As a child, Gabrielle loved to dance and dreamed of becoming a prima ballerina. That dream was shattered by a rare genetic neuromuscular disease, Friedreich's ataxia, which would eventually place her in a wheelchair. Gabe not only struggled with the devastation of the illness, but also endured constant, cruel bullying from classmates. The torment took her on a path of depression and isolation. That all changed when Izzy, a long-eared coonhound pup, entered Gabe's life. Izzy became Gabe's best friend and companion. When this special friend mysteriously developed a condition mirroring Gabe's, Gabe re-entered the world to get Izzy the best treatment available.

Speaking out for Izzy gave her the courage to speak out for another voiceless group: the thousands of children bullied in American schools every day. Despite personal trials, Gabe found her way back to the stage as an outspoken advocate against school bullying. In addition to numerous school visits, she has also been a keynote speaker at various conventions. This dedication earned her the 2011 Communications & Leadership Award from Toastmasters International, as well as the Community Hero Award in 2008 from the Fenton [Michigan] Regional Chamber of Commerce.

At convention you will be voting on two motions:

- Should Oregon hold conventions at one or two locations rather than moving throughout the state? <u>Rationale:</u> With one or two locations, we are able to secure the dates we wish and can negotiate a better rate for the facility. The sites would be along the freeway corridor for easy access by most members and guests. A convention would include workshops (credits offered), business meetings, choral performances, a memorial service, a banquet, and other meals. The timing would be Friday evening through Sunday morning.
- 2. Should conferences and conventions rotate with conferences being held on even-numbered years and conventions held on odd-numbered years?

Explanation: How does a conference differ from a convention? In general, a conference is shorter time frame with workshops and inspirational speakers. Credits would be offered. A conference would focus on central theme to benefit active teachers and would include components for retired members as well. As an example, Pendleton might host a conference with emphasis on Native American culture, the Oregon Trail, or the Whitman Mission. This would take advantage of special skills and facilities in an area. Conferences would not include business meetings or banquets, but would include simple meals. A memorial service would be held. Conference locations would rotate around the state. An Executive Board meeting would be scheduled during the conference for members of the board.

Rationale: The Ad Hoc Convention Committee feels there are advantages to these motions. All chapters would have a part in these meetings. (1) With the economy in its present state, we would save money and also travel and lodging time/costs for our members. (2) We have begun opening our workshops to nonmembers; the hope is that this leads to new membership from those attending. (3) Since International operates on this rotation, we would be following a proven pattern. Please discuss these motions with your chapter and come prepared to vote!

NOTES TO NEWCOMERS (First Time Convention Attendees)

We want you to have a memorable experience that will support your personal and professional growth as a key woman educator, so to help make your first Alpha Rho State Convention a pleasant and comfortable experience, the following tips and information are provided. If you have questions about anything more, please ask a chapter sister who has attended a previous convention. At convention, there will be hostesses happy to answer your questions.

<u>Assigned Seating:</u> The only events with assigned seating are meals. Your table assignment will be designated on your meal ticket. If there is no designation, you may choose your own table. If there is a head table, nameplates will be placed for those assignments.

<u>Dress Code:</u> There is no particular requirement, but most attendees wear business casual clothing for the onsite meetings and workshops. The Rose Banquet is usually more formal and most members and guests dress accordingly. Key pins are worn to all events with the exception of the Rose Banquet when many members choose to not wear key pins or nametags in order to protect their finer clothing.

<u>General Session I</u>: Friday night's program is FREE and informal. This year's event is open to the public with a special keynote speaker, so plan on a packed house. Be sure to sign up for a free ticket or two on the registration form and come early to get a seat! Tickets not picked up by 6:45 p.m. will be given to others on a first come-first served basis. Casual clothes are the norm, as many go to the event directly after arriving, often after a long road trip.

<u>Hospitality Room</u>: Take time to visit the hospitality room and visit the women there. They will have a warm welcome, great refreshments and interesting conversation. This is a good way to meet new friends and to "break the ice" when you may feel displaced or a bit unsure. It's a fine place to relax for a while. If you prefer a lighter breakfast than a full meal on Saturday morning, you will likely find what you want at Hospitality!

Luncheon Tips: Don't eat your birthday cake (dessert) until the candle has been lit and the birthday song is sung. Baskets are usually passed during the luncheon program to collect donations for the State Financial Awards funds. Individuals and/or chapters may put cash or checks into these baskets. Indicate which fund your money should go to, if you have a preference. Often First-Timers are recognized at this function, so be prepared to be recognized as a group.

Nametags and Meal Tickets:

Nametags are usually on an elastic string and worn on the neck. All participants need to wear their official nametags for on-site activities, particularly for the business sessions. While they need not be worn if you are away from the hotel, it is a nice advertisement for DKG to alert businesses and local citizens to the reason you are visiting their city. Meal tickets will be collected at each meal and are conveniently stowed behind your nametag. Remember to bring your banquet ticket with you, as you probably will not be wearing your nametag for that event

<u>Official Pins:</u> Please wear your key pin and nametag to convention functions, with the exception of the Rose Banquet. The key pin is normally worn on the left side, with nothing above it. A chapter president's pin is worn directly beneath the key pin. Ribbon badges are available for purchase at the Unique Boutique and are convenient for protecting clothing. After your first convention, the Oregon umbrella pin is usually worn beneath the aforementioned pins. <u>Registration and Check In:</u> You must register in order to participate in the convention business. Pick up your convention packet and program at the convention registration table. (This is not to be confused with the hotel registration desk!) In your packet you will find an envelope with meal tickets, your official nametag, a set of annual reports, and sundry information and goodies. **We encourage you to bring a bag** to convention to carry registration materials and other items you might collect.

<u>Timing</u>: It's a good idea to arrive at events a few minutes early in order to be seated before the presider begins. Personnel try to keep things moving and on schedule, especially at business sessions and workshops.

<u>Voting</u>: All members registered for convention are entitled to vote on all issues during the general business sessions. Following *Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised* (11th ed.) procedures, any registered member can address the Chair with comments or ask for information on an issue. At an Executive Board meeting, all members are welcome and encouraged to attend; however, only the chapter presidents, past state presidents, and state officers may vote.

Your hostesses from the Lane County chapters will be wearing badges that clearly identify them. They know the answers and will be happy to assist you--or will find someone who can. All you need to do is ask.

Karen Olsen, Lambda, was named Oregon's 2011 History Teacher of the Year. She is a fifth grade teacher at McCornack Elementary in Eugene's District 4J with over 20 years' experience. According to the report from KVAL-TV [Eugene, Oregon], the award was presented by State Board of Education Vice Chair Artemio Paz, who commented that "... Olsen is a master of her craft and an inspiring example of excellence in teaching."

Alpha Rho State members congratulate Karen! Currently Olsen is the State Chair of International Projects, focusing on the International DKG Schools for Africa Project; Karen will be giving a workshop presentation on the topic during State Convention at the Eugene Hilton.

Lambda initiated Karen in December 1985. Karen has served DKG in many roles, including State Music Chair and Lambda Chapter President (1994-1996). She was invited to membership by an elementary teacher who knew her well—her mother, Meribeth Olsen, now retired, a member of Lambda Chapter since 1967. Meribeth also served as chapter president and is currently corresponding secretary and was awarded the Alpha Rho State "Service to Community" Award in 2008. She's a dynamo like Karen—or perhaps Karen is a dynamo like Meribeth?

Karen, a world-traveler, uses those experiences, photos, and objects to intrigue and involve her students. She usually starts class by engaging students' curiosity; e.g., she projects a photo from her travels. Students carefully examine the photo to figure out "Where in the world are you?" Students use their observational skills, reasoning, writing, and speaking; they write observations and hypotheses in journals, then later share with their classmates. Students "journey" the world during the course of the year.

"Karen Olsen is passionate about teaching history and she really knows how to make the past come alive for her kids. Karen understands that teaching history is all about connecting students to stories and she does that in a range of creative and innovative ways. She writes historic musicals for the school's students to perform and even leads her kids on history themed tours both here in Oregon and around the U.S. Karen is a model of how to engage, inspire, and motivate students. She is highly deserving of this special honor," says Susan Castillo, Oregon's State Superintendent of Schools. Olsen received a \$1000 check, and the school was given history-related materials and resources by the Gilder Lehrman Institute of American History and The History Channel.

According to Olsen, in interviews with KVAL –TV and *The Register* Guard [Eugene, OR], "When I started teaching, I knew it wasn't enough to just teach the facts of history. It was also vital for children to question those facts by reading, researching, encouraging historical inquiry, engaging in hands-on activities with primary source documents, listening to experts in their field, and visiting historical sites. Curiosity, inquiries, projects, guests, objects, artifacts, documents, storytelling, photos, field trips, role plays, musicals and travel--all these excite students about learning history." Karen Olsen is a gift to her students, community, and Delta Kappa Gamma. Congratulations!

After Fall Conference, the finance committee conducted the financial review of records for fiscal year 2010-2011. The committee created procedures for the auditing process as well, using guidelines from DKG International. ALPHA RHO STATE HONORARY MEMBER DIES

Dr. Helen J. Frye

Helen J. Frye was Oregon's first female federal judge. Prior to federal appointment, she served as Lane County Circuit Court's first female judge, a position to which she was appointed in 1971 by Governor Tom McCall. In 1980, Frye, a native Oregonian, was appointed as the first female federal judge for the Oregon Circuit Court by President Jimmy Carter. From December 1995 until her death on April 21, 2011, she held the office of Senior Judge of the United States District Court for the District of Oregon.

Frye was born and raised in Klamath Falls, attended the University of Oregon, and worked her way through college. After earning recognition as a member of Phi Beta Kappa, she taught in Oregon public schools, then returned for a master's and finally a Doctor of Jurisprudence from the UO School of Law in 1966. Following the restrictive practices of the times, Frye was forced to resign her job of teaching English in a Eugene high school because she was pregnant; she later returned to teaching, but her husband (the Lane County District Attorney) urged her to continue her education and study law.

Cases which came before her court included bank fraud, spotted owl protection v. logging interests, drug manufacture and distribution, water pollution, child abuse and death, and an early murder trial of D. L. Rogers, later convicted as a serial killer. An interesting case was that of the Bhagwan Shree Rajneesh and the church/ state ties established in Rajneeshpuram which were deemed unconstitutional in federal court. If a <u>chapter is raising funds</u> for a specific International Society Fund, the chapter treasurer may collect individual, personal checks and send them in a batch to International.

Note: Do NOT put the funds in your chapter account and then write a chapter check for the total amount as you have in the past.

Alpha Rho is currently looking into establishing a 501(c)(3) corporation for State Financial Awards and grant funds. As of this time, contributions to state funds are not tax deductible.

"Stand by Your Quote": Try this activity during a chapter meeting to promote interaction among members: Place thoughtful leadership quotes on the walls. Leave plenty of room between the quotes. Make sure the print is large enough to read at a distance.

Ask members to walk around the room, reading each of the quotes. Once they have read all of them, have each member stand by one quote that resonates well with her personal views on leadership. Make sure you have limited the number of quotes to allow for groups to form. Provide time for each member to explain her insights to the group. The facilitator can capture the groups' shared insights, key ideas, or words on a large Post ItTM, whiteboard, or flipchart. These can launch further discussion or serve as a bridge to additional leadership content. You may consider publishing them in your next chapter newsletter! PERSONAL ENRICHMENT-COMMEMORATIVE WINNER REPORT

When I was in college in the 1970s, I was interested in commercial art, but chose teaching instead. Years later, retired and with time to explore, my interest rekindled and I learned that the field is now called graphic design.

I researched class options in the Portland area and discovered that Portland Community College has a strong degree program. As a successful Alpha Rho Personal Enrichment State Financial Award recipient, I enrolled in three courses: Graphic Design I, Introductory Typography, and MAC for Graphic Designers. These 7 credit hours required 16 hours of weekly class attendance.

In the first term of both Graphic Design and Typography, all work is done by hand; in later terms, the computer and Adobe® software are introduced. Learning to use the tools, to measure accurately and to trace the letters precisely with pens was very hard. Perfection was stressed and, in trying to meet the standards, I spent many hours at home, magnifying glass in hand, tracing letters, and inking them, one of the most difficult things I had ever tried! About halfway through the 10-week term, I had gained control over the pen and tools, and then I was able to enjoy the process more.

Graphic Design class introduced logos. Using a specific technique, we designed a logo for an imaginary company and rendered it in ink. In another project we created letterhead, envelopes, and business cards for the same imaginary company, using that logo. A third project involved creating a variety of possible layouts using the same components--headline, text, and image.

In Typography we learned to identify typefaces, to use letters as elements of design, and to understand how typefaces convey moods. We presented thumbnail sketches of our ideas to the class for critique. The projects progressed in complexity from a single letter to the design of a poster. In this class, the final art of each project was a high quality photocopy of the work.

I am thankful and appreciative for the State Financial Award I received from Alpha Rho State.

The Alpha Scholarship Committee selected three recipients for Professional Women Educators 2011 Grants of \$250 each. Awardees all had less than ten years' experience in teaching and are from the greater Klamath Falls area.

Corrie Heselius, Leadership and Mathematics teacher, 2nd year, at Ponderosa Junior High. Her program focuses on direct needs of students and community. Students develop projects based on their interests in four areas: Positive Behavior Support, Affirming & Celebrating Excellence (ACE), Community Service, and School Service. As part of Leadership class. students run and schedule the ACE store for other students who can purchase school supplies with earned ACE credits. The grant will purchase additional supplies for the store: pencils, pens, highlighters, notebook paper, calculators, etc.

Lynndsi Ray, Resource Room teacher, 1st year, at Conger Elementary School, will purchase *Jolly Phonics* to help K-3 students struggling with learning phonics. It contains a starter kit, workbooks and a resource CD that combines movement with sounds, background and schema for kids to utilize when working with sounds. *Jolly Phonics* also provides a 'cue' that teachers can give students without providing the specific sound. This helps students be more successful individually.

Lindsay James, 7th and 8th Grade Science teacher, 5th year, at Ponderosa Junior High, will purchase a classroom set of 40 magnetic gelboards for formative assessments to quickly measure students' concept attainment during discussions and question/answer responses. The boards increase student engagement and accountability, save on paper, and efficiently use time to gauge student knowledge. The gelboards, according to Ms. James, are better than mini-whiteboards because the stylus lasts forever, there is no need to buy new pens, students can erase the gelboards with fingers, and there is no smell for students with allergies.

Alpha Chapter is very proud of these vibrant young women and their zeal for classroom ingenuity in such financially tight times.

Epsilon (Medford & Ashland): has had a busy year, with presentations by forest ecologist, Dr. Tom Sensenig (October), and education professor at SOU, Dr. Younghee Kim, who grew up in poverty in Korea and became a PhD (November). Our delightful December holiday party provided entertainment by our grant recipient, Kendra Taylor and the SOU Madrigal Singers, and a panel of four local women school administrators on how their districts are coping in this financial climate.

Our dedicated DKGs have been working diligently on our main project, the "Young Artists of the Rogue Valley" art show, which goes for 9 consecutive weeks at the Rogue Valley Mall and includes all schools in Jackson County. We hang the works on Mondays, sponsor a reception on Saturdays, and put up a new show each Monday. Our members do all advertising, contacting schools, collecting of art, inviting each contributor to the reception, and awarding each artist with a certificate.

Our February meeting is traditionally merged with the fantastic Omega Chapter from Grants Pass. One chapter hosts, while the other plans the program. This is definitely "Genuine Spiritual Fellowship" at its best, and we all look forward to it!

In April we will be teaming with a local PEO chapter to present a workshop, "Who Gets Grandma's Yellow Pie Plate?" featuring Alpha Rho's own Jean Fairbairn! The women of our area are hungry for this type of education, and we are excited to host Jean.

We hope to see our DKG friends in Eugene at the Convention.

Omega (Josephine Co.): September brought us two talented new members—**Julie Kriz**, an elementary librarian with international experience, and **Colleen Unger**, a middle-school teacher with high technology skills and years of experience in teaching mathematics. BREAKING NEWS! CAPITOL VISIT A SUCCESS!

Politics! Politics! Alpha Rho State stepped up to bat on February 1st to take a crack at improving Oregon education in our second annual Legislation Day at the first ever legislative session in an even year.

President Alice, Vice President Kathy, and Membership Chair Kaye met Legislative Chair Bonita Fillmore the day before to assemble packets for legislators. Items included a thank you note, a book mark (DKG, of course), and some candies. The note asked legislators to remember the decades of cutbacks to Oregon education and that children are our future. It thanked them for supporting education by passing bills that will keep Oregon's future bright.

We met in the Rotunda early the next morning eager to get our message out. Alice, Kathy, and Yvonne Fasold delivered their packets to Senators. Bonita and Kaye delivered theirs to Representatives. In the process, they were able to talk in person about our fears and desires for education, with some very positive contacts. Finished, we met in the Representative Assembly Room.

In this short session, courtesies were not allowed, so our DKG member **Representative Betty Komp** was unable to introduce us as she had last year. We observed huge stacks of bills they will deal with this month. They seated a new representative and conducted basic housekeeping votes and adoption, then adjourned after 9:30 a.m. until the next day. We checked the schedule for any education meetings, but found nothing until late afternoon and, finding only agendas that seemed to be mostly housekeeping, we decided to have coffee, talk and go home early.

Comparing notes, we found that Yvonne had talked to her former student, Rep. Hunt, and he had three items he thought important to support:

- 1. Community Colleges. Rep. Hunt believes K-12 and university funding is protected this time from cuts, but not community colleges. Because of the poor economic situation, many unemployed workers are returning to community colleges to update work skills.
- HB4028, Transportation & Economic Development Act 2012. This bill would make jobs funded by the lottery.
- **3.** Using the Rainy Day Fund. He felt it was important to either

tap into it now or give the Emergency Board the power to do it if the legislature was not in session, or all legislators might have to be called back for an additional emergency session.

Bonita and Kaye spoke with a representative who encouraged us to support and lobby for things that would increase Oregon jobs, thus increasing the tax base and funding for education. Rep. Bill Garrard promised that he would fight any cuts to education on the Ways and Means Committee. The shortfall in funding is again a major concern to the state.

Despite past results, our only way to protect and promote education is by voicing our concerns and hopes to the people with the purse strings. Speak out for education as a working teacher or as a retired teacher!
