

I look forward to seeing you at our December meeting. Remember to wear your name badge to get points on your Member Excellence form!! Happy Thanksgiving!!



WORLD FELLOWSHIP PROGRAM: IMPACTING EDUCATION WORLDWIDE

World Fellowship provides monetary awards to women from around the world to study in the United States and Canada. In the next week or two, International will be announcing the 2018-2019 World Fellowship recipients. Let's hope one of them will be attending a fine NC university.



In an attempt to better acquaint you with World Fellowship recipients, the DKG World Fellowship Committee shared this excerpt from the personal narrative they received during the application process. This narrative is a powerful example of the challenges many of these women encounter as they pursue their educational dreams and aspirations. Here is the story of Bethanie, from Haiti, a 2017-2018 award recipient.



"My mother committed suicide when I was 10 years old, leaving behind my dad, my 5 siblings, and me. Tormented by the fear to see his daughters raped and his sons enroll in street gangs, my father made the sacrifice of sending my siblings and me to stay with relatives and friends throughout the country. I ended up in Petion-Ville,

where I lived with my cousin. There, I completed my elementary and secondary education. Despite all the home chores that I had to do, I was lucky enough to be a guick learner and earn good grades. After admission to my 4th year in high school, my cousin announced that she could no longer help pay my school tuitions. I did not know what was going to happen, but I knew that I did not want to drop out of school. Through prayers and the generosity of others, I received donations in the form of books, uniforms, shoes, and other supplies needed to go to school like all my friends. And while I did not have any idea about how the school tuition was going to be paid for, I ran after my dream to stay in my former high school. I attended school the first trimester with the complicity of my classmates and teachers, who helped me hide under the desk and in the class cabinet every time the accountant tried to chase me out and send me home. All of those experiences have reinforced my commitment to overcome

poverty and to bring about social and economic changes in my country."

The DKG World Fellowship Committee experienced a range of emotions as they read these narratives. They hope sharing these experiences will expand members' knowledge about the importance of The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International and how we are "Educating the World, One Woman at a Time."

Gamma Chi Sisters can continue to impact education worldwide. Please continue this story by giving generously at our December meeting. If you cannot attend, please send your suggested minimum of \$3 contribution to Shirley White. Our chapter goal is \$100, but our committee's goal is at least \$125. CHAPTER ACHIEVEMENT: HOW ARE WE DOING?

The Chapter Achievement Awards are presented to chapters annually at the Eta State NC Convention. This initiative provides for acknowledgment, recognition, and appreciation in a tangible way for those chapters who meet the criteria at various levels of



achievement. In 2013, 2014 and 2015 Gamma Chi was recognized at the highest level—Superior. Not only that, but we also received the Presidential Chapter Achievement Award by being among the top five Superior level chapters in the state. In 2016 we dropped back one level to Excellent due to a change in the form requiring 100 points more to reach the Superior level. Last year we again reached the Superior level. Not only that, but we again received the Presidential Award. We are determined to do it again in 2018. Reaching the Superior level requirement of 600+ points is not enough to ensure us of receiving the Presidential Award. Last year eight chapters reached the superior level, but only the five chapters having the most points received the Presidential Award. We are pretty sure of reaching 600 points, but that may not be enough to reach the Presidential Award status. How can we generate more points?

First, you need to look at the Chapter Achievement form to see what you may be able to do to help. To see the new Chapter Achievement form for 2017-2018, click here. Here are a few things that would help (please notify Debra Clayton or Nancy Tunstall if you accomplish any of the things listed):

- Submit an entry to the DKG Bulletin Journal or DKG Bulletin
 Collegial Exchange Magazine.

Swf is an abbreviation for small web format, an Adobe Flash file format used for multimedia, vector graphics and ActionScript. In the

case of *Eta State News*, the Flash format allows animation of the pages turning and allows a two-page view of the inside of the newsletter, plus searching options, thumbnail views, and an auto flip option.

To uses the swf file, follow the link to <u>Flipbuilder</u>, the online tool *Eta State News* Editor Carol Bostian used to convert the pdf file into an interactive media file. Click on the arrows or anywhere on the far sides of the pages to flip to the next page.

TECH TIP—PREVENT EMAIL OVERLOAD

Are you overwhelmed by your emails? Although the abundance of emails can be stressful, much communication is still handled through emails. Do you have a plan for handling your emails? Here are some suggestions:

- Schedule a time to work with your emails. Allow time for responding, organizing, deleting, and anything else that may be needed. Stick to that schedule, preferable at least once a day, and attend to every new email in your inbox.
- Read each email ONCE and make a decision. Does it get stored or deleted? Do it! Complete each email before moving on.
- Reply/Delete/Store. Create a method to store important emails. Put important emails in folders that will organize by topic. Consider using a program such as Evernote (free), which will store important information and can be searched. Immediately after reading and replying (if needed), make the decision to delete or store. Although some people find it hard to delete any emails, remember that storing emails takes up valuable space. Be ruthless.
- Unsubscribe, Unsubscribe, Unsubscribe! A much used account can easily get out of control. Scroll to the bottom of these unwanted emails and choose to unsubscribe. It may take a week or more before it takes effect, but the wait will be worth it.
- Reply to personal emails. Do not let people remain in suspense, unsure of what is going on. Senders may be unsure if you even received their emails. They may also get offended when you don't even send a reply. Instead, send a bridge email that assures senders that you have received the email. A bridge email is a "canned" response, but a simple "Thank you" usually does the trick.

Hopefully these suggestions will help you get control of your emails.

GAMMA CHI CHAPTER MINUTES – OCTOBER 5, 2017
