the legislation can impact students, women, education and retirees. Find out what you can do to become involved and make your voice heard. This will be a thought provoking and educational presentation with practical information on the legislative process and democracy in action. Newsletters are an excellent means of sharing information with others, whether they are chapter members, parents, students, department members, or people in clubs or organizations. As former Communications Chair and a member of the Technology Committee, Margaret knows her way around the process of creating such a document. appropriate layout formats. The session will address copyright and reprinting issues, and will offer you ideas for gathering information and articles for your newsletter. Techniques discussed can be applied to classroom newsletters, chapter news, and online news articles to share with parents and colleagues and more. While conquering her food/body image issues, Beth wrote and published *Pea Soup: Recipes for Body, Mind, and Spirit from a "Kitchen Table Gourmet,"* a feast of her favorite recipes, recipes that for years she thought she couldn't eat as part of normal life. Body image and eating issues can plague students, as well as, adults, and affects both males and females. Classroom educators, counselors, administrators and parents may see signs of this in children and young adults. There is hope and help available. Beth will share her difficult 40-year journey honestly and from the heart, hoping to encourage others toward befriending their food and being healthy and happy in their skin. **SB-CEU**

The weekend retreat at Higgins Lake Conference Center is an enjoyable time and offers participants a chance to create fun and easy make and take projects. It is also an educational approach that influences wellness and recovery skills to use and share. This approach is known as Art Therapy. This psychotherapy incorporates the production of visual art in order to understand one's feelings. This psychotherapy has dual origins. One is in the process of art-making itself, and second in the interpretation of self-expression. The purpose is essentially one of healing. There are many benefits to this approach to good health. Two of the newest benefits to using art are deferring the onset of Alzheimer's and, according to a study at Johns Hopkins, decreasing the pain of Fibromyalgia. Working in the arts can be both entertaining and beneficial to children and adults, and should be a part of every curriculum.

The Joy and Excitement of Being an Educator

Join Nancy Berkompas, member of Alpha Tau Chapter, to talk about the reason for being an educator. Nancy is a former Alpha Iota State President, Superintendent of Rudyard Schools and currently working for Bay Mills Community College as a charter school governance specialist. This workshop is an overview of Delta Kappa Gamma communications based on the biennial reports that communication chairs must fill out at the end of their biennium. It covers ways of communicating with International and State, as well as ideas for communicating with chapter members and the public. This workshop will be especially valuable to new chapter presidents and communication chairs. In addition, teachers and administrators, in communicating with their students, parents of students, departmental members and colleagues can use the techniques discussed.

10 Interesting Women: Our Sate Project and A Way to Connect

One of the International Society initiatives is to encourage teachers to stay in the profession. Alpha Iota State has selected the "10 Interesting Women Project" to help with this effort. Dr. Dorothy Sample, state project chair, and members from other chapters will explain how to effectively involve working professionals and to find ways to encourage them. Five members join together to invite five currently working

teachers and/or administrators to meet after work for a light dinner. (Smaller numbers will work as well.) Each DKG member sends a letter or email to someone *she knows* who is teaching or currently working in education and invites her to the gathering. The opening line of the letter may say, "Some other professional educators and I would like to get 10 interesting women together to share about what is happening in education today. I think you are an interesting woman and I would like to ask you to participate." The response may be surprising. There is no agenda—just sharing about educational experiences. Excellent connections are made with working professionals and DKG members may find ways to help in several ways: being grandparents for a day, providing supplies, helping teachers move, and other projects. The groups meet a couple of times a year and may continue to divide and add more DKG members and other working professionals. New DKG members may also come from the connection.

Come to learn more about the project and, if your chapter is participating in the program, please join the group to share your experiences, thoughts and successes. This could also be a model for professional development

Laughter Is the Best Medicine

It's time to release some stress by the power of laughter. Don't let the demands of everyday life and teaching drag you down. Come to listen and laugh with Heidi Sunderhaft Christiansen, currently a Middle/High School Principal at North Muskegon Public School. Hear about activities that you can use with students to lighten their day, help them relax and be receptive to learning, and ease their internal and external stress that may come from higher educational expectations, increased testing and subsequent placement and advancement in school. During this workshop strategies will be shared on how to get more laughter in your life. People of all ages, educators and students alike, will benefit from practicing the art of laughing. Participants will walk out feeling rejuvenated, refreshed and relaxed due to numerous techniques that will be shared on how to surround oneself with laughter on a daily basis.

Communications Committee Presents Chapter Newsletter Awards

Each year we receive submissions of newsletters for evaluation. The purpose of the evaluation is to help editors to improve their communication skills when conveying news to chapter members. This year, we had 34 chapters submit newsletters. They were evaluated on a 25 point scale for good writing, member contributions, society news at all levels (local, councils, state, regional and international). The newsletters also needed to have an uncluttered, easy to read format, and readers needed to be able to find information easily. The newsletters were evaluated by three readers, with the final score being the average of the three scores. 


