

Happy DKG New Year! On July 1, we will begin the second year of this biennium. Like any new year, we look back to the year we are leaving, review accomplishments, and set goals for the year ahead.

Looking back at the past year!

Alpha Rho State accomplished much during the first year of this biennium. I was excited to see what has occurred. I visited every chapter, either individually or at a district meeting, learning of exciting activities chapters do that support Educational Excellence. I visited two chapters this spring that celebrated Educational Excellence at a special dinner and gave out local awards to community members, organizations, and teachers. These were impressive efforts; I was very pleased and proud of these chapters.

This year we made gains in technology. For the first time we produced an extra state newsletter that was all digital. At convention, registered members

were able to evaluate that change. Almost every evaluation appreciated the "all digital" edition; however, we are not quite ready for a total change. We want to continue making sure all members feel included in what is happening in the Society. State reports, usually handed out, were all online, saving money. Our ability to keep the state website updated is outstanding. Our webmaster posts information as soon she receives it. Those unable to attend convention will find handouts under "Resources" on the website.

Alpha Chapter's (Klamath Falls) website is certified by International. Congratulations, Alpha! Epsilon (Medford), Alpha Omicron (St. Helens), and Kappa (Corvallis) also have websites, and we encourage them to apply for DKG certification. A special thank you to state experts who encourage us to move forward!

Looking ahead to next year!

As we look forward to 2014-2015, we will continue to make progress while adding goals to meet new challenges. One goal is to collaborate more. We began with the 2014 State Convention where many members were involved in making this year's convention a huge success.


At fall conference, we will learn more about *Moving Toward Collaboration*. This is a skill we all need, whether working in a classroom, doing a chapter project, or joining in a community activity.

Another goal is to expand the BEAR Project into more areas of Oregon and to collaborate with local businesses to sustain the project. I am researching funding sources to cover costs, especially if we change or add logos on the backpacks to match local partners. (See p. 15.)

We will continue support for International's SEE Project. Half the basket money from convention is set aside to pay state dues for one year for SEE teachers (1-3 years in education) when they become DKG members. Chapters, let us know if new members from last year fit this category or if you initiate new members before October 31, 2014, who qualify. Since membership continues to be an issue, State Membership Chair Kelly McIntyre is presenting a challenge to you. Please read her article in this *Trail* (see p. 11) and set goals so your chapter can meet the challenge.

I look forward to working with all of you this coming year. Thank you for your help in the year past. Together we are moving Alpha Rho State forward!

EXCELLENCE IN ACTION AWARD BY PSI CHAPTER

The Excellence in Action award is presented annually to recognize and honor individuals, and sometimes organizations, of Washington County that have made outstanding and continuing contributions in service to their community, particularly as it relates to education, to children, or to the general welfare of citizens. Our first award was presented in 1976; this year we honored Nadine Zimmerlund.

food to ensure students have something to eat over the weekend. This project provides 30 backpacks every Friday. Nadine coordinates the volunteer schedule, acquires donations, shops for the food, and even packs the backpacks.



SERVICE TO EDUCATION EXAMPLIFIED BY CLAIR WILES

On May 3 at the Alpha Rho State Convention, **Clair Wiles** of Lambda Chapter in Eugene was given the Service to Education Award. However, Clair was at North Eugene High School, administering Advanced Placement tests. We don't know how Lambda Chapter did it, but on May 12, several members of Lambda Chapter and teachers and administrators of NEHS surprised Clair at the beginning of her 5th period class and awarded her the certificate and service medal.

Clair goes above and beyond to support her students in many ways, such as conducting special study sessions and encouraging their participation in extracurricular activities. A longtime North Eugene High School teacher, she serves on a number of committees and was involved in North's transition to and from a small schools model. Clair is a tremendous advocate for peace education. After taking a leave of absence from teaching to serve a tour of duty as a U.S. Naval Intelligence officer in Iraq, Clair returned to North Eugene High and co-developed a curriculum called Peace, Justice and Human Rights in 2003. She was named the Nobel Peace Laureate Project's 2012 Peace Teacher of the Year.

The award presentation concluded by Clair asking her Lambda sisters for a Lambda hug, then her North Eugene colleagues for a NEHS hug, and lastly, her 5th period students for a class hug, at which time the extra adults in the room quietly exited.

OREGON IS ON A “5 TO 10 YEAR” PLAN!

Membership is a vital “constant” in the life of our Society. How do we keep it thriving? Let’s strengthen chapters to re-build and re-vitalize our Society. Let’s start with members we already have. Re-inspire them. Have your chapter show the video created by International, *Sustaining Pride in the Big Picture*. If you don’t have a copy, order one online from the DKG Store. Help members re-affirm why they joined. Other things you can do include:

- Encourage members to come late/leave early. Let them know you want to see them.
- Highlight one or two members in each of your newsletters.
- Send notes to those who missed the last meeting to let them know they were missed.

If you feel your chapter is strong, then start re-building. Many members are retired and have been in DKG for over 25 years. We love every one of them for putting in so many hours of hard work to get us to where we are today. Chapters are trying to recruit younger, beginning teachers, but numbers show low success at keeping those teachers.

Instead, we should look at “middle” teachers, those who have been in the classroom for **5 to 10 years**. These women may have teenage children who are becoming independent. These women know what they are doing in the classroom and are less stressed. They may have time to commit to DKG. How many of those teachers do you know?

International surveys say 50 percent who dropped did so for family, personal, or professional responsibilities,

and most would return later **if asked**. This gives the direction to look at members who dropped **5 to 10 years** ago, because life changes. They may now be able to commit and are waiting for you to invite them back. Send them an invitation to your next meeting. Tell them they are missed and you’d like to know how they are doing.

Here’s my challenge to you: Think **5 to 10 years**.

- Think of educators who have been working for **5 to 10 years**.
- Think of former members who dropped **5 to 10 years** ago.

Let’s have chapters bring in one member from each category in 2014 - 15 to find out if that’s the way to build our Society.

THANK YOU, ALPHA RHO!

With support from an Alpha Rho personal enrichment scholarship, I was privileged to participate in the DKG National Legislative Seminar (NLS) in Arlington, Virginia, in March with 76 members from 27 state organizations.

The three-day seminar focused in part on issues and concerns brought to the U. S. Forum Steering Committee from 2013 Regional Conferences. Topics included STEM, human trafficking, the National Women’s History Museum, the Pay Equity and the Paycheck Fairness Act, Government Pension Offset/Windfall Elimination Provision, teacher licensure, violence against women, hunger in America, and healthcare for women and children. We heard from speakers in each area and learned about current legislation affecting these issues.

Even though the Senate and House were not in session, we had an opportunity to tour the Capitol and meet with staff from our Congressional Districts. I visited all seven Oregon Senate and Congressional offices and met with staffers from the offices of Representatives Greg Walden and Kurt Schraeder.
