World Fellowship News from Ros Seidel

Chapters should be aware that "The Schools for Africa" program has been discontinued in its former form and restructured into a program with several initiatives, now overseen by UNICEF USA. Donations should now be made to UNICEF USA and earmarked for "Education in Africa." Rest assured that any donated funds will continue to build on the success of "Schools for Africa" and the focus supported by DKG members.

Also, I'd like to alert DKG chapters to a new initiative that will be supporting girls education in AFGHANISTAN. The program is called "Education Within Boundaries: Afghan girls creating their future" and will be run within the women's center, Kandahar Treasure, in Kandahar, Afghanistan beginning in the fall of 2024.

Kandahar Treasure was founded by the former Minister of Education in Afghanistan, Rangina Hamidi. It is a place where Afghan women (mostly widows, as 80 % of Afghan women are widows and have no means of support) can gather safely and create beautiful embroidery using the ancient art of Khamak, which is then sold internationally.

Rangina has created a curriculum for girls to become educated in business and design and to learn the craft of khamak embroidery alongside the women artisans who have been creating khamak embroidery for generations. Through participating in the program, Afghan girls can learn to become independent from within the cultural boundaries set in place by traditions. They will be afforded an opportunity to build a better future for themselves and their country. The program will help to alleviate those feelings of isolation, loneliness, abandonment and a lack of confidence due to the restrictions on the education of girls beyond 6th grade put in place by the Taliban in August 2021.

The four year program is expected to cost \$20,000. Any amount donated would be immensely appreciated.

News from DKG International:

DKG International Membership: Avenue M Report

In 2023, the DKG International Executive Board hired an outside firm, Avenue M

Research Group, to help the DKG Board determine the causes and issues surrounding the rapid drop in DKG membership. Avenue M is a global consulting organization that helps organizations with membership growth, revenue building, and brand strengthening. A survey was conducted between May 3, 2023 – June 1, 2023, via email. Close to 60,000 email surveys were sent out to members; 10,879 were completed and returned. The 100+ page final report is available on the DKG website. Listed below is the executive summary of their findings.

The report is worth reading. Besides pointing out the causes of the downturn in DKG membership, it also gives suggestions and a timeline for reversing the trend. Many of our New Hampshire chapters have brought up the difficulties with keeping members and attracting new members. What has your chapter been doing to encourage membership?

Executive Summary

Overview: The Executive Summary highlights some of the top findings from the Key Findings section. It is meant to provide a **very brief** summation of the Survey Key Findings and Avenue M's interpretation of the research. Additional details on differences between important respondent segments in the survey can be found on the following pages and in the Excel file cross-tabulations provided as an appendix to this report.

- 1. Educator burnout/resignations (62%) and a shortage of educators entering the profession (60%) are the top challenges or trends that women educators believe will negatively impact the profession in the future. Educator burnout/ resignations is of particular concern to women educators who are 54 or younger.
- 2. Increasing expectations of teachers (50%) and having to deal with issues affecting students outside the classroom (42%) are the top challenges and issues that are currently impacting women educators. Younger women educators (54 or younger) are more likely to report they are struggling with burnout/lack of work-life balance.
- 3. Nearly four in five (79%) DKG members and former members say they accepted DKG membership because they knew a friend or colleague who

was a DKG member. Community/connections with other women educators (65%) is the other top reason that these individuals chose to accept membership.

- 4. Over four in five DKG members are likely (21%) or extremely likely (66%) to renew their DKG membership. The proportion of members who are extremely likely to renew membership (66%) is higher than the industry benchmark of 55% tracked in Avenue M's database of professional membership organizations.
- 5. Affiliation with DKG is stronger at the chapter level than at the international level, as members are more satisfied with their chapter membership than with their DKG international membership and are more likely to recommend chapter membership. They also tend to view Chapter membership as more valuable.
- 6. Providing updates on state/federal policies affecting education (35%) and improving communications about member benefits, activities, and events (34%) are ways that DKG could improve the value of membership for members. Younger DKG members (54 or younger) are more likely to feel the society could increase the value of membership through attracting more members that reflect their demographics and providing more opportunities for leadership development training.
- 7. Nonmembers are most likely to not be a member of DKG because they are retired/retiring (28%) or because they don't have enough time to use DKG benefits/attend events (24%).
- 8. State organization conventions (84%) and scholarships (75%) are the DKG offerings respondents are most likely to be aware of. The state organization conventions (42%), and *Collegial Exchange* (33%) are the most highly utilized benefits.
- 9. While respondents 65 and older are most likely to believe there are no barriers to engaging with DKG, those 64 or younger are more likely to feel a lack of time is a barrier to engagement.
- 10. When respondents engage with DKG, their number one goal is to connect with other women educators (59%). Those who are 64 or younger are more likely to engage with DKG to get information or resources to help them do their job better, find opportunities for training/education, and find opportunities for financial assistance.

11. In the future, Women educators feel DKG should be focusing on attracting/recruiting educators to become DKG members (54%) and attracting/recruiting educators to the profession (46%).

Speakers for DKG State Conference

Rudy VanVeghten:

Born and raised in Manchester, Vermont, Rudy VanVeghten began his career as a journalist at the Meredith News in 1973. He spent over a quarter century at the News, most of that time as editor. After leaving Meredith in 2001, he worked in publications and website management at his



alma mater, Northeastern University in Boston. He and his wife, Cheryl, moved back to Meredith following his retirement in 2020. VanVeghten is the author of four books on Meredith history: *Filling the Void: History of the Meredith Public Library* in 1988, *The History of Meredith Bay* in 2015 and *Class of Cultures: The Story of the Penacooks, the Winnipesaukees, and Chiefs Passaconaway, Wonalancet and Kancamagus* in 2022, and "*These Sons of Liberty*": *Meredith in the American Revolution* in 2023. He contributed several chapters in the Meredith Historical's recent publication Morsels of Meredith

History. Over the past decade and a half, he has also researched and published a series of articles in *de Halve Maen (The Half Moon*), a research journal published by the Holland Society of New York dedicated to "illuminating the Dutch contribution to American history." He currently serves as copy editor of the publication.

Mr. VanVeghten's presentation' "Indigenous Peoples of New Hampshire" will focus on his research of the native cultures and his subsequent book, *Class of Cultures*. As he concluded in his book: "Native American nations underwent many clashes of culture even before invaders arrived from across the ocean.....the Native populations of our area, after an existence spanning over 12 millennia, were doomed by three concurrent forces in the 17th century." This eye-opening history gives us plenty of food for thought.

Dr. John Hopper:

Dr. Hopper received is BA in US History at Wake Forest University, his MA in African History at Ohio University, and his PhD in South African History from Yale University. Although John's professional career was in banking; he has always kept his interest in history. Bear Island in Meredith has been a longtime summer residence for the Hopper family. After retiring from his position at Bank of America, he moved his family to their permanent home in Center Harbor, NH. In retirement, John has become a prominent member of the Meredith Historical Society and is the current president. He has written two books: *The History of Bear Island* and *The Bear Island Chapel*.



Dr. Hopper's presentation will cover the history of the town of Meredith from its 1740s roots, when it was simply an idea, to its emergence as a first-class tourist and retirement community in

the 21st century. The presentation will proceed chronologically beginning with a brief overview of the development of the New Hampshire colony in the early 1600s. It will move quickly to the granting of the town in 1748, followed by the first phases of actual settlement. The focus will

then shift primarily to the evolution of Meredith Village and its mill yard during the 19th century and 20th centuries. The evolution of the tourism/vacation era will be overlaid on those periods. The most recent phase of Meredith's evolution, beginning the 1980s, will conclude the presentation.

Bree Rossiter

As Conservation Program Manager for the Lake Winnipesaukee Association (LWA), Bree's role is to develop, manage, and implement, new and existing programs designed to carry out LWA's mission. She leads the water quality monitoring, cyanobacteria, and Winni Blue/LakeSmart program as well as several critical nutrient mitigation projects. She participates in the NH LAKES advocacy group to track legislation and is an appointed member of the Wolfeboro Waters committee. Her experience comes from previous employment with NH Department of



Environmental Services and Florida Department of Enviro nmental Protection, working with the Volunteer Assessment Programs, Methyl tert-Butyl Ether (a gasoline additive used to increase octane and oxygen levels and reduce pollution emissions), source water protection, and water restoration programs. Bree has a B.S. in Environmental Science and Policy with a minor in sustainability from Plymouth State University. A resident of Gilford, Bree enjoys gardening, cooking, and spending time on the lake.

Ms. Rossiter's presentation is entitled: "From Rocks to Waves: Exploring Lake Winnipesaukee's Geology, Water Quality, and Protective Programs". The Lake Winnipesaukee Association (LWA) is the leading nonprofit dedicated to protecting the water quality and natural resources of Lake Winnipesaukee and its watershed for present and future generations. Dive into the world beneath Lake Winnipesaukee as we present its geological history, review the current state of water quality, and explore LWA's initiatives focused on preserving and protecting the lake.

Dave Anderson

Dave Anderson is Senior Director of Education for the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests. He joined the Forest Society in 1990. Anderson is responsible for design, development and delivery of conservation education programs including field trips, workshops and presentations for Forest Society members, conservation partners, schools and the general public.

Anderson is well known as a naturalist, guiding field trip tours on the Society's Forest



Reservations statewide while teaching about forest ecology, wildlife habitats, stewardship of forest resources and land conservation to introduce life-long residents and visitors alike to the protection and wise use of New Hampshire forests, conservation land and open space.

Anderson is a co-author of the "Forest Journal" column in the statewide New Hampshire Sunday News. His quarterly "Nature's View" columns are a long-time regular feature in the Forest Society's guarterly Forest Notes magazine. Anderson is a writer and co-host of

"Something Wild," the natural history and forest-related Friday radio feature and podcast on New Hampshire Public Radio (NHPR).

Anderson received the prestigious 2014 Fred E. Beane Award for effective, fair and balanced Statewide communications on issues affecting agriculture and forestry in New Hampshire. Anderson is the 2022 recipient of the NH Timberland Owners Annual President's Award for forest-related communication and public relations. He lives on a 48-acre certified NH Tree Farm in South Sutton, NH.

Mr. Anderson's presentation about NH forests and history – "A Century of Forest Conservation" is applicable to Lakes Region and will focus on the work to protect the Sandwich Range and Belknap Range, locally adjacent to Lake Winnipesaukee and the entire Lakes Region.

Barry came with photos, maps, books and personal stories from both his own experiences and those of family members who have been involved in logging for many generations. 
