What do Billy Joe Clegg, Vermin Supreme, Russell Fornwalt and Caroline "The Hemp Lady" Killeen have in common with Joe Biden, Donald Trump, Barack Obama and George W. Bush? They've all been on the New Hampshire Presidential Primary ballot. They, and hundreds of others!

But what compelled this middle-aged northern politician to leave his home and family for the field of battle two thousand miles away? And how well did this future commander-in-chief perform at the head of his regiment? Join doctoral candidate James Irving from the University of New Hampshire as he unpacks these questions and, in the process, uncovers the wide and tangled network of individuals - from President James K. Polk to local friends, foreign foes, and even horses, mules, and mosquitos - who helped determine the course of Pierce's wartime experience.
