

At the December meeting, \$60.00 was collected from the meeting raffle and \$50.00 of it was used to provide a donation to the Eta State Pauline Longest Leadership Fund in honor of Eta State President Pat Taylor who was our guest.

Members were very generous in their contributions. World Fellowship donations totaled \$130.00; \$1,529.00 was given as honorariums and/or memorials for the Gamma Chi Scholarship Fund (\$1,000.00 was given by the Blankenship family); \$162.00 was raised by the Afghan raffle; \$75.00 was donated to International Funds; \$25.00 was donated to Eta State Scholarships; and Eta State President Pat Taylor donated \$25.00 for Schools for Africa in honor of the Gamma Chi Chapter due to the members who covered their bingo cards as Pat informed them of DKG events.

Donations for International funds were sent in honor or memory of the following women: World Fellowship Fund in honor of Pat Taylor (Eta State President and speaker at the meeting), Emergency Fund in honor of Melba Johnston, Educational Foundation Fund in honor of Edith Allen, Scholarship Fund in memory of Nancy Blankenship, International Speaker Fund in honor of Nell White and the Golden Gift Fund in honor of Jean White.

home will be the convention project.


MHCO's goal is to help children who need a stable, caring and loving home. There are currently 53 residents, ranging from 3 years to college age.

LEADERSHIP SEMINAR PLANNED FOR SUMMER

The four-day Leadership Seminar, "Cultivating Women Educators for Leadership," will be held at William Peace University, June 17 - 20, 2015.

Each chapter is being asked to recognize members (and potential members) who exhibit leadership, to encourage these women to participate in the seminar. The cost of the event will be approximately \$250.00. If interested, please apply for a Gamma Chi Professional Development Grant to help defray the cost.

The four foci will be communication skills, physical health, fiscal health, and professional growth. Breakout sessions will be offered in the first three foci, with topics which appeal/apply to educators at various stages of work/life. The Leadership Development Committee, sponsors of the seminar, plans to offer certificate renewal credit. In addition to growing in knowledge, past participants have realized genuine spiritual fellowship and long lasting friendships.

Schools for Africa (SFA) became the Society's first official international project in 2010. To date, DKG has donated \$222,608 to this worthy project. Currently the project works with 13 countries in sub-Saharan Africa including Angola, Burkina Faso, Ethiopia, Guinea Bissau, Madagascar, Malawi, Mali, Mozambique, Niger, Rwanda, Sierra Leone, South Africa and Zimbabwe. The SFA mission involves providing access to quality basic education for children, focusing on girls, orphans and other vulnerable youngsters. UNICEF works through this project with governments, local authorities, communities and other partners to:

- Foster community participation in school management
- Build and improve classroom buildings and equipment
- Create safe and protective environments where children can learn and play (CFS, Child-Friendly School programs)
- Provide access to clean water and separate sanitation facilities for boys and girls in schools
- Supply exercise books, pens, proper furniture and other school and sports materials
- Train teachers to provide children with quality education and basic life skills
- Educate children about proper hygiene and HIV prevention: this knowledge is passed on to siblings, parents, and the community at large
- Provide other interventions, including but not limited to health check-ups, immunization and scholarships
- Insure a stimulating start in life to children below age five.

 According to UNICEF's most recent annual report on the Schools for Africa project, major gains have been made in:
- Early childhood development
- Access and retention to quality primary basic education
- HIV prevention in schools
- Education in emergencies.

What would it look like if members used their leadership skills in the chapter?


Excellent attendance! Endless ideas for programs! Positive conversations! Educators begging to join!

TECH TIP

Online tools sync and capture everything

Evernote is a web-based note taking tool that is also available as an app for tablets



and smartphones. Evernote captures anything from recording audio to photos, from website pages to scanned documents and allows the user to find things quickly. Basic accounts are free. Save ideas, record audio, grab websites and add images to notetaking quickly and easily. Sync notes and notebooks across all devices. Search within Evernote by keyword, tags or scanned images and files. Evernote offers addins to help make all notetaking and idea generation easier. For the iPad, users may also add Evernote Peek to help create study materials from notes or Penultimate for sketching and scribbling handwritten notes to store within an Evernote notebook. 

GAMMA CHI CHAPTER MINUTES - DECEMBER 4, 2014

The Gamma Chi Chapter of The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International met at Norlina United Methodist Church on Thursday, December 4, 2014. A Social Hour beginning at 6:00 p.m. was followed by dinner at 6:30 p.m., catered by women of the church. Prior to the meal, President Debra Clayton welcomed everyone and recognized Loree Harris, who offered the blessing.

Patricia Williamson introduced Pat Taylor, who used Bingo-style cards and music in her presentation of information from Eta State. On behalf of Gamma Chi, the president presented the speaker a token of appreciation in the form of a contribution in her honor to the State Leadership Fund and a scarf that she had made.

Karen Paynter and Sallye Duncan led the group in singing carols.

Debra Clayton called the business session to order. Recording Secretary Mary Catherine Harris reported attendance of 27 members and one guest. The minutes of the October 2, 2014 meeting were approved as printed and distributed with the newsletter. Shirley White, treasurer, presented her report, which showed a checking balance of \$2,055.06 and a savings balance of \$3,703.99. The report was filed for audit.

Corresponding Secretary Sallye Duncan read notes of regret from Jill Coleman and Laura Kearney, who were unable to attend the meeting. Debra Clayton reported that Janis Meek had also sent a notice of regret. Notes of sympathy had been sent to Laura Kearney, Katy Jones, and the Sue Skinner family.

Members with November, December, and January birthdays were recognized. The president expressed thanks to Shirley White for her diligence as treasurer of Gamma Chi and to Nancy Tunstall for her generosity in mentoring her in her presidency. Edwina Rooker was revealed as the Mystery Member. Nancy Tunstall was congratulated on the birth of her grandson.

During the President's Report, President Clayton asked members to consider supporting the new Eta State Educational Foundation through participating in the 100 Challenge, through which each region is challenged to get 100 pledges of \$10.00, due on March 15, 2015. The president stated that she anticipates Gamma Chi will meet requirements for the superior level of the Chapter Achievement Award.

President Taylor gave details of the State Convention to take place in Chapel Hill. She encouraged attendance at the Awards Ceremony and the Ceremony of Remembrance and also announced Professional Development opportunities. She encouraged the chapter to present a nominee for the Founders Award and ended her report by making a donation to Schools for Africa: \$2.00 for every Bingo card filled during the program.

The following committee reports were given:

- **Beginning Teacher Support Committee** Mary Austell expressed thanks for the donations to the New Teacher Bags, for which the chapter was recognized at the November School Board Meeting. She reminded members to turn in their THAT reports. Mary Brodie Raiford and Jeffrey Evans were to send Christmas cards to new teachers and the Littleton group would send cards for Valentine's Day.
- **Finance Committee** Tracey Neal called attention to the adjusted budget and stated that the committee recommends acceptance of the adjusted budget. The motion passed.
- Membership Committee Nancy Tunstall reminded members to complete and submit their biographical sketches. She reminded that membership forms for prospective members are due on February 1. She also announced that requests for resignation had been received from Angela Vaughan and Louise Twitty. These requests were honored by vote of the members.
- Scholarship Committee Shirley White reminded that forms are available online and are due February 1. She reported that Edwina Rooker had requested \$75.00 rather than \$65.00 for her Professional Grant. She made a motion to approve the request, seconded by Sylvia Alston. The motion passed. Shirley White announced that the children of Nancy Blankenship had again contributed \$1,000.00 to the fund in memory of their mother.
- World Fellowship Committee Loree Harris reported that \$85.00 had been collected for World Fellowship. She encouraged members to reach the goal of \$125.00.
- Rules Committee Loree Harris made the motion from the committee that the chapter approve an amendment to the Eta State Standing Rules that the Founders Award candidate must be a member of The Delta Kappa Gamma Society. The motion passed.
- Afghan Committee Danylu Hundley commended members on their participation in the raffle.
- Hospitality Committee Paula Avcock welcomed everyone on behalf of the committee.
- **Spelling Bee Committee** Ginny Bernard announced the date of the Warren Education Fund Spelling Bee, March 20, 2015, and reported that the registration fee had been submitted.
- **Remembrance Committee** Shirley White announced that the sending of birthday cards was continuing, along with Christmas cards to reserve members. She gave reports on Melba Johnston, Nell White, and Harriett Faulkner.

Pat Taylor expressed sadness at the recent death of Lynda Tamblyn, the Eta State Finance Committee chair. There was no unfinished business or new business. The president expressed appreciation to the Norlina group, who hosted the meeting and conducted the raffle. The meeting adjourned at 8:05 p.m.
