WORLD FELLOWSHIP PROGRAM

World Fellowship provides monetary awards to women from around the world to study in the United States and Canada. In the next week or two, International will be announcing the 2016-2017 World Fellowship recipients. Let's hope one of them will be attending a fine NC university.

From Delta Kappa Gamma's initial award of \$2,500 in 1960, based on

\$11,528 in contributions, the program has grown to impressive totals: 920 women in 120 countries have received awards totaling \$3,349,100 since 1960. Contributions totaled \$3,944,876.30 (through June 2016).

Contributions and bequests determine the number of World Fellowship Awards given each year by the committee. During the 2014-2015 fiscal year, \$74,901 was contributed.

Awards given for 2015-2016 are composed of 20 recipients who received \$4,000 each to pursue post-graduate degrees from American or Canadian universities. Six talented women received \$1,000 extensions to previous awards for a total of \$83,200 to 26 women in 19 countries.

These impressive numbers tell the story, and Gamma Chi Sisters can continue to impact education worldwide. Please continue this story by giving generously at our December meeting. If you cannot attend, please send your suggested minimum of \$3 contribution to Shirley White. Our chapter goal is \$100, but our committee's goal is at least \$125. GAMMA CHI MEMBER'S ENTRY ACCEPTED INTO THE DKG GALLERY OF FINE ARTS

The Arts & Humanities Jury of The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International has accepted Nancy Tunstall's entry of *Pillows for a Pink Chair* into the DKG Gallery of Fine Arts, an online gallery of works of art and letters at <u>www.dkg.org</u>. The anticipated unveiling of the new Gallery works will be in November of 2016. There will be an article in the *DKG NEWS* publicizing the new works in the Gallery. Her work will stay up in the Gallery for six months, after which it will be archived.



Nancy's entry was under the category Original Crafts, subcategory Textiles. The judging criteria rubric looked at the design, craftsmanship and function of the entry. Nancy's pillows incorporated a geometric design

done in Bargello, a specialized, counted canvas embroidery characterized by using long upright stitches. Nancy designed these pillows to use with an inherited rose velvet chair that she cherishes.

CHAPTER ACHIEVEMENT: HOW ARE WE DOING?

The Chapter Achievement Awards are presented to chapters annually at the Eta State NC Convention. This initiative provides for acknowledgment, recognition, and appreciation in a tangible way for those chapters who meet the criteria at various levels of



achievement. In 2013, 2014 and 2015 Gamma Chi was recognized at the highest level—Superior. Not only that, but we also received the Presidential Chapter Achievement Award by being among the top five Superior level chapters in the state. Last year we dropped back one level to Excellent due to a change in the form requiring 100 points more to reach the Superior level. This year we are determined to reach the Superior level once more. Not only that, but we will strive to receive the Presidential Award too. We have determined that there is a possibility of our chapter earning 620 points which will be enough to reach the Superior level requirement of 600+ points. It may not be enough to reach the Presidential Award status though. How can we generate more points?

First, you need to look at the Chapter Achievement form to see what you may be able to do to help. To see the new Chapter Achievement form for 2016-2017, click <u>here</u>. - Communicate with state/local officials (must have examples)
- Submit an entry to an educational website or professional journal, and/or

• Submit an entry to the DKG Bulletin – Journal or DKG Bulletin – Collegial Exchange Magazine.



GAMMA CHI CHAPTER MINUTES – October 6, 2016

The Gamma Chi Chapter of The Delta Kappa Society International met at Enterprise Baptist Church in Littleton, on Thursday, October 6, 2016. Gathering and socializing began at 6:00 p.m.

President Debra Clayton called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. and recognized Charis Shattuck, who offered a blessing before the meal, catered by A-Catered Affair.

Following the meal the president introduced Elizabeth Moseley, Registered Nurse at the Warren County Health Department (WCHD), who presented "Reach Out and Read." This reading program gives young children a foundation for success by encouraging parents to read to their children and listen to their children read. Children birth to 18 years old who visit WCHD for well-child visits receive an age appropriate book from their doctor. Health Department employees are trained in choosing age appropriate books for each individual child. In addition, they provide information for parents about using the public library, GED programs, ESL classes and the importance of literacy. WCHD asks groups and individuals to donate books for this project. Mary Brodie Raiford moved and Lynne Lassiter seconded the motion for the children's books that members bring to the December meeting be donated to the "Reach Out and Read" program at WCHD. The motion passed, and Charis Shattuck told members that she would donate her 40% commission for any Usborne books purchased from her for this project toward purchasing additional books. President Clayton thanked Mrs. Moseley for coming and gave her a red rose of appreciation.

The May Meeting Minutes and the Executive Board Minutes were accepted as written by consensus.

Shirley White gave the Treasurer's Report: Checking Balance – \$1,623.21 and Savings Balance – \$3,575.14. The Treasurer's Report was received and filed for audit.

Aimee Anderson, Corresponding Secretary, read regrets from Melanie Burnette who had a work conflict, Nancy Tunstall who is on an Asian trip, and Mary Catherine Harris who was hosting a Women's Retreat. Following regrets, she read the Congratulations and Condolences from pages 1 and 2 of our fall newsletter.

President Clayton recognized August, September, and October Birthdays with a "You are the Balm," lip balm in a gold mesh bag. Clayton also recognized Paige Lamberson's retirement and had a red rose for her. The Mystery Member this meeting was Debra Clayton. Ashley Barnette was recognized for applying for the Lucile Cornetet Award for Professional Development. Diane Colin was recognized for applying for a \$250 NC DKG Educational Foundation Grant to purchase at least two more Chromebooks for Vaughan Elementary School.

The Executive Board moved adoption of the 2016-2017 Proposed Budgets for Checking and Savings Accounts. Checking: Brought Forward – \$1,020.27, Estimated Receipts of \$6,125.00 for a total of \$7,145.27 Total Available for budgeting. Estimated expenses of \$6,601.00 for an estimated balance of \$544.27 on June 30, 2017. Savings: \$3,538.88 Balance Brought Forward; \$2,041.40 Estimated Income; for a Total Estimated income of \$5,580.28. Total Estimated Disbursement of \$2,120.00 for Estimated Balance of \$3,460.28 on June 30, 2017. Proposed budgets for 2016-2017 passed.

The Executive Board moved approval of the Gamma Chi Strategic Plan for 2016-2018 Biennium. Motion passed.

Loree Harris, Rules Committee Chair, presented the Rules Committee's recommendation to add an opening paragraph under Article III Membership. This recommendation was approved as was written in the fall newsletter.

Sylvia Alston, Awards Committee Chair, and the committee moved to accept the changes to the 2016-2017 Member Excellence Form. This motion passed.

Debra gave her President's Report. She attended the Eta State Executive Board Meeting held at Elon University on September 10, 2016. Report details can be found on page 8 of the fall newsletter. She challenged members to continue to make a difference in education by reading questions from "You Make the Difference" on page 6 of the fall newsletter and members responded with BORN READY!

Committee Reports followed:

Sylvia Alston reported for the Awards Committee. The committee recommended a new award to recognize an "Outstanding Rookie of the Year Award" for a member with nine years or less of experience. (All details are not decided.) The committee recommended "The Rising Star Award" as a local award with the same criteria as Eta State. Membership accepted these recommendations. Sylvia then recognized Member Excellence Awards 2015-2016 as Sylvia Alston, Harriet Banzet, Debra Clayton, Evelyn Hall, Loree Harris, Mary Catherine Harris, Ann Kilian, Nancy Tunstall and Shirley White. Next she recognized the Member Milestones as Mary Catherine Harris – 35 years, Crystal Brantley – 30 years, Danylu Hundley – 30 years, Laura Kearney – 25 years, Mary Ann Johnson – 20 years, Jill Coleman – 15 years, Loree Harris – 15 years, Karen Paynter – 10 years, Rebecca Bolton – 5 years, Donna Liles – 5 years and Betty Anne Shearin – 5 years. Finally, she recognized the Perfect Attendance for 2015-2016 as Aimee Anderson, Mary Austell, Harriet Banzet, Ashley Barnette, Kay Beaver, Ginny Bernard, Brooke Callahan, Debra Clayton, Ann Kilian, Diane Reavis, Nancy Tunstall and Shirley White. Janis Meek received the Founder's Award from our chapter and, thus, will be our nominee for the Eta State NC Founders Award for 2017. Mary Austell received the Golden Key Award from our chapter and, thus, will be the nominee to Eta State NC Golden Key Award for Region III for 2017. Debra Clayton was recognized as being one of the first to receive the Eta State NC Rising Star Award in 2016.

President Clayton thanked the Awards Committee for their dedication.

Norma Retzlaff, Chair of the Beginning Teacher Support Committee, thanked members for items donated for the "New Teacher Bag Project." Bags will be prepared on October 13, 2016, at Mariam Boyd Elementary School at 10:30 a.m., and they will be delivered during American Education Week, November 14-18, 2016.
