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## Dear DKG New Hampshire State Sisters, **President's Letter**By Terry Thompson

It is hard to believe we are more than halfway through the summer; the

new school year will soon be upon us. Also, our DKG chapter meetings and the DKG/NH State Fall meeting are soon to begin and will hopefully offer opportunities to be together, provide learning experiences, and offer support to all.

The highlight of my summer was attending the DKG International Convention in National Harbor, Maryland. New Hampshire was represented by Maurine Henry, Peggy Saunders, Janie Sweatt, and me. The DKG



International Convention, which occurs in July in the even years focuses on the DKG International Society by-laws. All attendees have an opportunity to speak and offer input on proposed changes and additions to the by-laws. After each discussion all members vote using an electronic device which records the votes and delivers the results within a minute of two. If nothing else, it is a fascinating use of technology, which in this case worked well.

There were approximately 800 attendees at the Convention, representing all US states and 20 foreign countries. The flag ceremony representing the participating countries was impressive. The DKG International conventions and conferences are opportunities to meet and connect with

women from across the country and the world. I hope you will consider attending the DKG International Conference in New Orleans next summer, scheduled from July 29-August 2, 2025. Remember, partial funding is available for you through our NH State Scholarship program. Application forms are in the appendix of your directory.

In addition to the large group voting sessions at the convention, there were Keynote speakers, a variety of Spotlight Sessions (workshops) and Topic Talks (opportunities to discuss current issues generated by the attendees). Margot Lee Shetterly, the author of <u>Hidden Figures</u>, offered a thought-provoking Keynote Presentation. She spoke about the research for her book which touched on issues of race, gender, science, and innovation during WWII and the Civil Rights Era.

One Spotlight Session I found to be particularly informative was conducted by the Executive Board of the DKG International Educators Fund. Even though I have been a DKG member for over 16 years, I was unaware of the many opportunities and the financial support available through DKGIEF. Donations for DKGIEF are obtained from grants, member contributions, fundraising events, and annual donations from states and individual chapters. DKGIEF awarded close to \$1,000,000 between July 1, 2020, to June 30, 2023, to individual members and non-members, states, and chapters. What previously were separate programs and committees are now under the DKGIEF umbrella.

DKGIEF offers the following funding opportunities:

<u>Cornetet Award</u>: Individual professional development (members & non-members) & educational seminars (members).

<u>Educational Projects</u>: Funding for projects to benefit children and education to members and non-members.

<u>Educators Award Fund</u>: Selected women authors receive cash awards for non-fiction writing impacting education.

Emergency Fund: Solely supported by donations, the Emergency Fund helps members with a major loss due to a natural disaster.

<u>Eunah Temple Holden Leadership Fund:</u> The ETH Fund supports superb speakers for international meetings and other leadership events.

Golden Gift Fund: The Golden Gift Fund offers professional lifechanging leadership management seminars.

<u>International Speakers Fund</u>: Going beyond borders, the International Speakers Fund sends members as speakers into Society countries other than their own.

<u>Scholarship Fund:</u> International Scholarships are awarded annually to members for graduate study.

World Fellowship Fund: World Fellowships are awarded to non-member women educators who are continuing their education.

New Hampshire members and chapters have benefited from DKG funds over the years:

- --Delta chapter received two grants for their educational project: Books, Bags, and Stuffies Literacy Program.
- --Several NH members have received scholarships for degree programs.
- --New Hampshire has more than one recipient of the Golden Gift Award.
- --All state presidents are invited to attend a fully funded two-day training session at the beginning of each biennium, sponsored by the Eunah Temple Holden Leadership Fund.
- --Many of your DKG sisters in northern New England have received emergency funds following the extreme weather events we have recently experienced in our region to help them clean and rebuild their homes.

You might want to consider applying for funding individually or for your chapter. Descriptions, criteria, and applications can easily be found on the DKG Website. "DKGIEF" is the 6<sup>th</sup> topic listed under the DKG header.



### World Fellowship News from Ros Seidel

I continue to keep in touch with the former Minister for Education for Afghanistan, Rangina Hamidi, about her efforts to include a school for girls within Kandahar Treasure. KT is a women's center which Rangina founded, where women create exemplary and unique embroidery using the traditional Khamak method. (Those interested in learning more about Kandahar Treasure can visit the newly upgraded site, kandahartreasure.com.)

The mission of the new school for girls, *Education Within Boundaries: Afghan girls creating their future*, is to provide a place for young women to gather to receive training and education in business and design. The school will use a youth mentorship approach by implementing a series of dialogues, lessons and activities led by local women leaders and Rangina Hamidi, KT founder and former Minister for Education. The program aims to offer hope, instill resilience and build confidence in a generation of girls and young women who currently do not have the means to expand beyond traditional roles of Afghan women. If successful, the program will continue beyond this inaugural year to offer hundreds of young Kandahari women the opportunity to sustain their mothers' and ancestors' traditions while creating possibilities for themselves and one day, their own daughters.


### News from DKG International by Jane Sweatt

Among the sculptures were Rosie the Riveter, Marilyn Monroe, Louis Armstrong and Henry Ford whose sculpture was made of Ford auto parts which made it even more interesting. These sculptures are very lifelike and popular to visit, be photographed with and shake hands.

### **Convention 2024 – Constitution Up-Date (The Business of the Convention)**

There were 94 proposed amendments at this year's DKG International Convention. We got through all of them by the Friday business meeting. Something that hasn't been accomplished in several years!

Amendments 1-15, with # 7 pulled for a later vote, were voted on as a block. These were basically moving policies and procedures from the constitution and ISR to Guidelines and Policies/Procedures (GAPP) – all passed

Amendments 16-61, with #17 withdrawn, were voted on as a block. These amendments were considered by the administrative board to be non-controversial. All passed. Included were allowing collegiate members to be counted toward state organization and International as active members, reorganization of fees in different accounts, provides rules for state organization co-presidents, allows chapter co-presidents, modifies responsibilities of several different positions, and moves and clarifies several questioned areas in the constitution

The remaining amendments 62-94 were presented independently and debated and voted on from the floor. The following are some of the changes made.

Article 1: Name

Section A: The official name of this international organization shall be The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International, hereinafter also referred to as the Society. The Society shall also be known as DKG Society International.

Also under Name. The Greek symbols for Delta Kappa Gamma were removed.

Under Article II: Missions and Purposes, Section D. Purposes, the wording for #'s 5, 6, and 7 were changed.

5 now reads: to endow awards to aid members in pursuing personal and professional growth and to provide grants to non-member educators

6 now reads: to stimulate the personal and professional development of members and to encourage their participation in relevant programs of action: and

7 now reads: to inform the members of current economic, social, political, and educational issues so that they may participate effectively to support a sustainable world society.

Article IV; Finance Section B. Fees, now reads

1. Scholarship Fee

- a. State organization scholarship fees, if any, will be paid as determined in accordance with state organization by laws.
- b. Chapter scholarship fees, if any, will be paid as determined in accordance with the rules set by the chapter.

International Scholarship fees were struck from the constitution

There were also amendments passed in regards to duties of national offices and presenting amendments #94 was a new Article XX Ethics which establishes an ethics policy for our organization. Submitted by Maurine Henry

### Under The Red Umbrella by Maurine Henry

While at the International Convention in July I had the opportunity to attend a workshop discussing the many areas of focus covered under the Educational Excellence Committee (EEC).

Below is a synopsis of each of the areas as sent to me by Yvonne Gatley. I have sent a copy of the full document to chapter presidents. This document includes ideas for projects your chapter can participate in.

#### The Arts

EEC promotes a focus on the arts at international conventions and conferences and state organization conventions. Through music, the spoken word and visual displays, members artistic contributions are highlighted.

### **Programs and Projects**

Programs and projects are best delivered when they meet the interests of your members. Solicit member input when planning. Also, use your members as resources in delivering those programs and heading up those projects.

### Leadership

Per the DKG Strategic Plan, one of the focus areas of EEC is to empower members to take leadership roles. Often, members fail to see the leadership potential which is within them. These ideas can offer support to leaders at all levels. Don't forget to use the resources in the Leadership Discovery Centre on the DKG Website.

### Legislation

EEC encourages DKG members to be active in promoting legislation on educational issues on the local, state, and federal level.

### **United Nations**

DKG became an NGO (non-governmental organization) in 1995. Starting in 1997, Anne-Marie Carlson of The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International formed a team of volunteer experts to enable educators to develop new and better ways of teaching about the United Nations and its civil society partners. CTAUN, the Committee on Teaching about the UN, provides a resource center, bringing together materials developed throughout the UN System and makes available exemplary materials used by governments and NGOs, teachers, and curriculum specialists. Check out these resources under About on the drop-down menu. Go to Key Initiatives and find DKG/UN.

## **UNICEF** "Girls Initiative to Revitalize Learning and Success" (GIRLS) Fund

The GIRLS Fund will achieve results by directing critical funds to African countries where girls' education has been identified as a challenge. New international project voted on during the 2024 International Convention. (This program replaces "School for Africa" which has been sunsetted by UNICEF)

### **Support for Early Career Educators (SEE)**

To share the vision, Leading Women Educators Impacting Education Worldwide, and strengthen our Society, the Educational Excellence Committee established Supporting Early-career Educators (SEE) as its second international project during the 2012 International Convention in New York City. SEE encourages members/chapters to be creative in support of early-career educators with a variety of strategies.

by Greg Lukianoff/Jonathan Haidt


These were recommended by former students. One is in higher education at the University of Miami, Frost School of Music and the other is also a teacher.
