

At the March meeting, \$55.00 was collected from the meeting raffle; this will be used to help our local libraries and the NC DKG Educational Foundation. Schools for Africa donations

amounted to \$100.00, exactly meeting our goal.

Sold afghan raffle tickets brought in \$108.00, bringing the total so far to \$356.00. We will need \$144.00 more to be turned in at our May meeting to reach the goal of \$500.00 being raised by the afghan raffle each year.

DUES PAYMENT PLAN

Gamma Chi members who prefer to make payments on their dues rather than pay the full amount at our October meeting will need to begin payments after July 1. Our fiscal year ends on June 30, and our books must be closed out at that time. Our new year begins on July 1.

For making payments, the following plan should be followed (there will be no reminders made):

The Chapter Rules Committee has worked to revise the Gamma Chi Chapter Rules to be consistent with current practices of the chapter. The most pressing need is the deletion of the Telephone Network



Committee since we are now using Evite. Using Evite totally eliminates the function of that committee. Simply adding a few more duties to the Communications & Publicity Committee takes care of it.

The second change is to do away with the World Fellowship Committee and replace it with a World Fellowship Representative who would be listed under Related Personnel. This will line us up with Eta State NC, which has a World Fellowship Representative. One person

is all we need to encourage members to contribute to World Fellowship at our December meetings.

Finally, the committee suggests changing the name of the Music Committee to Music/Fine Arts Committee. The committee could then encourage members to share their creative arts with the DKG Fine Arts Gallery.

ETA STATE NC EDUCATIONAL LAW & POLICY COMMITTEE PREPARES FOR A BUSY SPRING

First, the committee urges all chapter members to complete the Legislative Opinion Survey. Members can complete the survey online at https://goo.gl/forms/hZlRoeOO7hR7vmXA3 or go to Eta State's website (https://www.ncdkg.org/) and under "Leadership" click Educational Law and Policy Committee. Scroll down to the survey at the bottom of page. Surveys should be completed and submitted by April 23. Thanks! (You received an email on April 2 requesting that you complete the survey. If you haven't done so, please take a few minutes and complete it now.)

Next, the EL&P Committee urges members to mark their calendars for upcoming activities and to prepare to communicate with their representatives in the NC General Assembly. On Saturday afternoon, April 28, EL&P will present a legislative workshop at the Eta State NC Convention focusing on the latest education legislation.

Also, there will be 3 days designated as "Legislative Days" when DKG members will be visiting the legislature in Raleigh to share our educational expertise and educational opinions with lawmakers. Choose the day that best fits your schedule and meet ELP hostesses in the front lobby at the base of the red carpet staircase at 9:00 a.m. Dates include: June 6, June 13 and June 20. Why not pull together an interested chapter group and organize a road trip?

Eta State NC members are reminded that they may speak to their representatives in the name of Delta Kappa Gamma on issues from the Legislative Priorities Survey. Other issues must be presented as personal opinions. On the national level, it is unfortunate that the 2018 federal budget was passed after our Legislative Priorities Survey was created. Therefore, we cannot speak on behalf of DKG to our Congressional Representatives and Senators about the national budget ramifications for children. There are many parts of the budget that adversely affect children, such as cuts to Medicaid, nutrition assistance programs, Head Start early childhood programs, affordable housing programs, home heating assistance, disability benefits, and more. Hopefully, members will let their personal opinions be known on many of these issues.

TECH TIP—WHAT IS A BROWSER?

Browsing the Internet is a common, daily occurrence for most people. Have you ever considered why they call it browsing? It is because you use an internet browser, also known as a Web browser.

A browser is simply a software program that you use to access the internet and view web pages on your computer, smartphone, or tablet. It is the gateway to the Internet.

The original browser, Mosaic (1992), was not graphical. It was text-based. Browsers have come a long way since then. You now have powerful browsers that let you safely and quickly access your favorite websites.

Most browsers are available for free download. The four

most popular Internet browsers today include Mozilla Firefox, Google Chrome, Microsoft Edge, and Apple Safari.

Each has its own strengths and weaknesses. Because some websites display better in one Internet browser or another, many people have at least two browsers available on their computer, smartphone, or tablet.

Choosing a Browser to Suit Your Needs: In most instances, you begin with the browser that came with your computer. Older Windows computers gave you Internet Explorer, while updates gave you Edge. If you use an Apple product, you started with Safari.



Microsoft Edge resembles Internet Explorer 11, so Windows users will feel comfortable with it. It fully integrates with Windows 10. For users who want and use extensions—which extend your

Web browser with additional features, modify Web pages, and integrate your browser with the other services you use—Edge doesn't allow for much customization. Syncing with your Android or iOS device isn't straightforward. Microsoft has sandboxed Edge away from the operating system to limit security breaches that occurred with Internet Explorer. (Sandboxing is a computer security term referring to when a program is set aside from other programs in a separate environment so that if errors or security issues occur, those issues will not spread to other areas on the computer.)



Apple Safari is a Web browser available for the Macintosh operating system as well as the iPhone, iPod Touch, and iPad. According to Apple, Safari has been designed based on the premise

that the most useful browser is one that "gets out of your way and lets you simply enjoy the Web." If you own several Apple products, synchronization of passwords, bookmarks, history, tabs and Reading List happen seamlessly through iCloud. Like Edge, Safari is sandboxed. In general, Safari runs a bit faster than other browsers on an Apple device.



Google Chrome has a robust set of features, with full Google Account integration, and a suite of mobile apps for every major platform. It does have privacy and security controls. By some accounts,

Chrome is the gold standard for web browsers. Chrome's integration of its products is second to none. It is especially useful for using Google Docs and the Google Drive.



Mozilla Firefox has been on a roller coaster of popularity over the years. Firefox is available for Linux, Mac, Windows, handheld devices, and in more than 70 different languages. Firefox is

developed by the nonprofit, public-benefit organization Mozilla and thousands of volunteers worldwide. Since 1998, Mozilla has been working to help create and sustain an open and accessible Internet for all, and its focus is on individuals, not profits. Recent updates have once again pushed Firefox into the limelight of a preferred browser. It provides secure connections and browsing

protections.

Choosing: Start with the one that came with your computer or smart phone/tablet. If it does everything you want and need, go no further. If however, you are like most users, you will eventually have a reason to switch. Download the one or two that interest you. They are free.

Keep several browsers on your devices. Give other browsers a test run. You may find one that better fits your needs.

GAMMA CHI CHAPTER MINUTES – MARCH 1, 2018

The Gamma Chi Chapter of The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International met at the Warrenton Church of God on Thursday, March 1, 2018, beginning with a social hour at 6:00 p.m. President Debra Clayton convened the meeting. Mary Catherine Harris offered a blessing for the meal, which was catered by Honey's Kitchen.

During the meal, Gamma Chi sister Nancy Tunstall presented the program on "Sustaining Pride in Delta Kappa Gamma." She gave an informative overview of the organization's engagement in education from local to international levels.

The president called the business session to order.

Mary Catherine Harris, recording secretary, gave the attendance report, noting 23 members present. Two additional members attended briefly. The minutes of the December meeting were approved. Shirley White, treasurer, reported current balances of \$2,067.83 in checking and \$6,540.07 plus interest in savings. The report was accepted and filed. The treasurer noted contributions to various funds, honoring Gamma Chi sisters: Emergency Fund, Brooke Callahan; Golden Gift Fund, Evelyn Hall; International Speakers Fund, Debra Clayton; Scholarship Fund, Sylvia Alston; The DKG Educational Foundation, Ashley Barnette; and World Fellowship Fund, Loree Harris.

There was no report from the Corresponding Secretary. Updates were given on members unable to attend the meeting.

Members with February, March and April birthdays were recognized. Danylu Hundley was revealed to be the Mystery Member. Announcement was made of Jenny O'Meara's upcoming marriage and Erin Simons' recent engagement.

The president's report included the following:

- Reports submitted to Eta State NC are Necrology, Golden Key, Rising Star, and Communications Excellence.
- Plans are under way for the Eta State NC Convention in April in Charlotte, International Convention in July in Austin, TX, and the Southeast Regional Conference in June 2019 in Asheville.
- Nancy Tunstall designed an ad from Gamma Chi in the State Convention program book.
- The Blankenship family is planning a cookout on April 14 at their lake house for first-year Warren County teachers. Members were encouraged to attend and help provide dessert and assist with set-up.

Committee reports were as follows:

- Nancy Tunstall, reporting for Patricia Williamson, encouraged donations for Schools for Africa.
- In the absence of Jennifer Wilker, Tunstall reported for the Membership Committee and made a motion from the committee to accept the following educators into Gamma Chi: Lisa Bender, Kim Vincent, Katrinka Brewer, Pattie Rodwell, Shirley Cava, and Gail Coleman. All were accepted by vote of those present.
- In the absence of Jill Coleman, Scholarship chair, Shirley White and Betsy Clark reported. The committee recommended and the members approved renewing the grant-in-aid for Mila Alston and offering additional grants to Carthia Kornegay and Myasia Royster. Approval was given the committee's recommendation that \$75 be added to the \$600 previously approved to help with expenses for Evelyn Hall to attend the DKG Leadership Management Seminar in Austin, TX.
- Evelyn Hall, Nominations chair, presented the following proposed slate of officers for the next biennium: President, Evelyn Hall; 1st Vice-President, Betsy Clark; 2nd Vice-President, Diane Colin; Corresponding Secretary, Aimee Anderson; and Recording Secretary, Ashley Barnette. The motion from the Nominations Committee was passed.
- Danylu Hundley reported receipt of \$108 for the afghan raffle and reminded everyone to bring tickets and funds to the May meeting.
- Shirley White reported on a good visit with Reserve Member Nell White.

New Business items included:

Nancy Tunstall made a motion, seconded by Sylvia Alston, to pay Evelyn Hall's registration for the Eta State Convention. The motion passed.

Nancy Tunstall made a motion, seconded by Sylvia Alston, to pay for registration and gas for up to three additional members to attend the Eta State Convention, with funds to come from a Gamma Chi Professional Development Grant. The motion passed.

Members were reminded to let Nancy Tunstall know if they would like to place an order for ribbons and keypins.

Betsy Clark made a motion to adjourn, seconded by Shirley White, following which the Warrenton Group conducted the raffle.

Descriptions of International Funds:

Educational Foundation Fund – any educator may apply for project grants. Projects must meet one or more of the following: (1) Support and encourage intercultural understanding, (2) Encourage standards of excellence in education, and (3) Assist and cooperate with schools, colleges, universities and other persons, organizations, trust funds or foundations in support, encouragement and improvement of education. Also Cornetet funds are available for professional development for individuals and for seminars.

Emergency Fund – members who sustain major losses from floods, tornadoes, hurricanes, earthquakes, wild fires and other natural disasters may be recommended by their chapter and state organization president to receive a \$500 Emergency Fund Award.

Golden Gift Fund – provides for a member to attend a two-week leadership/management training seminar held in early July at the Red McCombs School of Business, University of Texas at Austin in even numbered years.

International Speakers Fund – the purpose of ISF is to facilitate exchange of Society speakers among member countries and help unite women educators of the world. The ISF committee considers requests for ISF speakers from state organizations twice annually. We have an IS at our Eta State NC Convention each spring.

Scholarship Fund – members may apply for a \$6,000 scholarship to assist them with their graduate studies (\$10,000 for doctoral studies—approved at the 2012 International Convention).
