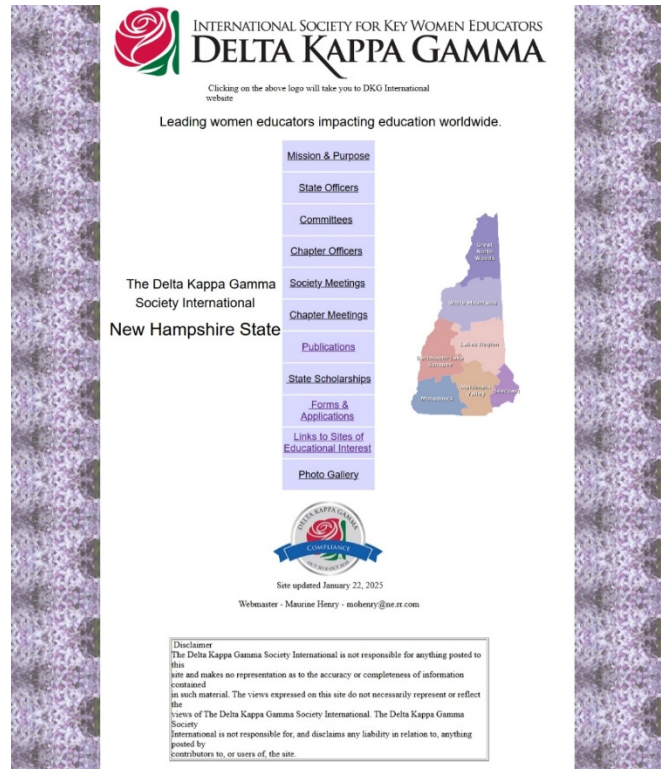

Leadership Training and the DKG International Conference in New Orleans July 29-August 2. The day and a half State Organization Leadership Training (SOLT) session provided us with many new ideas, suggestions, and planning sessions to aid us at the state level for the next biennium. Also, we had an opportunity to meet in smaller groups with members from other states and countries who hold the same office. Carol attended the workshop for state presidents, Maurine worked with the state treasurers, and Terry joined the Membership Chairs. These training sessions helped us focus on our New Hampshire State needs and answered many of our questions.

We had an afternoon open between the SOLT sessions and the opening of the conference. We took this opportunity to visit the WWII Museum in New Orleans. To see it all, we would have needed 2 – 3 days; however, we were able to visit two of the six buildings. We found the exhibits interactive and informative; it was definitely a learning experience.

The conference began with a dynamic inspirational speaker, Merlyna Valentine, an elementary teacher and principal who experienced a life-threatening medical issue. After two years of rehab, she was welcomed back to her school by her students and staff and continued her duties for 10 more years as a quadriplegic.

Breakout sessions and Passion Projects followed the Introductory General Session covering a variety of DKG topics. These included workshops for early career educators, DKG projects, Facebook and Web Design, Rebuilding DKG, UN Resources, Second Century DKG, Empowering Girls, and many more.
