# Lifelong Learning

The Stewart Indian School in Carson City is a must see historic landmark. In 1985, the school was listed on the National Register of Historic Places. It functioned between 1890

for about 30,000 students in its 90 years. The school's 110 acre campus still holds 65 of its original buildings, noted for the masonry work of colored local stone found in the Carson Valley. When the school opened, the campus included two dormitories (boys and girls), a barn, carpenter's shop, harness and tool house, laundry, wood, coal shed, boys and girls bath houses, and a three story 10,000 gallon water tower (still standing). Native American children from Nevada and later throughout the west were forced to attend the Stewart Institute up to secondary age. The initial intent of the school was to eliminate Indian language and culture from the children, to provide them with trade skills, and make them fully American. Students in the early years were harshly disciplined and acted as unpaid labor to maintain the institution. The

children were prohibited, until 1934, from using their native language and culture. They could be punished speaking their Indian dialect. At first, students were kidnapped on cattle trucks and brought to the school. During the first 10 years, only children from Nevada-based Washoe, Paiute, and Western Shoshone tribes attended the school. Later, children from over 60 tribal groups from Arizona, New Mexico, and Utah were forced to attend the school.





The school depended on the unpaid labor of the students to keep it open. They worked hard hours washing clothes, cooking, farming, and other manual jobs. Later they received grades for their labor. The school began with 37 students and three teachers, and by the 1930's, grew to 400-500 students. The students spent half day learning academics, including how to read and write English. The remainder of the day was focused on unpaid labor. Boys performed woodworking, ranching, farming, painting, mechanics, and carpentry. The girls performed domestic skills in baking, cooking, sewing, laundry, and practical nursing. The young Indians were instilled with Christian ideologies, and baptisms were performed in a pool on school grounds. A Catholic Church was built. Students wore uniforms and had short hair cuts. Brothers and sisters were separated and only allowed to see each other for a few hours on Sunday, The meals were very poor and mostly included beans. Many students got diseases from malnutrition and other causes. The school was finally closed in 1980 due to federal budget cuts and earthquake safety. Many parents and students protested when it was closed. The cultural center and Museum opened to the public in 2020. Admission is free, docents give tours of the museum, and you can take a walking tour of the whole 110 acres.

# History of DKG




The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International was founded May 11, 1929, at the Faculty Women's Club at the University of Texas, Austin, Texas. Alpha Chapter of Alpha State Organization placed a plaque where the Women's Club once stood on campus. Dr. Annie Webb Blanton, member of the faculty of the University of Texas and a former state superintendent of public instruction in Texas, conceived the idea of an organization for women educators. Eleven women educators from Texas, representing various professional positions in education, were initiated by Dr. Blanton. Alpha Chapter was installed on June 3, 1929.

These 12 Founders were Dr. Annie Webb Blanton, Austin, Texas; Miss Mamie Sue Bastian, Houston, Texas; Miss Ruby Cole, San Antonio, Texas; Miss Mabel Grizzard, Waxahachie, Texas; Dr. Anna Hiss, Austin, Texas; Miss Ray King, Fort Worth, Texas; Miss Sue King, Fort Worth, Texas; Dr. Helen Koch, Austin, Texas; Mrs. Ruby Terrill Lomax, Austin, Texas; Dr. Cora M. Martin, Austin, Texas; Mrs. Lalla M. Odom, Austin, Texas; and Miss Lela Lee Williams, Dallas, Texas. (All are deceased.)

The Founders believed that there was need for an organization in which women educators—rural and urban teachers; preschool, elementary, high school, college, and university teachers; librarians; school administrators; supervisors—might be united for efforts toward better professional preparation, recognition of women's work in the teaching profession, and scholarships for those needing aid in improving their professional preparation.
