

OUR MARCH MEETING SPEAKER



We are very fortunate to have one of our own, Jenny O'Meara, presenting *The Three Greatest Lessons I Learned Teaching in Burkina Faso* at our March meeting.

After graduating from high school, she received her bachelor's degree in French and International Relations from State University of

New York at Geneseo.

She began her career in education in 2008 by teaching middle school math and English as a Secondary Education Peace Corps Volunteer in Loumana, Burkina Faso, West Africa. She was there through 2010. Her presentation is based on this experience.

From 2011-2015 she taught 9th – 12th grade math at Warren County High School, Warrenton, North Carolina. She served as Principal Resident at Northern Vance High School, Henderson, North Carolina, during the 2015-2016 school year. Currently she is the Assistant Principal at North Edgecombe High School, Tarboro, North Carolina.

In 2013 Jenny received the Sue Lehmann Award for Excellence in Teaching, Eastern North Carolina Teach for America Corps. She was one of two winners selected out of over one hundred possible nominees for this recognition.

The Northeast Leadership Academy (NELA), one of the top four principal preparation programs in the United States, awarded Jenny a fellowship to attend NC State University from 2014-2016. She was selected as one of 16 cohort members and awarded a full scholarship with NELA, a highly selective graduate program designed to develop school leaders for districts in rural northeastern North Carolina.

Hope Harbor also employs a Community Educator who conducts presentations in schools on issues such as bullying, dating violence, sexual harassment, self-esteem, and other topics aimed at promoting nonviolence among students and throughout the community.

During their 30 years of operation, thousands of women and children have found safe shelter and received services through Hope Harbor Home.

First, you need to sign in to the http://www.dkg.org/ website with your membership number and password. (If you do not know these two things, contact Nancy Tunstall.) You are now in a secure website available only to members. Second, create an account by going to MyDKG from the top menu bar. By filling in a very brief personal profile, you can then join communities and also be listed in the Member Directory. For example, the author of this article is one of ten lowa members with a profile. We are able to join, or even create, a Community.

As of this writing, there are 10 Communities from which to choose: DKG Book Club, DKG Collaborative Communities (for sharing about subject areas and job issues), DKG Communications and Publicity, DKG for Social Media, DKG Home Life, DKG in Canada, DKG Membership Forum, DKG Mentoring, DKG Travels and DKG with a Focus on the Arts, By contacting Nita Scott at nitas@dkg.org, you could even suggest a new Community! She will also answer your specific questions. Within each Community are sections for Discussions, Blogs, Resource Library, Wiki, and a list of Participants in that Community.

Create an account on our dkg.org website and find a Community you'd like to join. Share your thoughts and ideas, questions or concerns, hopes and dreams with other members around the world. Pick your passion and join the discussions today!



Schools for Africa became the Society's first official international project in 2010. Members have donated, as of October 2016 over \$324,150 to the project. Currently the project works with 13 countries in sub-Saharan Africa including Angola, Malawi, Mozambique, Rwanda, South Africa, Zimbabwe, Niger, Burkina Faso, Mali, Ethiopia, Madagascar, Sierra Leone and Guinea Bissau. The SFA mission involves providing access to quality basic education for children, focusing on girls, orphans and other vulnerable youngsters. UNICEF works through this project with governments, local authorities, communities and other partners to:

- Foster community participation in school management
- Build and improve classroom buildings and equipment
- Create safe and protective environments where children can learn and play (CFS, Child-Friendly School programs)
- Provide access to clean water and separate sanitation facilities for boys and girls in schools
- Supply exercise books, pens, proper furniture and other school and sports materials
- Train teachers to provide children with quality education and basic life skills
- Educate children about proper hygiene and HIV prevention: this knowledge is passed on to siblings, parents, and the community at large
- Provide other interventions, including but not limited to health check-ups, immunization and scholarships
- Insure a stimulating start in life to children below age five

According to UNICEF's most recent annual report on the Schools for Africa project, major gains have been made in:

- Early childhood development
- Access and retention to quality primary basic education
- Non-formal education
- HIV prevention in schools
- Education in emergencies

GAMMA CHI CHAPTER MINUTES – DECEMBER 1, 2016

The Gamma Chi Chapter of The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International met at Norlina United Methodist Church on Thursday, December 1, 2016. A 6:00 p.m. social hour was followed by dinner, catered by the Norlina United Methodist Women. Loree Harris offered a blessing before the meal.

President Debra Clayton called the meeting to order, expressing thanks to the hosting Norlina group and to the caterers. She introduced Eta State North Carolina President Sheila Groves, who engaged members in a game about Delta Kappa Gamma. In appreciation for her visit, she received from the chapter a poinsettia and statement of a donation in her honor to the North Carolina Delta Kappa Gamma Educational Foundation.

As the business session began, Mary Catherine Harris gave the attendance report, noting 37 members and two guests present. The president asked for a moment of silence in memory of recently deceased Reserve Member Edith Allen.

The minutes of the October meeting were approved. Nancy Tunstall, reporting for Treasurer Shirley White, gave the treasurer's report, showing a checking balance of \$2,241.22 and a savings balance of \$5,723.12. The report was accepted and filed.

Aimee Anderson, corresponding secretary, reported attendance regrets from Janis Meek and Shirley White.

Nancy Tunstall read a letter from Richard Blankenship announcing a donation of \$2,000.00 to the Scholarship Fund in memory of his mother and long-time Gamma Chi member Nancy P. Blankenship. Tunstall also read a note from the state president expressing sympathy upon the death of Edith Allen.

Members with November, December, and January birthdays were recognized. Loree Harris was revealed to be the Mystery Member. Announcement was made of the recent birth of Shirley White's great-granddaughter.

In her report, President Clayton announced the state convention to be held in Wilmington. Along with the president, Nancy Tunstall and Shirley White plan to attend. The Southeast Regional Conference will take place at Myrtle Beach, SC, and the Leadership Seminar is scheduled at Caraway Conference Center in Sophia.

The following reports were given:

- Evelyn Hall, Nominations Committee chair, encouraged members to contact the president regarding willingness to serve on this committee.
