TREASURER'S REPORT



At the May meeting, \$60.00 was collected from the meeting raffle; this will be used to help our local libraries and the NC DKG Educational Foundation. Other money received was \$199.00 for the afghan raffle, bringing the total to \$509.00.

May state convention. These changes went into effect immediately after the convention. Although we had already aligned our chapter rules with the International *Constitution*, now we must align our chapter rules with NC DKG *Bylaws* and *Standing Rules*.

The most notable changes will be replacing Eta State NC with NC DKG. However, please carefully read the section on new members. If the amendments pass, we will be able to vote at any meeting to approve potential new members. Then they will become members upon payment of current dues. They will be able to opt to participate in a yearly induction ceremony if desired.

The revised chapter rules will be attached to the email containing this newsletter. Red print will indicate the new additions. Red strikethrough will indicate deletions. You will need to read over our revised chapter rules very carefully in order to make an informed decision whether to ratify the changes at our September meeting.

OUR CHAPTER ACHIEVEMENT FORM

Since I was president when the NC DKG Chapter Achievement Form was first introduced, I've become very familiar with it. Its purpose is two-fold. First, it assists chapters in defining and collecting information about their status in accomplishing chapter activities and responsibilities such as chapter representation at various events, chapter communications, community projects, chapter strategic plan, chapter attendance, scholarships and awards presented, and contributions to and support of international and state activities/ projects. Secondly, it acknowledges, recognizes and appreciates those chapters who meet the criteria at various levels of achievement.

Currently there are four achievement levels: Honorable Mention below 350; Distinctive requires 350+ points; Excellent, 475+ points; and Superior, 600+ points. Additionally, the Presidential Chapter Achievement Award is given to up to five chapters who score at least at the superior level and earn the highest number of points. These awards are presented at the annual NC DKG Convention in May. Points are accumulated from March 1 to the next March 1 with the form being submitted by March 1 each year. Gamma Chi has achieved the Presidential Award in 2013, 2014, 2015, 2017 and 2018. We barely missed it in 2016 due to increasing the points needed from 500 to 600. We got back on track in 2017. We missed it in 2019 by five points! We definitely want it in 2020!!!

To reach that goal, we will need every member's help. Here are some ways you can help:

- Do not resign—we will receive 10 points for having a net increase in membership (consider going reserve if you have extenuating circumstances); we need one more member to reach this goal
- Attend meetings—60% attendance earns us 15 points; 40%, 10 points; and 20%, 5 points (we barely had 60% last year)
- Encourage members who have resigned to reinstate each reinstated member earns us 5 points with no maximum
- Publish in the DKG Bulletin Journal (5 points), on an educational website (5 points), in a professional journal (5 points), and/or in the DKG Collegial Exchange magazine (5 points); be sure to let me know if you do
- Communicate with state/local officials (10 points; must send examples—if you email, send me a blind carbon copy as proof—this would be a good time to contact your legislator about your concerns in regard to education in the state)
- Apply for a state and/or international scholarship (5 points)
- Submit an application for a NC DKG Educational Foundation Grant (5 points—due September 30)
- Present a workshop at the state convention (10 points) and/or be a facilitator for a workshop (5 points)
- Contribute to an International fund (tax deductible) such as the International Educational Foundation, Emergency Fund, Leadership Management Fund, International Speaker Fund and/or Scholarship Fund (5 points)
- Contribute to an NC DKG fund such as the Leadership Fund and/or Scholarship Fund (15 points each)

If we all pull together, I think we can make it. Please let me know of any publications and/or applications you make. A copy of this year's form is on our website for your perusal, and can be accessed by clicking <u>here</u>. Thanks in advance for your assistance in helping our chapter to reach this goal.

STATE NAME CHANGE ADOPTED

Members attending the state convention in early May voted to pass all the presented amendments to the state

Bylaws and Standing Rules, thus making the name change official— Eta State is now **The North Carolina State Organization** of The Delta



Kappa Gamma Society International, abbreviated as NC DKG.

The change was part of an alignment of the state documents with the International *Constitution* and *Standing Rules* adopted at the convention last summer in Austin, Texas.

Highlights of the state convention included attendance by International President Cathy Daugherty, chapter and individual awards, workshops, vendors, banquet, installation of new officers, the Ceremony of Remembrance, and the birthday brunch with the recognition of notable NC DKG women. COULD YOU USE \$500?



The North Carolina Delta Kappa Gamma Educational Foundation is offering six grants valued

at up to \$500 for two categories of proposals. The deadline for applications is **September 30** so you need to hurry and submit your proposal.

The first category is **Continuing Education for Professional/Personal Growth**. These grants are awarded to individuals or to projects offering professional or personal growth for women educators pursuing career advancement or personal growth through such educational activities as attendance at conferences or seminars, participation in independent study, educational travel, etc. These grants will be available to active or retired educators who give evidence of how the proposed experience will be used for educational purposes in a classroom, school, or community setting.

The second category is *Advancement of Learning and/or Literacy in a Classroom, School, or Community Setting*. This Learning/Literacy Project Grant, which may be initiated by Delta Kappa Gamma chapters or individual educators, covers a broad range of possibilities, as it focuses directly on meeting an immediate need that will enhance learning or literacy for students in classroom, school, or community settings.

For more information about these grants and an application, go to <u>http://www.ncdkgef.org/</u>, then click on Grants. Former unsuccessful applicants are encouraged to reapply.

Application materials must be submitted electronically – via email – to the Grants Review Committee Chair. Applications **must be received** no later than September 30. Applications received **after** the deadline will be considered in the **next** granting period. **Awards will be made by November 1. Grants must be completed by August 15 of the following year.**

(Just as a side note, applying for one of these grants earns our chapter points on our chapter achievement form. Please let Nancy Tunstall know if you do apply. Thanks!)

BE INFORMED ON THE LEGISLATIVE PROCESS



Bills that are before the U.S. Congress can be found at <u>www.congress.gov</u>. On this site, look for a section

for the Senate and a section for the House of Representatives. For the House, find the link to bills being considered for the week. When you click on this, a link comes up displaying these bills. Bills for the House of Representatives start with H.R. while Senate bills start with S. On this site the title of the bill is given along with the sponsoring legislator and the text of the bill. The easiest way to locate House bills is to go to the section labeled House of Representatives and then click on bills to be considered. For the Senate go to the top of the page on the right-hand side titled "Active Legislation." Clicking on this will take you to the <u>senate.gov</u> site where bills are listed. The Senate site gives pertinent information about bills in both the House and Senate.

The easiest way to locate education bills is to use the advanced search feature on the top of the lefthand side of the page. Scroll down to where it says "current legislation" and type in "education." All of the education bills will appear, and you can read a summary of the bill, a list of cosponsors, the names of committees that have heard the bill, and the text of the bill itself.

INDIVIDUAL PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT GRANT APPLICATIONS DUE SEPTEMBER 1

The Report from International at the NC DKG Convention in May shared that \$26,684 for Cornetet Individual Professional Development Grants (CIPD) from DKG International were given to NC members last year. North Carolina has received \$131,200 for Cornetet grants, seminar attendants, and project winners. Sixty-four members have received \$363,300 in scholarships.

Learn more about CIPD awards by going to the DKG Educational Foundation <u>website</u> and clicking on Apply. September 1 is the deadline to apply for Cornetet Individual Awards for Professional Development. Awards may fund travel, lodging, meals, pay for substitutes, registration fees, etc. Awards may not be used to reimburse for activities already completed, to pursue a degree program, or to fund an educational project.

Scholarship and project monies are one of the benefits of DKG membership. At least two of our members have received monies from DKG—Dr. Sylvia Alston has received a DKG Scholarship to finish her doctorate degree, and Ashley Barnette has received a CIPD to further her training. Please apply!

TECH TIP—A FILLABLE FORMS PRIMER

Collection of information via pdf forms or fillable forms is increasing. These forms allow the user to enter information directly into them, and as in the case of the Chapter Achievement Award form, it even calculates the points! Send the form directly to the committee or person who needs the information.

Fillable forms work great, but it's not always intuitive to get through the process. Here are some tips from nc dkg Webmaster Beth Winstead on using these fillable forms:

Find the form you need on the website, usually on the forms page—https://www.ncdkg.org/forms.html.

- 1. Download form to your computer. This is key you cannot just fill the form out from the page.
- Save the form on your computer Note the location YOUR computer uses to save the forms. For some this could be a folder named download, for some the desktop, etc. You can also choose where to put it.
- 3. Open and fill out the downloaded form.
- 4. Save the form again on your computer.
- 5. Open an email and attach the form to send to the person to whom it is to be submitted.

GAMMA CHI CHAPTER MINUTES – MAY 7, 2019

The Gamma Chi Chapter of The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International met at St. Paul's Lutheran Church on Tuesday, May 7, 2019, beginning with a social time at 5:45 p.m. President Evelyn Hall convened the meeting, with attendance of 27 members and eight guests.

Before the meal and the business meeting, grants-in-aid and professional development grants were awarded. Those receiving the Nancy Blankenship Grants-in-Aid were high school seniors Ellen Denning, Faith Nickole Heisler, and Hailey Kaye Stroud. Former recipient Mila Alston received the Josephine Myrick Grant-in-Aid to continue her studies in graduate school. Members Mary Austell, Evelyn Hall, and Jenny O'Meara received Gamma Chi Professional Development Grants.

Mary Catherine Harris offered a blessing for the meal, catered by Lynn Stone. During and after the meal/dessert, member Jenny O'Meara presented a mini workshop on design thinking. Members and guests brainstormed creative ways for recruiting new members.

Before calling the meeting to order, President Evelyn Hall presented Jenny O'Meara with a donation in her honor to the NC DKG Leadership Fund.

President Hall called the meeting to order.

The business session opened with approval of the minutes of the March meeting after corrections were made to the attendance list for the March 7, 2019 meeting. The wrong attendance list was used in the March 7, 2019 minutes. The following corrections were made: present at meeting – Diana Bobbitt, Gail Coleman, Brenda Holloman and Renee Mizelle; absent – Paula Aycock, Loree Harris, Janis Meek, Martha Ann Overby and Vivien Windley.

Treasurer Shirley White presented the Treasurer's Report, noting a checking balance of \$2,140.59 and savings balance of \$6,669.96. The report was received and filed for audit.

Correspondence report included: a get well card sent to Janis Meek after shoulder surgery, card received from Debra Clayton for her absence, and a thank you card received from Warren County High School Class of 2019 for awarding one of its member with a grant-in-aid.

President Evelyn Hall recognized May, June, and July birthdays. The Mystery Member from the newsletter was Lisa Bender. Evelyn then presented the President's Report. She was honored to attend the recent state convention held May 3-5 in Hickory. She noted how proud she was of Jenny O'Meara and Nancy Tunstall for presenting workshops at the state convention. The chapter received the Superior Chapter Achievement Award for the points that they earned, but was five points short of receiving the Presidential Chapter Achievement Award. Gamma Chi received the Communications Excellence Award for our website and newsletters. Evelyn received one of the five rising star awards from the convention. GAMMA CHI CHAPTER EXECUTIVE BOARD MINUTES - July 27, 2019

The Executive Board of Gamma Chi Chapter met on Saturday, July 27, 2019, at 10 a.m. in the Conference Room of St. Paul's Lutheran Church. Present were: Aimee Anderson, Ashley Barnette, Betsy Clark, Debra Clayton, Evelyn Hall, Loree Harris, Nancy Tunstall and Shirley White. Absent were Brooke Callahan, Diane Colin, and Mary Catherine Harris. Norma Retzlaff attended as chair of the Beginning Teacher Support Committee.

President Evelyn Hall presided over the meeting. She welcomed members and called the meeting to order.

Items discussed and approved were:

- New Teacher Bag Project and a Welcome Meal for New Teachers Shirley White, as chair of an ad hoc committee to investigate a Welcome Meal for New Teachers at Richard Blankenship's lake house, reported her findings. It was approved at the central office to have a welcome meal for new teachers on Friday, September 20, an early release day, beginning at approximately 4:30 p.m. The teachers finish work at 4:00 p.m. and will be brought by bus to the lake house. Right now there are 28 new teachers, but a few more vacancies may be filled. Our contact, Jackie Hargrove who works with new teachers, will firm up the number in a couple of weeks. Also, to be invited are the new superintendent, Dr. Mary Young; Jackie Hargrove; and her supervisor, Dr. Linda Mason. Meal time will probably be between 5:00 and 5:15. Members attending will be asked to bring dessert. There was discussion about doing something for all school employees. It was suggested that we plan to do something for all employees during Teacher Appreciation Week in May 2020. Nancy Tunstall mentioned that we should do something for the Blankenship family for all of their generosity towards the chapter. Loree Harris and Evelyn Hall mentioned that it would be good to do something to honor the Blankenship's mother at the May meeting. An ad hoc committee will work on it consisting of Loree Harris, Debra Clayton, and Aimee Anderson. Nancy Tunstall passed around the tentative SignUpGenius for the New Teacher Bag Project. It is set up for 40 new teachers although there will probably not be quite that many.
- Treasurer's Report/Proposed Budget and Dues Shirley White stated that balances at the end of the fiscal year were: checking, \$3,220.17; savings, \$3,375.26. The audit of our financial records found that they were true and accurate. Annual treasurer's report was sent in. The 990-N ePostcard was sent in to the IRS, and it was accepted. Shirley presented the proposed budgets for the checking account and savings account, anticipating no change in dues. There are 46 active members and 11 reserve members. All dues were paid on time. A new line item was added to the checking account budget for \$100 for items for all teachers/staff to be distributed during Teacher Appreciation Week in May 2020.
- Meeting Dates, Locations and Programs A permanent change has been made so that the Warrenton group will host the September meeting and the Littleton group will host the March meeting. The Norlina group will continue to host the December meeting and the St. Paul's group will continue to host the May meeting. For this year the meetings will be as follows:
 - September 5, 2019 Induction of new member, Dominican Republic Trip & Global Education Program, and awards presentation
 - > December 5, 2019 Visit from new 2019-2021 NC DKG officer, special music
 - > March 5, 2020 Warren County Memorial Library presentation, vote on grants and new officers
 - May 7, 2020 presentation of grants, installation of officers
- **Replacements for Hospitality Chair, Norlina Group chair, and St. Paul's Group chair** Debra Clayton volunteered to be Hospitality Committee chair. After discussion, Gail Coleman will be asked to be the St. Paul's Group chair and Danylu Hundley will be asked to be the Norlina Group chair.
- Amendments to Gamma Chi Chapter Rules Nancy Tunstall, as parliamentarian, stated that to align our chapter rules with the amendments made to the state's *Bylaws*, we need to remove all references to Eta State NC. The state's legal name is now The North Carolina State Organization abbreviated NC DKG. Also, changes were made to the New Member section. Prospect cards turned in at any meeting can be voted on at that meeting. Once the prospective member(s) attends an orientation and pays her dues, she is a member. An Induction Ceremony will still be held in September for any new member who wants to participate. Members joining after December 31 will be charged half the dues amount for that year.
- Chapter Achievement Form Nancy Tunstall led a discussion of this form, noting that the chapter is off to a good start with two members presenting at the state convention, three members attending the International Conference, and three members being appointed to state committees. The potential is strong for achieving Superior Achievement Level and the Presidential Achievement Level. She will have an article in the newsletter suggesting how members can help. She also urged participation in the online DKG Fine Arts Gallery with submissions being accepted August 15 through September 15.
- Other Concerns Norma Retzlaff stated that the Warren County NCAE will donate to the Welcome Meal for New Teachers or to
 the items for all teachers/staff to be given during Teacher Appreciation Week in May 2020. Betsy Clark, chair of the Scholarship
 Committee, said that her committee had reached a consensus that grants would continue to be restricted to Warren County
 residents for this year. Nancy Tunstall showed a Tic Tac mints case that was given to NC attendees at the International Conference
 by NC DKG President Dr. Teresa Cowan that had her theme on them, "We love your commit-MINT to Education! You GROW girl!"
 It was decided to give a similar case of Tic Tac's to all attendees at the September 5 meeting.

With no further business, President Hall adjourned the meeting at approximately noon.

Descriptions of International Funds:

- **Educational Foundation Fund** any educator may apply for project grants. Projects must meet one or more of the following: (1) Support and encourage intercultural understanding, (2) Encourage standards of excellence in education, and (3) Assist and cooperate with schools, colleges, universities and other persons, organizations, trust funds or foundations in support encouragement and improvement of education. Also Cornetet funds are available for professional development for individuals and for seminars.
- **Emergency Fund** members who sustain major losses from floods, tornadoes, hurricanes, earthquakes, wild fires and other natural disasters may be recommended by their chapter and state organization president to receive a \$500 Emergency Fund Award.
- **Golden Gift Fund** provides for a member to attend a two-week leadership/management training seminar held in early July at the Red McCombs School of Business, University of Texas at Austin in even numbered years.
- International Speakers Fund the purpose of ISF is to facilitate exchange of Society speakers among member countries and help unite women educators of the world. The ISF committee considers requests for ISF speakers from state organizations twice annually. We have an ISF at our NC DKG Convention each spring.
- Scholarship Fund members may apply for a \$6,000 scholarship to assist them with their graduate studies (\$10,000 for doctoral studies).
