
President's Message

A Blind Side Character

Delvin Lane was our guest speaker for our May meeting. He grew up in Cleaborn Homes, one of the housing projects that his organization, Streets Ministries, now mentors. Delvin graduated from Booker T. Washington High School in 1995. He was a gang leader and drug dealer until 1999 when his life was drastically changed after he came to know Christ. In March of 2000, he took a position at Streets Ministries as the Middle School Coordinator.

During the meeting, Delvin talked of his attitude change and how much African-

American youngsters in the inner city need positive role models in their lives. He's an ex-

ample of how one person's life can be completely turned around if the desire is there. In the movie, *The Blind Side*, the gang leader's character was based on Delvin's experiences which have led him to many insightful self-discoveries. Delvin now spends his days counseling gang members, working with homeless children, mentoring children from broken homes, and helping all of them overcome the many challenges they face.



What a surprise for him, when he noticed his former second grade teacher, Celestine French,

sitting in the audience. Celestine assured all of us that his stories were true and could add even more colorful stories if time permitted.



Delvin graduated from the University of Memphis in 2007 with a B.A. in Communications-Rhetoric and is at Streets Ministries because he has a calling to give his life to kids and their families in the 38126 community. He assists the football team at Booker T. Washington High School, serves as a board member for Advance Memphis, and is a member of Hope Presbyterian Church. A donation, in honor of Delvin, was made to Streets Ministries.




