Joint Chapter and UNLV Task Force

Based on plans generated in 2021, Epsilon and Gamma Chapters are now working together in a task force with UNLV to support teacher candidates and to extend awareness of and membership in DKG.

The effort evolved from Epsilon's involvement with UNLV's dual enrollment program (UNLV Teach) for Las Vegas high school students interested in a career in education. Specifically, in 2017, the

chapter decided that instead of directing scholarship money toward local graduates who indicated an interest in teaching, it would provide assistance to the structured program at UNLV, where a \$500 grant would support 10 students. As the chapters shared at joint meetings, Gamma became interested in this approach and turned its efforts in a similar direction in 2020. The joint task force was formed in July 2021.

Now called Rebel Teach, the program at the heart of efforts is established in four Las Vegas high schools, where students earn credits toward a degree at UNLV as part of their high school credits. Courses include Intro to Elementary or Secondary Education; Tech for Teachers; Valuing Cultural Diversity; and Intro to Special Education. Students take these courses in their junior and senior years of high school, and the course credits transfer to UNLV if they enroll there.

Rebel Teach is now one of three programs focused on what UNLV calls its Student Success Initiative. The second, the Cross the Finish Line grant program, is for students who are

three semesters from graduation and for whom completion of student teaching poses a financial burden because of work and/or family obligations; it provides \$10,000 in support for recipients. The third is the Paraprofessional Pathways Project, which helps paraprofessionals transition to a teaching career. Participants must have at least 60 credits accrued to join the program, which allows them to complete their bachelor's degree in 1 year. Their time on the job counts toward practicum and student-teaching hours.

The threefold goals of the joint task force are for the partners to develop a stronger understanding of UNLV/DKG programming, respectively; to expand efforts to support the Student Success Initiative projects; and to identify and draw from potential membership pools for DKG at UNLV. With the change in DKG Constitution that allows student members, UNLV students at both the graduate and undergraduate level are key potential DKG members, as are the Rebel Teach educators in the high schools and the UNLV faculty.

Although efforts have been slowed by responses to COVID-19 at UNLV, task force members have toured the campus, learned about UNLV education programs, and planned ways to reach out to students. Efforts to raise funds for grants continue in both chapters, and chapter members participated in UNLV's Summit on Nevada Education in December that brought together leaders from the state to discuss its educational issues.

The task force group will continue to pursue its goals in 2022, working with Erin Pennington, Director of Development for the UNLV Foundation, and with Dr. Sebern Coleman, Director of Educator Preparation in the UNLV College of Education. As the university reopens to more on-campus programs and activities in the wake of COVID-19, the chapters hope to accomplish their goals and impact education in Nevada.

Delta Kappa Gamma: A MODEL FOR OUR FUTURE

Some Delta Kappa Gamma chapters are in trouble! Times have changed, and like most organizations, DKG has a problem with decreasing membership as an aging population dies and potential new members are reluctant to take on any additional activities. This has been a topic of concern for many months... actually, years now. A variety of solutions have been suggested and tried but with limited success. Recruiting new membership has been a difficult task.

In informal conversations, members of Alpha and Theta Chapters in Northern Nevada explored the possibilities of a new closer collaboration between the chapters. After mulling this over for months, it was decided that a committee from each chapter should explore how this might be accomplished and how this new design might function.

In August 2021, four members from Alpha and three from Theta met to consider the formation of an Ad Hoc Committee. It was determined that neither Chapter wished to give up its autonomy but it seemed reasonable to share responsibilities in the following areas:

- A. Program planning and implementation with the benefit of increased attendance at programmed events.
- B. Fundraising activities
- C. Publicizing DKG events and achievements at all levels- International, State and Chapter
- D. Chapter Officers and Committee Chairmanships, but not the offices of Chapter President, First Vice President, or Secretary
- E. Membership outreach through newsletters or other means

This information was reported to the members of the Chapters and the committee was established to decide how best to proceed. Information about the meeting was shared and approval was sought from chapter officers and the Alpha Chi State President.

- A. A formal meeting of the Joint Ad Hoc Committee was held in September. The following proposals were discussed and drafted for review and approval by the members of each chapter at their next scheduled meeting:
- B. Collaborating on four joint meetings each year, with planning of two events or meetings alternating between the chapters. Members of both chapters would be invited to attend all meetings.

Member suggestions would be requested for ideas for sharing officers, committee assignments, increased publicity, and fundraising

Discussion of the proposals for actively collaborating, submitted by the Ad Hoc Committee, was approved by each chapter, as required.

In November the first joint Alpha/Theta program took place at the South Washoe County Library featuring presentations of Nevada historical characters portrayed by Silver State Chautauqua community actors. It was an outstanding success. In December, a 'Welcome Brunch" for Theta was hosted by the members of Alpha Chapter at the Lake Mansion. It provided us the opportunity to get to know each other better and to bind us even closer through our membership in Delta Kappa Gamma. Alpha planned a variety of get acquainted

activities which were enjoyed by all. We will continue to pursue ways to increase both our joint activities and plans for the rest of this school year, although Covid restrictions may be in place.

Other chapters facing the same challenges as Alpha and Theta, can be encouraged to try this collaboration model, and leadership of both chapters would be supportive resources.

Senator Marilyn Dondero Loop

Senator Marilyn Dondero Loop, Nevada State Senate, District 8 presented to the Nu Chapter highlighting the 2021 Nevada Legislative session signaling a momentous shift for education in the Silver State that will improve student achievement. Nearly \$500 million was allocated for education.

Short List of Highlights:

SB 66 - Enacts provisions relating to access to the Internet and Telecommunications Technology for pupils. Creates the Nevada K0-16 connectivity and innovation Advisory Commission. Approved by the Governor 05/28/2021

SB 160 - An ACT relating to education; authorizing a university school for profoundly gifted pupils to enter into a cooperative agreement to provide, dual credit courses; authorizing a school district, charter school or university school for profoundly gifted pupils to enter into a cooperative agreement to provide dual credit courses with an institution of higher education located in another state under certain circumstances; and providing other matters properly relating thereof. Approved by the Governor 05/31/2021

SB 173 Sponsored by Senator MDL. An ACT relating to education; authorizing the board of trustees of a school district and State Public Charter School authority to submit plans to address loss of learning that occurred as a result of the Covid-19 pandemic, requiring the submission to certain entities of certain reports relating to such to address loss of learning; and providing other matters properly relating thereto. Approved by the Governor 06/07/2021

SB 249 Sponsored solely by Senator MDL. An ACT relating to education; requiring the board of trustees of a school district, the governing body of a charter school. a university, state college or community college to include certain information on an identification card issued to a pupil; requiring a pupil to be excused from attendance at a public school for behavioral health professional in certain circumstances; providing that a qualified mental health professional or behavioral health professional can provide certificate to excuse a pupil from attendance at

school and providing other matters properly relating thereto. Approved by the Governor 06/07/2021

SB 458 An ACT relating to education; ensuring sufficient funding for K-12 public education for the 2021 - 2023 biennium; apportioning the State Education Fund for the 2021 - 2023 biennium; authorizing certain expenditures; making appropriations relating to base per-pupil funding, weighted, funding and other educational purposes; revising provisions relating to the Pupil-centered Funding Plan; and providing other matters properly relating thereto. Approved by the Governor 06/04/2021

- Total public support at an average of \$10,204 per pupil in the upcoming fiscal year and \$10,290 in the following fiscal year. That amounts to a \$115 per-pupil reduction from the levels the 2019 Legislature approved for the current fiscal year to the upcoming one.
- Statewide base per-pupil funding of \$6,980 for the first fiscal year of the upcoming biennium and \$7,074 in the second fiscal year. Additional weighted funds will be calculated using the statewide base per-pupil funding amount, with the multipliers set at 0.24 for English learners, 0.03 for at-risk students and 0.12 for gifted and talented students. The Clark County School District, for instance, would receive \$61.9 million of weighted funds for English learners, \$45.4 million for at-risk students and \$3.8 million for gifted students in the upcoming fiscal year.
- The adjusted base per-pupil funding amounts which consider variation in local costs in the 2021-2022 fiscal year range from \$7,222 for the Washoe County School District to \$33,746 for the Eureka County School District. The Clark County School District's adjusted base per-pupil funding is \$7,264.
- In total, the bill allocates more than \$2.6 billion from the general fund to the Pupil-Centered Funding Plan: \$1,396,939,483 in the first fiscal year and \$1,223,780,931.
- Apart from the general fund, there will be nearly \$6.3 billion from outside the general fund going toward the Pupil-Centered Funding Plan. That includes \$3,013,387,160 in the first fiscal year and \$3,239,583,349 in the second.
- The bill also includes a variety of expenditures outside that formula, such as funds to support scholarship program for prospective teachers, nearly \$8 million for the Jobs for America's

Graduates Program and \$50 million for an Education Stabilization Account for reserves.

• The state projects 484,892 students will enroll in K-12 schools in the coming school year.

Jhone Ebert, Nevada Superintendent of Public Instruction and Senator MDL are traveling to each district

enhancing the needs with the formula that allocates resources in a more equitable, student-centered way. This is the first change in Nevada's education funding formula in more than 54 years, and recognizes the direct impact.

Legislative Issue: WEP/GPO

You may wonder why I am writing about this as WEP/GPO
does not impact all states. It does impact many states and if you
move it could impact you as well

Two new bills were filed recently, H.R. 5723 Social Security 2100: A Sacred Trust was refiled by Representative Carson, of Connecticut, chair of the Social Security Committee with a provision to eliminate the WEP/GPO. What makes this legislation different from others is the funding proposal to make it work. There is no trust for social security payments, it is a pay as you go system. Social Security payroll taxes are currently capped at incomed of \$142,800. This proposed change would raise the cap to \$400,000. More information on social security proposed changes can be found in the legislation titled Social Security 2100: A Sacred Trust on congress.gov. There are 194 cosponsors.

HR 5834 Equal Treatment of Public Service Act of 2021 was introduced on 11/3/2021 by Representative Brady of Texas. This bill provides a new formula for eliminating the WEP only. It has been referred to the House Ways and Means Committee. There are 33 cosponsors.


Since social security legislation cannot go through the reconciliation process it will require a supermajority (60 votes) in the Senate to pass.

Other Legislation:

H.R.5376 Build Back Better Act passed the house. It provides among other items:

- · Up to six semesters of free community college
- · Free childcare for children under the age of six
- · Free universal preschool services
- Health benefits for eligible individuals who reside in states that have not expanded Medicaid
- Provides up to 12 weeks of paid family and medical leave
